



together as a team with their heads held high. We are so proud of how the boys have represented the school in competitions this academic year. We are now focussing on the league and any other tournament opportunities. The whole team represented the school fantastically. Well done to you all.

KS1 Dodgeball

Last week Tom from Carre's Grammar Outreach visited to introduce some of our year 1 and 2 children to the game of dodgeball. This was a change to our planned activity with other schools to reduce the risk of the spread of Covid. Dodgeball is an exciting game in which players on two teams try to throw soft sponge like balls to hit opponents, while avoiding being hit themselves. The objective is to eliminate all members of the opposing team by hitting them with thrown balls, catching a ball thrown by an opponent.

KS1 Cricket Festival

Isla, Chloe, Henry, Jack, Max, Charlie, Ellen and Mehrimah attended the KS1 cricket festival last Friday. It was held at the M.A.C centre at Nocton and organised by CGS and Lincolnshire All Stars Cricket. The children took part in skills-based activities including bowling over arm and batting. They applied their skills in challenges and games. Mrs Hunt was impressed with how quickly the children picked up the skills of holding the bat correctly and their accuracy in bowling to the cricket stumps.

All Stars Cricket clubs are held at Caythorpe Cricket club, providing a fantastic first experience for all children aged 5-8 years old where they're guaranteed 8 weeks of jam-packed fun, activity and skills development. The programme is designed to introduce children to the sport, teaching them new skills, helping them make new friends and have a great time doing so. Every child that registers will receive a backpack full of goodies. Your child's pack will include: Backpack, cricket ball, cricket ball and a Personalised t-shirt with your child's name All children returning to All Stars will receive a kit bag, a set of stumps, a new ball and a personalised t-shirt.

Awesome Homework Projects

The children have made a fantastic effort with homework projects this half term. In Hogwarts the children have been learning "What did the Mayan's do for us?" Much of the homework shared had a chocolate theme, much to Mrs Bennett's delight!

Sam built a Mayan temple. Noah created a persuasive poster for people to visit Chichenitza. Harry, Lewey-Fynn and Hayden created some tasty treats using the Mayan special ingredient of cocoa (chocolate!) Thank you for sharing your delicious homework too.

Barney was astounded to learn that the Mayan's currency was chilli and cocoa beans. George thought the most interesting fact was that they were the first people to make hot chocolate. Finley and Maya were fascinated by their writing. The Mayans wrote as pictures and symbols called logograms to make up words, they read these in zig-zags. On Thursday the children made tortillas using maize flour with Mrs Locke.

Children in Narnia thoroughly enjoyed this term's topic "What makes the Earth angry?" They learnt about natural disasters including tornadoes, volcanic eruptions and tsunamis.

Isabella produced two amazing projects. One explaining why and how we should save our planet and an incredibly detailed volcanic eruption using glue and glitter for the lava pouring down the volcano and demolishing the houses below. The children studied the devastating effect of Mount Vesuvius erupting and how it caused the city of Pompeii to be covered in volcanic ash. They wrote some fabulous newspaper reports to recount what happened on that eventful day. Well done to you all, we love seeing what you have been doing at home to support your learning in school.



The Film Review By Him and Her



Him: Well, what can I say about 'Belfast'... It's a fine film that's for sure, telling the story of the start of 'The Troubles' from the microcosm of one family's life and struggles, showing how normal life continued during the most extraordinary of times.

Can I say it blew my mind, or transported me away to another world...not quite, but it fell very close. The acting was absolute top notch, with characters extremely well portrayed and the essence of the dour economic times pours through in every frame. While it was certainly uplifting, it was hard to put myself in their shoes to really feel it, especially as the main crux of the family's struggle, whether to stay or leave Belfast, seems an anathema in modern day terms with our knowledge of the decades that followed. The underlying message of the film shows us how close to home these events were and the hard desperate decisions being made by so many, while also showing us how little things have changed, especially on the things that divide otherwise close knit communities and how we are drawn to focus more on what divides us, than on what unites us. One theme is how the common man has far more interest in living a peaceful life, to live and let live, while others with more cynical agendas strive for division and their own gain. My analysis there is far more political than the film is by the way, it's much more rooted in family, love, loss and redemption, it's a great film, with an incredible cast, which I thoroughly enjoyed. It will be among the winners at award shows for sure, but falls short of being an all time great for me. 3/5 ★★★☆☆

Her: Jamie Dornan and Judi Dench headline this film which is based upon Director Kenneth Brannagh's own childhood experience. The story is that of a young family caught up in fighting in Belfast at the start of 'The Troubles' and follows the decision of whether to make a move to London where the father is working. The star of the show has to be the young chap you see in the photo, Jude Hill, who does an excellent job of portraying 'Buddy'. The film is screened in black and white throughout and adds to the authenticity; arguably the wardrobe would not have been so convincing in colour. I, for one, am used to seeing 1960's images presented in B&W and again this added to the artistic representation. Although I managed to stay awake through the whole film (I'm terrible at doing that) it wasn't something I'd choose to watch again. I did enjoy watching a small part of history on the big screen and the combination of poignancy with the importance of family really was top notch. It was an excellent start to my cinematic experiences of 2022 and I'd certainly encourage anyone to go and see it. 3/5 ***

Theo's Pancake Day Bakery

If you like a Cinnamon Swirl Danish pastry you're going to love these Cinnamon Swirl American Style Pancakes....get in my belly now!! You could even top with a little bit of maple syrup and a few chopped pecans for some extra decadence...



Ingredients

145g SR flour
1tsp baking powder
1tbsp caster sugar
1tsp cinnamon
2 eggs
40g melted butter
140ml milk
1 tbsp maple syrup
3 tbsp light brown sugar
Vegetable oil for frying

How to make these little beauties!

- 1. Put the flour, caster sugar, ½ the cinnamon, baking powder in a bowl and stir together before making a well in the middle and placing the eggs and ½ of the butter inside it. Mix together slowly, adding the milk a little at a time until combined into a thick gloopy consistency.
- 2. Place the remainder of the cinnamon and butter into a bowl with the light brown sugar and maple syrup then add a little of the pancake batter to the mixture. You'll need to squeeze this mixture onto the part cooked pancakes so place into either a piping bag or one of those squeezy bottles if you have one.
- 3. Heat a frying pan with a little oil then on a medium heat place a blob of your mixture...it's your pancake you can decide how big!! Once you've placed your batter into the pan make a cinnamon swirl on top of the pancake with the mixture in your piping bag. Wait for bubbles to form on top of the pancake and the edges to brown before flipping over to cook the other side. Take out the pan and enjoy either hot or cold with extra maple syrup and pecans of you fancy them!

Theo's Mother's Day Bakery

This month Theo has been busy cooking up a Lemon Meringue Pie with a Lemon Bar especially for a special Mothers Day Treat. See below for the recipe and step by step guide to rustling up this little beauty!



Lemon Meringue Pie

Ingredients

225g ready to roll pastry

50g corn flour

300ml cold water

Zest and juice of 3 lemons

75g caster sugar

2 egg yolks

Lemon Meringue Pie Top

Ingredients

2 egg whites 110g caster sugar

Lemon Bar Shortbread Base

50g butter

50g plain flour 30g caster sugar Ingredients

1 egg

120g caster sugar

Lemon Bar Top

Lemon zest

Juice of 3 lemons

50g plain flour

1tbsp cornflour

For the Lemon Meringue Pie

- 1. Take pastry from wrapper and line a 8" flan tin and blind bake at 170°c until golden.
- 2. Mix the cornflour with a little water into a cream. Heat the rest of the water, lemon zest and juice, stir in the cornflour and bring to the boil stirring all the time. Cook for a couple of minutes then leave to cool a little. Once slightly cooled stir in the eggs and sugar and poor into the pastry case.
- 3. Whisk the egg whites until stiff then add in half the sugar little by little. Fold in the remainder to maintain the air. Spread over the filling and bake for 20 minutes at 130°c or until the meringue topping is slightly browned. Leave to cool before serving (or not!).

For the Lemon Bar

- Mix all of the shortbread ingredients together and place in a small tin, bake for 20 minutes at 120°c.
- 2. Mix the lemon and cornflour together then add the egg, caster sugar, plain flour and zest. Add it to the top of the shortbread and bake for 15-30 minutes at 160°c. Pop the finished bar into the fridge for 20 minutes, sprinkle with icing sugar and serve with the lemon meringue pie!





Dear All,

As I write this it is already February half term and spring has sprung a little thank goodness!

We've had a few busy weeks learning about Winter and the different weather we experience at this time of year. We have seen what happens to ice as it melts and talked about the people and animals who live in cold climates. The children learnt about the effects of the wind as they lay down and watched the clouds move across the sky.

They made bird feeders to hang in their gardens and took home a bird survey to do during the half term.

We have been encouraging the children to become a little more independent in our daily routine, including putting on their own coats, hats and gloves before we go outside to play. They particularly enjoyed chasing the bubbles.

The children have been sharing stories with their families. Every week they choose a book from our library to take home. We have explained how they need to look after the books and return them to Pre-School. This is good practice for when they eventually go to big school, as well as encouraging a love of reading and sharing books both in the setting and at home.

We had a great time working together to make our Dragon for Chinese New Year. It took us a few days to paint and cover with brightly coloured sweet wrappers but in the end it looked fabulous and the boys and girls were very proud of their creation. Quite a lot of Quality Street was consumed (not by the children!) to provide the resources required for this task. All in a good cause of course!

We have welcomed new children to the setting including quite a few 2 year olds who have settled really well and who keep us on our toes and entertained! History Today

From the Caythorpe Archives by Andy Roberts

In the early 1900's a local M.P. Colonel Royd owned Holy Cross House at Caythorpe, a 16th century farm house, situated where Holy Cross Gardens are now. However, by 1966 the house had fallen into disrepair and the decision was taken to demolish the building. The bulldozer driver said the 'the building was tougher than we first thought'.

The house was reputed to be haunted. A previous resident said that it was on a bright moonlit night as she was going up the stairs she saw an old lady walking in front of her, the ghost glided along the corridor into a bedroom and disappeared. The informant said there was always lots of weird noises in the house like rattling doors, footsteps and bumps in the night. The legend was that in the 1800's Mrs Bowling was murdered in one of the bedrooms and she had haunted the house ever since. The ghost was known in the village as 'The Grey Lady'.

Before the house was demolished 2 Sleaford Standard reporters, a photographer and a poltergeist spent the night there, they subsequently reported that apart from the noise of rats nothing of a supernatural nature happened and suggested 'perhaps she's moved out'!



There are some brilliant days in March to celebrate a variety of different things (it's not just St David's & St Patrick's Day!) but what we'd like to know is.....WHO KNEW??

Piano Day - 29th Mar 2022 - A day for piano players and lovers to share the joy of the piano. It takes place on the 88th day of the year, for the number of keys on a piano.



In & Around The Garden



Signs of spring are everywhere, even though the weather is mostly windy and wet. Blackbirds and thrushes are singing to set up breeding territories, and I saw a blackcap in Caythorpe in mid February. More of these birds are overwintering in England now, so it might have been a resident, otherwise an early migrant.

Lots of bulbs are coming up, but although the weather has not been especially cold, sunny days have been in short supply and snowdrops are flowering later than usual. Some 'snowdrop days' in gardens open to the public have been delayed as a result. Crocuses and winter aconites are also keeping their flowers tightly closed – why bother to open when there are no pollinators about? Most of my hellebores are now in flower, and garden centres have plenty of them to persuade those starved of colour to open their wallets. I have long coveted my sister's 'Walburton's Rosemary', which doesn't set seed or respond well to division, so I haven't been able to scrounge a bit. However, I saw one for sale recently and may well succumb to temptation. This is the time of year to stop looking at seed catalogues and start sowing half-hardy annuals (HHAs). These are the plants that give a long and reliable performance in hanging baskets, tubs and borders, and provide vegetable fruits (tomatoes, cucumbers and their many relatives) in the summer. None of them are natives, but nevertheless provide nectar, pollen and (unfortunately) leaves, for a lot of invertebrates. Unlike hardy annuals, they cannot germinate in cool soil. Unless given a head start in a warm place they would start to grow too late in the season to put on much of a show before the cold weather, and none of them will withstand frost. Every year I ask myself why I bother with them, but nothing tastes quite as good as home grown tomatoes and courgettes, and I grow varieties rarely found in shops. This year I have bought seeds of an almost black cherry tomato, and a golden yellow courgette, both recommended for flavour. I don't do hanging baskets, but HHA flowers are useful to pop into tubs of perennial plants, and to fill gaps in borders. This year I have sown trailing lobelia and a deep pink cosmos, which should make an impact. I'm also looking out for plugs of non-stop begonias and Busy Lizzies, which require more expertise than I can muster to grow from seed, as they do well in partial shade.

In the countryside there are few signs of spring as yet. Hazel catkins are out, and a few crows are carrying sticks for nest building, but otherwise the trees and hedgerows are bare. I saw a miserable, damp buzzard perched in a roadside tree. With little chance of a thermal to get airborne, I suppose it was waiting for something to get run over and provide it with a meal, otherwise it will be earthworms for dianer again. JA

Caythorpe & District Garden Society

The first talk of 2022 was given by Karen Gimson, garden designer, writer and presenter on BBC Radio Leicester. Her subject, '365 Days of Colour in the Garden', was something gardeners aspire to, but do not always achieve. Karen designs mainly large gardens that employ full time gardeners and have demanding owners. Her brief is often to make a garden look spectacular for a special event, regardless of season, so a comprehensive knowledge of what looks good and is available at any time of year is an essential part of her skills.

Her year round plant recommendations are almost all reliable, hardy and readily available from nurseries and garden centres. She started the year with snowdrops and other early bulbs, hellebores and winter-flowering shrubs, many of which are strongly scented. More bulbs, including daffodils, tulips, alliums and Dutch iris, and also tree blossom, take the colour through spring to early summer. Roses, lilies, and perennials such as peonies and Astrantia flower next, followed by the classic high summer perennials. Many of the plants have interesting seed heads or flowers suitable for drying that provide material for late autumn and winter displays.

One technique Karen likes is to take a small, living plant, wrap the root ball in moss, and bind it with string. It can then be hung up or attached to a twig wreath as a decoration. Spraying the moss with water keeps it fresh. Something to try at home!

Our next meeting will be on March 8th, 7:30 for 7:45 at Carlton Scroop Village Hall. Visitors (£5) and new members (£20 for the year) welcome - just come along. Mark Schofield will be talking about 'Gardening with Wild Flowers'.

PUBLIC FOOTPATHS

I would like to write to you all with an update on the issue that many of you have been concerned about, concerning the status of the public footpaths in the Caythorpe/Frieston area. There was a clause in right-to-roam legislation introduced by the government in 2000 stated that any pre-1949 paths must be recorded by 1st January 2026 to continue to carry public rights. The Countryside and Rights of Way Act contained a provision that would extinguish those rights if the paths had not been properly recorded.

This deadline has **now been scrapped**. I would direct you to the article at the link below to more information:

Not from the Rectory

A month in which the Rector visits his wife's aunt in Hastings!

My father was both a loyal churchwarden and an enthusiastic member of a local amateur dramatic society and his love of playing in 'The Importance of Being Ernest' gave me a knowledge and love of this Oscar Wilde play too. Whatever homosexual overtones are now said to be hidden in the text, the play was enjoyed as written and so we are familiar with the 'need' for Algernon Moncrieff to visit his invalid friend Bunbury. It was Algernon's way of avoiding duties and responsibilities by inventing an invaluable permanent invalid called Bunbury, in order that he could go down into the country whenever he chose.

By way of contrast, we do have an elderly aunt in Hastings and we make regular trips to Hastings not to avoid duties and responsibilities but rather to embrace them!

It is a long way for a day trip with only about 5 hours in Hastings as however we book the outward train we can never arrive before midday. With foresight [advance booking] and a degree of luck there may be reasonably priced tickets in first class on the LNER or Hull Train to London King's Cross before we cross to London St Pancras and enjoy 'our daily bread' at Le Pain Quotidien looking up to the famous Dent clock which I learn is a replica of the original platform clock sold to an American collector for £250,000 in 1970 – except when it was being taken down the clock smashed into thousands of pieces which were sold to a retired train driver for £25!

Dents were commissioned to replace the clock which they did for £800 million, casting moulds from as many of the pieces as they could obtain from the former train driver!

Today the clock has the addition of words composed by Tracy Emin and which are meant to be a warm welcome for everyone travelling into a post-Brexit London from Europe 'I want my time with you' but which also conjures up being met by someone you love at a trainstation and as you embrace you hear these words 'I want my time with you'.



Romantic moment over it is time to head for the High-Speed South Eastern platforms [adjacent the Eurostar platforms] for a train heading to Dover or Deal via Ashford International for the connecting onward Southern train across the Kent Marsh to Hastings. These trains retain a small First-Class compartment which, as they de-classified their seating, is in fact available to us with our Standard Class ticket!

I love this route to Hastings passing through such lovingly

named stations as Ham and Appledore with a branch to Dungeness serving the power station] Rye and Winchelsea and crossing the Royal Military Canal constructed in the 19th century to keep the French out should they decide to invade - all the while keeping a look-out for the famous Romney Marsh sheep and hoping to glimpse the equally famous Grade 1 listed medieval Romney Marsh churches.



The train times allow for just a few hours with Judy's aunt high on the West Cliff over-looking the old town with the house occupied by DCS Foyle near the church of St Clement's though we have yet to see any filming of 'Foyle's War' or glimpse the lovely Sam Stewart [Honeysuckle Weeks] driving the Wolseley.

In no time at all we return to the town's train station and take the more direct though later line back to London via Tunbridge Wells turning away from the coastal line at the delightfully named 'Bo-Peep' Junction and climbing steadily to Battle and the site of the Battle of Hastings in 1066!

The line descends in the valley of the River Rother which it crosses at Robertsbridge - which hopes once more to operate as the junction for trains through to Bodiam and Tenterden – before climbing to the line's second summit at Wadhurst set in the High Wealden landscape of small valleys and wooded hillsides. The line now drops through Tunbridge Wells to Tonbridge before heading into the capital where we will leave the train at London Bridge for the connecting Thameslink service to St Pancras for King's Cross and the homeward bound onward train to Grantham.

The journey is a great opportunity to read as well as to observe; perhaps though on this occasion we should take our cue from Lady Bracknell's daughter, Gwendolen Fairfax - I never travel without my diary. One should always have something sensational to read on the train!

Dear News & Views - A future article about our local bus services?

Following the Villages Plan Consultation, I wondered if the News & Views could run an article about the bus service available to our villages. In particular because there are misunderstandings about the Call Connect bus service, who is eligible to use it and how to access it. I know this from my personal experience, after losing my driving licence due to epilepsy. Many people think it is only available to older people or those with various health challenges, however it is a public service available to anyone. Look-up Call Connect Bus service online.

The Call Connect bus service can travel to places the general Grantham to Lincoln bus does not access, including Sleaford and Newark. For myself on one occasion I travelled from Caythorpe to Heckington to attend a family christening. Bus passes can be used in the same way as on the Stagecoach service

From an ecological perspective, I wonder if many people just tend to jump in their vehicle for what they presume is convenience without even thinking of the journey as a whole. The cost of parking can high and not always helpful to where you want to be.

Think it might be really helpful to run an article about this, particularly with eco in mind as well, and maybe have a pull-out time table for our Lincoln to Grantham stagecoach bus service which also stops right outside the Grantham train station, perfect for your weekend trip to London. 
