The Boys are Back!

After approximately 15 months of closure, Carlton Scroop and Normanton-on-Cliffe Social Club finally re-opened to members on June 18th. It was a busy evening, probably helped by the first England game of Euro 2020. We were very pleased to welcome back some of our most senior members, all of which had emerged safely from the lockdown. Our OAP pool players were in tip-top form and only slightly rusty after their enforced lay-off.



As per the government guidelines regarding Social Clubs, there are certain restrictions regarding the opening of such venues. The new restrictions are taking a little bit of getting used to, but do seem to be working well since people have become more familiar with them. The club has a different appearance now with arrows on the floor indicating the one-way system (chaos to begin with but much better now). The members now have to sign in, or scan the NHS QR Code if they have a phone recent enough to do so. There are sanitising stations around the club, courtesy of the Village Hall, where members can regularly sanitise their hands throughout the evening. Ventilation is key and so windows must be open, albeit some members prefer to sit near the heaters. The only other major change is the table service. Members now just have to remain at their tables and staff will bring their drinks to them instead of visiting the bar.

I'm very pleased to report that despite such a long time away, friends have been reunited and the laughter is just as loud. We are now (with caution) looking forward to the restrictions easing further in due course.

Make Way for the New Picnic Benches!!

For a few years now, the Playing Field has run at a financial loss, the impact of this being that investment in improving the facilities has been on the back burner. However, during lockdown, our Treasurer was able to apply for Government Grants to supplement our loss of income during the worst of the pandemic.

Now that the Country is 'Open for Business' the Committee have been utilising their time to make strategic improvements to the grounds and facilities. Already the changing rooms, toilets and entrance area within the Pavilion has received new non-slip flooring and a baby changing unit has been installed within the disabled toilet. A new sight screen has been purchased enabling Country Cricket games to be played at our ground. We've also renovated some of our Play Equipment, before it became a critical failure at Annual Inspection, thanks to a Grant from SKDC's Community Fund and sponsorship from Mid-Lincs recycling.

Our latest project was the removal of some old wooden play equipment (easier said than done!). This is to make way for some new recycled plastic picnic benches to add to the benches already on site. The new picnic benches should be delivered in time to be enjoyed at the Gala on 4th September. We are also installing two memorial benches, in memory of Amy Richardson and Chris Connor, both of which will be officially presented to the Village at the Gala.

Caythorpe Under 15's win the Lincolnshire Youth League Seniors increase their dominance of Division 2 of the Lincoln & District League

As the last Issue of News & Views went to press, Caythorpe senior Cricketers were defeating Waddington by a huge margin. Batting first, Caythorpe amassed 308 runs for 6 wickets in their allocated 40 Overs. The scoring was led by opening bat Chris Wharmby, with 112 runs, and by Joe Attlewell who made 72. Aaron Charlesworth scored 51 and Joe Dickinson added 37.

Waddington replied with just 72 runs. Dan Pinfold was the pick of our Bowlers, taking 4 wickets for only 3 runs from 6.5 overs. Alex Dickinson and Jamie Watson collected two each, whilst Owen Fitzgerald took 1 wicket for 14 runs from 10 Overs.

Caythorpe's next fixture was against Blankney, who had previously inflicted Caythorpe's only defeat of the year so far. No problem this time! In a very competitive game Caythorpe scored 150 runs for 9 Wickets, but Blankney managed only 115 in reply, being All Out in 35 Overs. For Caythorpe, leading batsmen were the young Dickinson Brothers, Joe with 25 and Alex scoring 19. When bowling Dan Pinfold took 3 wickets, Alex and Jamie again took 2 each. Chris Wharmby and Joe Dickinson collected one scalp a piece.

A wet weekend followed, and the game in Lincoln against Old Lincolnian's was abandoned without a ball bowled.

After a weekend without a fixture scheduled, Caythorpe then hosted Bassingham. Bassingham chose to bat first, and on a day when bowlers were on top scored just 108 runs. Alex and Joe Dickinson and Dan Pinfold each took 3 wickets. In a nervy reply Caythorpe advanced to 67 runs for 2 wickets before losing four quick wickets leaving us on 81 for 6. Youngsters Alex Dickinson (20) and Jack Butler (12) then steadied the ship, enjoying an undefeated partnership of 28 runs to see Caythorpe to victory, their eleventh of the summer.

With 4 matches left to play, Caythorpe have a lead of 61 points in the League Table, which they have led throughout the season.

Our Under 15's should have played 8 matches, but one was lost to weather and in another Boston conceded (which counted as a Caythorpe win). Of the 6 matches played, we were victorious in 5 losing only to Grantham. Grantham's record was identical, they lost only one game - to Caythorpe! The League title was then decided on run-rate, which saw our Team take the Trophy. Since the Under 15's now move out of Youth Cricket it was a satisfying finish for their Junior careers.

The Under 13's played a Friendly Match against Ickleford, of Hitchen, Hertfordshire. Caythorpe were defeated, but put up a good showing - despite two Players being absent on holiday, and two having to withdraw due to Covid which meant we had to include four younger players.

Ickleford presented Trophies to three of our Players for their performances in the game. Captain Heath Malavuso-Low was nominated Best Bowler, Joe Lilley our Best Batsman, and Andrea Kiddle was named Best Fielder.

The pleasant afternoon finished with a free barbecue and ice-creams for all the players. Coming from a built-up suburban area, their coaches and parents commented very favourably on our beautiful tree-lined ground, the like of which they never see in their League.

In & Around The Garden

The erratic weather over the last few weeks may have been a nuisance to holidaymakers, but the garden plants seem quite happy with it. The total rainfall hasn't been particularly high, and beneath the surface the soil is only just damp. This suits most of my plants, however, as they tolerate drought quite well and hate having permanently wet feet. The first heleniums and agapanthus are giving a great show. Unfortunately it seems to suit the slugs as well, and several hostas that haven't been much damaged in previous years are now quite holey. The blackbirds seem to prefer berries to slugs, and have eaten most of my boysenberries. They are not very successful as biological controls, so it will be back to using slug pellets next year, I suppose.

Some years ago I terraced a steeply sloping bank with gravel boards, but now they are starting to rot. I had some rocks from an old stone wall, and decided to use those instead. All was going well until I needed to cut back some Michaelmas daisies to place the last two stones. Suddenly I was surrounded by wasps that had made a nest, unknown to me, in an old mouse hole in the



daisy patch. They evidently took a dim view of my hacking away with a mattock so close to their home. Luckily, they didn't seem to be common wasps, but a smaller, less aggressive species that I haven't managed to identify. Whatever they are, they didn't sting me, but I'll wait until later to finish the stonework.

The muntjac that has been in the area now has a youngster, and the two of them have been quite destructive. We closed off a space in the fence with some trellis, which seemed to keep them out, but then I found the fawn alone at the end of the garden. I followed it at a distance to see where it was going to escape, and could hardly believe my eyes when it jumped through the trellis. The spaces are just 6 ½ inches square! The trellis is now covered with 2 inch clematis net, which should do the trick – I hope.



Part of the verge along the High Dyke is an SSSI, but it suffers from having a footpath along the centre and being misused by wheeled vehicles. Last winter it looked a mess, churned up and muddy. Nature has re-asserted itself, however, and although there are still a few ruts the grass is long and filled with wild flowers in purple, lilac, yellow and white. There were butterflies and bees there too, and I could hear grasshoppers. In one of the wheel ruts there was a flat and smelly mink, indicating recent traffic but also

suggesting that there must be small mammals living on the site as well. With so much meadow land lost to the plough, these little wild spaces are valuable, and it is regrettable that they are treated with so little respect. **JA**

Caythorpe & District Garden Society

Trevor Rogers, our speaker for August, is distressed by the number of badly pruned trees and shrubs he sees when out and about. As a result he is on a mission to persuade garden owners to improve both their skills and their plants. He is particularly critical of men attempting 'a jolly good cut back'. Assuming his audience had no knowledge at all, he gave us a summary of the essentials of good pruning and what to avoid.

His first rule was to buy good quality tools: secateurs for small branches and loppers or a proper pruning saw for larger ones. They need to be cleaned between plants to avoid spreading disease. He told us how to distinguish between small, flattened growth buds and fatter fruiting buds. Pruning cuts need to be made to slope away from growth buds or side shoots, as these will be where new growth will start. Cuts made elsewhere will leave a stub that will die back and allow fungi or bacteria to gain a foothold. Timing is the other important factor, and he encouraged checking out the best time for a particular plant before starting. Stone fruits must be pruned in summer to avoid silver leaf disease. Most others are pruned in winter, but trained trees, such as cordons and espaliers, are best done in late summer to limit regrowth. If it still looks like a well shaped tree or shrub after pruning, you will have succeeded, but give it some fertiliser to finish the job. His final piece of advice was to have a go: most plants will survive inexpert pruning.

'Tango in the Night' by Fleetwood Mac Album Review by Ben Elmes

The 1987 studio album 'Tango in the Night' by Fleetwood Mac, is an example of a record that has stood the test of time and can be revered today as one of the classics of 80s rock music. The album reached number 1 in the UK album charts and remained there for five weeks. Much of the track list makes exceptional use of singer – Christine McVie's majestic vocal melodies; one moment where this is demonstrated would be one of the



standout songs on the album, 'Everywhere'. However, the project would not retain the same memorability that it does, without its distinct, trademark use of instrumentation. Mindbending guitar solos are ever present on this album, due to the work of lead guitarist – Lindsey Buckingham; a prime example of this can be found towards the end the introduction track, 'Big Love'. The synthesisers on the album have a distinguishable 1980s feel to them. They are incorporated perfectly on the biggest hit to come from the record, 'Little Lies'. Combining this with McVie's captivating vocals, as well as some high-quality vocal harmonies from Stevie Nicks in the chorus, results in the best song the album offers, which is no small feat given the project's consistency. 'Little Lies' peaked at number five on the UK singles charts and at number four on the US Billboard charts.

To conclude, 'Tango in the Night' is a great example of a classic 80s rock album and to this day is widely considered as some of Fleetwood Mac's most legendary work. **Score: 9.6 / 10**

Caythorpe & Frieston Parish Council

A Quick Overview from the Chairman of the Parish Council

Well hello everyone, it's been sometime since I've posted a report on behalf of the Parish Council, here we are in the September 2021 issue with our latest report. We are all now subject to normal life, as it appears to be, with restrictions being lifted and, hopefully, common sense being applied. The trouble is with common sense, it's not very common! I'm sure we will all look out for each other and apply our best behaviour to make sure we all stay safe.

Since our last article the Parish Council has been very busy, we are now attending meetings every other month in the Village Hall. We are no longer having video meetings, which is good as it means we can have better discussions and a more democratic decision-making process. We have welcomed Councillor Becky Hall onto the council as a replacement for Councillor Roger Brooke, who resigned in March. Thank you, Roger, for all your hard work and welcome Becky who has taken over Rogers portfolio's of Planning and the Representative on the Village Hall Committee. Already Becky has been active in handling and dealing with planning issues for our community.

All of the portfolio holders have been busy. We have been establishing on your behalf, for future Parish Council's and committee's information, the ownership of the Playing Field and Village Hall. Our solicitors have confirmed that they are both owned by the Parish Council as custodian trustees. It is the committees of each facility that actually carry out the day-to-day running and decisions for each respective premises. This is how I'm sure we would all prefer it. We are waiting for the legal process to go through so we can keep the records safe and there should be no confusion in the future.

We are looking into some environmental projects. Through our portfolio holder Andy Crawley, we are investigating having public electric vehicle charging points within the community. We are currently looking for locations for these in conjunction with Western Power, Lincolnshire County Council and South Kesteven District Council. We are currently looking at Grant sponsorship.

Andy is also heading a tree planting campaign, where we will plant a great number of trees around our community. Some members of the community have also volunteered to grow the saplings from seed which will mean truly homegrown trees. Andy has also chased up the current owners of the battery electrical storage system (BESS) just behind Mid UK on Caythorpe Heath Lane. They are going to re-plant the trees and shrubs in the autumn that was originally planted but have died so that area so that area will look really nice once these have been established.

Later on in the month we will be having a SKDC Community BIG CLEAN team coming in to carry out tasks such as keeping the footpaths clear, weeds removed. They do this every year, but they only work within the 30 mile an hour limit. If you have any ideas of the areas that you would like them to tackle, please contact Andy Crawley. He can be contacted andy.crawley-caythorpepc@outlook.com if you want to drop him any suggestions.

Colette Linforth, our community heartbeat portfolio holder, has been really active and we have now, at last, found a location for the defibrillator in Frieston, on Hough Road. A kindly Resident offered to locate it on his gatepost and installed the wiring to enable it to have a permanent electrical supply. So thank you very much for that very community spirited decision. The defibrillators have been used on a number of occasions to good effect and positive outcomes so we are really pleased that we now have four active defibrillators placed around our community. Just to remind you where they are, there is one at the Pavilion on old Lincoln Road, one on Chapel Lane on the old Methodist Church building on the junction with Back Lane, one on the wall at the Village Hall and of course recently placed one on Hough Road in Frieston. Should you need to use a defibrillator cabinet, they will also ensure medical assistance is on the way.

Councillor Jean Allen and a number of volunteers from within the community have been working on our neighbourhood plan. There is an article elsewhere in this News and Views giving more detail on what the neighbourhood plan is about. In short if we have a proper neighbourhood plan that is communicated to everybody and people have been able to have an input, we are in a much stronger position when making decisions about the future of our community for planning and development. It's really important that everybody completes their survey and sends it back. Just to reiterate what Jean already has stated, it is not one survey per household but one per person!!! One group that we are really struggling to get responses from are the younger members of our community. The work with the neighbourhood plan will assist us in developing our parish for these young people when they come to take over and be the decision-makers for the parish, so the work we do now is the foundations for a stronger community tomorrow. So please, please if you haven't already filled-in a questionnaire for the neighbourhood plan you can either do this in hardcopy, you can do it online https://smartsurvey.co.uk/s/CAYFRI or visit our Facebook page to get the link, there is also a link to the survey through the village website https://caythorpe.parish.lincolnshire.gov.uk/. Please badger the people that you know if you've already completed yours and they haven't. It's important that we get them to complete the survey form so we get a good response. As I write that the response from our community is around 200, so we could do with a lot more. So please get your pens out or your fingers going on the Internet and complete the survey. It only takes about ten minutes and your input will be invaluable.

We are having a tree survey completed of all the trees on Parish Council land. This includes the playing field and the upper and lower greens at Frieston to make sure the trees in good health. We will commission any work that's required to keep them safe. If you see people staring at trees and making notes, it is our tree specialist who is carrying out that assessment.

We have also had new gates fitted at the burial ground along with the pathway being renewed so that looks really good now and the allotments have had trees and hedging cut back so that they can really get the Allotments productive but as you can imagine its an ongoing job.

We are working with SKDC to find out about their social housing policy how it works and if we can make some allocations for people from the Parish, this is in a very early stage at the minute as there is lots of legislation to plough through.

The Gala is taking place this year but this week I received a telephone call from Warrant Officer Andy Dunn, to inform us that the parachute regiment will not be attending. Sadly, the reason for this is that the regiment has been active around the globe and also crewing vaccination centres and testing centres. They feel it would be irresponsible to come into a small community and if they were to spread the COVID19 amongst the community, it would be a disaster and threaten the future of any attendance at the Gala's. They will have representation at the church service on the Sunday morning, but there will be a no march from the Waggon and Horses car park to the church. The service will be attended by officers from the regiment, they do hope we understand and would like to be back next year in full strength. The Veterans, however, will be visiting the village under their own volition to be part of the Arnhem Celebrations.

Members of the Gala Organisation will be selling Raffle tickets around the village, knocking door to door, you'll maybe see me on Old Lincoln Road!

That's quite a bit from the Parish Council for this article so please enjoy the Gala this year, complete your neighbourhood survey form and we look forward to supporting you in the forthcoming months.

Can I therefore, on behalf of the Parish Council, request that if you have bushes or trees or other vegetation on your property adjacent to a public footpath that could potentially (or are at present) growing out over that footpath, that you trim this vegetation back, keeping the path clear for residents to use without obstruction? I have seen that many of you are already doing this, and your efforts are both noted and appreciated. We are fortunate to live in an area with so much greenery, but it should be incumbent upon us all to maintain this to ensure it does not present a hazard to users of our village footpath.

Not from the Rectory

A month in which the Rector went into retreat!

No – the Rector has not been playing war games but finding the time, as required by the Bishop, to spend time on retreat as part of his Continuing Ministerial Education. The choice of Mirfield – home to the Community of the Resurrection – in Calderdale was obvious as it is easy to reach from Grantham with a train to Doncaster and the onward Grand Central train to Mirfield via Wakefield Kirkgate. The outward journey takes the same route as the LNER train to Leeds as far as Crofton when the GC train slips off to the right and weaves its way into Wakefield's Kirkgate station and then proceeds west under the Doncaster/Leeds line to enter the Calder Valley at Horbury.







From Mirfield station a short taxi ride takes the visitor the two miles or so up the valley side to the retreat house on Stocksbank Road where I was admitted and given free range of the beautiful and extensive gardens and pass code to get into the stunning chapel.

The Community of the Resurrection traces its roots back to St James's Day [25th July] 1892 when six Anglican priests founded a religious community at Pusey House [Oxford] under the leadership of Charles Gore and they followed him to the rectory at Radley when he became Rector there. Very soon however their strong sense of vocation for parishioners living in the industrial north led them in 1898 to look for their new home and so they came to Mirfield. Alongside the Community there are ordinands training for the Anglican ministry and the College joins the community each day for prayer and worship – and there is a ready welcome for priests looking to re-charge their spiritual batteries spending time in retreat!

The gardens overlook the Calder Valley and as you sit in the shade of a tree you can hear sounds of industry as well as of nature and look across to the south side of the valley and to farmland.

You may have seen something of the community as it featured on Songs of Praise recently for Pentecost Sunday on BBC's Songs of Praise and if you missed it is still available.

The return train takes a longer route from Wakefield Kirkgate northeast to Pontefract before turning sharply south at Knottingley and taking what my 1976 Bartholomew map describes as a 'Goods Line' south via Askern to join the East Coast Main Line somewhere north of Doncaster where a change from the GC train to an LNER train is necessary as the GC's next stop is London King's Cross!
