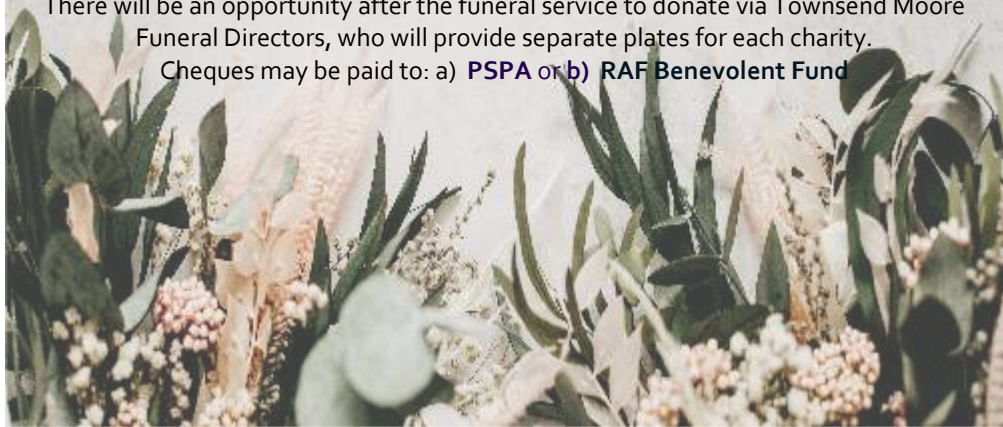

Welcome Back

I hope you have all had a fantastic summer holiday and are ready for another busy and exciting year at Caythorpe School! It was lovely to see you all and welcome new families to the school. The children have come back to school refreshed and ready to learn looking extremely smart in their school uniforms. We are delighted that some of our routines have been able to be reinstated to help the children find some normality. We have

enjoyed lunchtimes, playtimes and assemblies together for the foreseeable future, unless national or local restrictions change.

We also welcome new members of staff to the Caythorpe team. Miss Roswell will be teaching in Hogwarts our Year 5 and 6 and Mrs Gilbert will be teaching in Neverland our Year 1 and 2 class. We also welcome Teaching Assistants Mrs Denby and Mrs Elmes who will be mainly working with children in Enchanted Forest. I am really looking forward to sharing lots of exciting adventures with you all over the coming year.

Whole School Topic

When we welcome the children back after Summer, we always begin with a whole school topic. This year it was "Save The Planet!" Children in Enchanted Forest looked at what made a happy planet Earth and what made a sad planet.



Neverland became eco superheroes! With the help of the book '10 Things I can do to help my world' they found out about ways that we can help to save the planet. They have been busy litter picking around school, had lots of fun making bird feeders and even planted some seeds so they can grow plants to help clean the air. They have also been finding out about plastic in the oceans and climate change and discovered lots of things we can do at home because every little bit helps!

Big Bangs

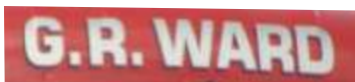

Our first meeting following the Gala on the 4th was more like the “normal” meetings we have become used to, in that, we had a speaker! We are fortunate to have members with a wealth of life experience and knowledge which we really ought to utilise more often and on this occasion, we did.

Caythorpe & District Garden Society

Our speaker for September was Paul Cook, curator of the RHS garden Harlow Carr, Harrogate. This most northerly of the RHS gardens was started by the Northern Horticultural Society, which merged with the RHS about 20 years ago. Paul has been its curator since 2013, looking after the 58 acre site. The conditions are very different from the other RHS gardens, having a heavy, sticky, acid clay soil and a colder climate with snow in most winters. It is therefore ideal for its original purpose of seeing which garden plants can be grown outdoors reliably in the north of England. Today tests continue, with groups of plants put through their paces each year. Some will have gained an Award of Garden Merit already, but will not necessarily do well at Harlow Carr.

The gardens are constantly changing as planting go past their best. The streamside borders are sometimes washed away by heavy rain that funnels into the water course, so their maintenance is a challenge. One of the most successful recent innovations is the winter walk, which is bright with coloured stemmed shrubs and early bulbs and perennials in the coldest months. A new alpine area is planned on a slope near the alpine house, re-using stone from an earlier rock garden. Paul’s enthusiastic talk was beautifully illustrated with photographs of the garden. With so many new things to see it would be well worth a visit, even if you have been before.

Our October meeting will be on Tuesday 12th, 7:30pm for 7:45pm at Carlton Scroop Village Hall. Russ Yates will give a talk entitled ‘Winter Wonderland’. In & Around The Garden

As I write we have just had the first useful amount of rain since early August. At just 11mm, less than half an inch, it wasn't the deluge shown on the weather forecast, but most of the plants that really seemed to be suffering have perked up. The problem with a drought at this time of the year is that some plants are naturally dying back, and this is difficult to distinguish from simply dying. I won't know for certain until spring.

When it comes to survival in difficult conditions, microclimate is everything. The same variety of helenium looks fine at the edge of the bed shaded by a wall, and in the open in sun where there are no trees. The clump that is over the roots of a magnolia, on the other hand, was on its last legs. Regular watering is not really an option – I'm getting too old to lug a watering can very far, and too mean to use the hose very often- so I'm planning to replace the latter clump with something more drought resistant for next year.

September is changeover time in the borders. The Michaelmas daisies are coming into bloom in shades ranging from white, through blue, to deep purple. There is also a deep red one, 'Royal Ruby', not quite so vigorous as the others, but well worth the space. The Japanese anemones are also looking good. I particularly like the tall white 'Honorine Jobert', which shines in shade. Miscanthus 'Adagio' a short form of elephant grass, has started to open its feathery plumes, which will stay on the plant even as the foliage dies to a pleasant buff colour for winter.



I've noticed that there are fewer bumble bees around now, as the colonies die off and the young queens hibernate until next year. I usually disturb some when I empty the leaf mould bin, and last year I found them in a pile of old turves that I had been saving to make loam. This summer I took up a bit more turf to make a path, and it is stacked at the end of the garden. I won't take it for loam, though, but leave it for the bees. Honey bees are more in evidence. They come and go with the flowering of their favourite

plants and *Sedum (Hylotelephium) spectabile*, a large succulent ice plant just coming into bloom, is a bee magnet when the sun comes out. It would also be a good choice to replace that helenium.

Out for a walk, I noticed some of those strange woolly growths know as Robin's pincushion, on a wild rose in a hedge. They are caused by a gall wasp which lays its eggs in a leaf bud. The larvae that hatch from the eggs cause the abnormal growth, which has a hard centre in which they develop, pupate and overwinter. It doesn't seem to harm the host plant – just another quirk of nature. **JA**

Throughout July LCC Highways carried out a public consultation for a series of no-waiting parking restrictions on High Street. Not from the Rectory

A month in which the rector wanders between Essex and Suffolk

For many years the greatest pleasure on receiving the 'Church Times' newspaper on a Friday was turning immediately to the back page and reading the short article 'Word from Wormingford' written by the writer Ronald Blythe [Akenfield – Portrait of an English Village 1969].

Ronald Blythe was [is] a Reader serving three small Church of England parishes on the very northern edge of Essex where the River Stour marks the boundary with neighbouring Suffolk and for almost as many years as I read his weekly articles, I have wanted to visit this part of the country.

The opportunity came in the summer when I had a few nights in Suffolk at Ipswich: the London Liverpool Street train took me through Colchester to Mark's Tey where there is a traditional branch line serving Sudbury via Chappel and Wakes Colne and Bures and the railway line runs more or less along the line of the River Stour which it repeatedly crosses so that one minute you may be in Essex and the next in Suffolk.

The branch line proclaims itself as the 'Gainsborough Line' offering a delightful railway journey through landscape straight off a Constable painting crossing the 32 arch Chappel viaduct, with its station home to the East Anglian Railway Museum, through Bures and entering Sudbury through Great and Little Cornard – familiar to us from Martin Shaw's tune 'Little Cornard' to which we sing the hymn 'Hills of the north'.

The specific aim of the journey was to get off at Bures: the station is in Essex and has its own church at Mount St Bures but I was headed across the county boundary – stopping first at the village deli to sample a slice of their cheesecake – to the village and church of Bures St Mary. Here I encountered in the porch a small wooden box containing everything necessary for a 'pilgrim passport' in the shape of an ink stamp marked for the Stour Valley Trail and an ink pad while inside the church there is the Waldegrave Chantry with the children kneeling in prayer commemorating a William Waldegrave who died in the early 17th century.

The Greater Anglia trains run every hour so I decided to catch the next train the few miles to the next station at Chappel & Wakes Colne where I ate my lunch and looked around and glimpsed the Diesel Rail Bus acquired from the North Norfolk Railway [built in 1958 by Waggon and Maschinenbau] and pulling the levers in the signal box too!

Well, all too soon, my hour was up and it was time to take train back to Mark's Tey and catch the main line train back to Ipswich crossing at Manning Tree for one final time the Stour where the river widens out into the estuary which will join with the Orwell at Shotley and flow into the North Sea between Felixstowe and Harwich – and we really didn't mean to go to sea!

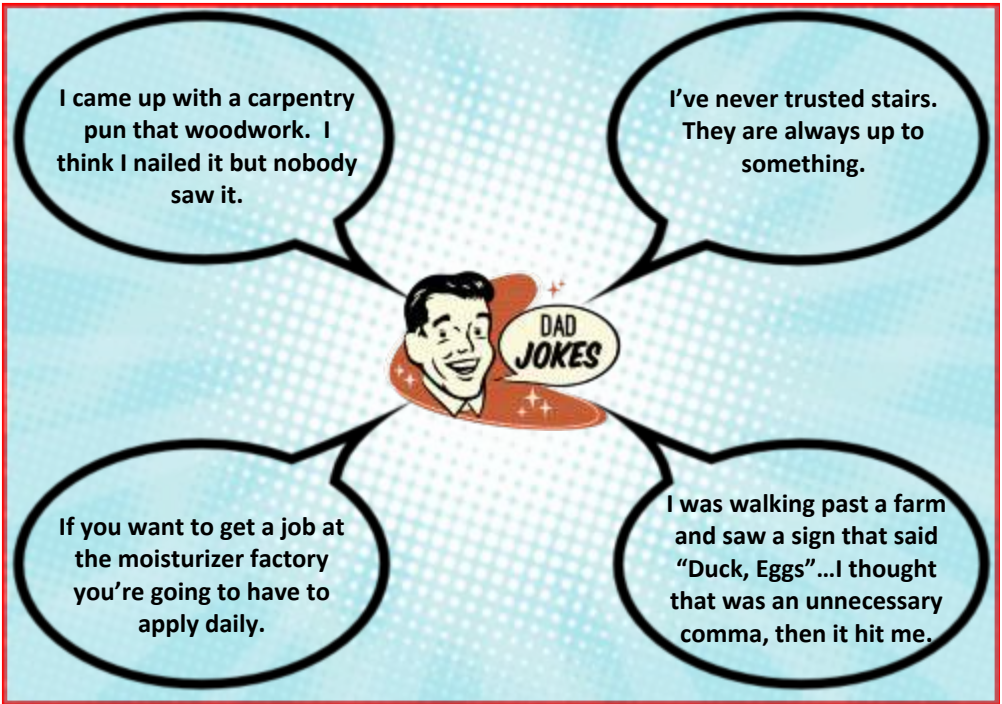
