Synopsis: A couple desperately try to hide their daughter, Charlie, from a shadowy federal agency that wants to harness her unprecedented gift for turning fire into a weapon of mass destruction. Her father taught her how to defuse her power, but as Charlie turns 11, the fire becomes harder and harder to control. When a mysterious operative finally finds the family, he tries to seize Charlie once and for all -- but she has other plans.

Him: If you like a traditional Stephen King type thriller, then Firestarter is the film for you, Traditional in length, 90 minutes - traditional in format – 30 minutes set up story, 30 minutes build up and 30 minutes conclusion - traditional for a Stephen King Film altogether....blink and you might think you are watching an updated but younger version of 'Carrie'.

The Acting is good quality, Zac Efron as the father especially so. 'Charlie' The Daughter and protagonist 'Firestarter' of the title is played very well by Ryan Kiera Armstrong, and there is a smattering of other cameo roles of actors who you will recognise from other films and TV shows, so it's a positive tick on that front.

It's traditional (there's that word again...) Stephen King fare, supernatural powers, shadowy antagonists out to get their hands on it and use if for their own nefarious ends. The usual thriller style of pursuit and chase scenes and peril ensues, culminating in the inevitable showdown with it's twists and turns that you would expect of the thriller genre...while enjoyable and exciting, I was left wanting more.

Her: A different genre this month but one which kept me happily entertained. I thought the characters lacked depth with the back story not lending itself to any really meaningful information other than how the parents ended up with 'super powers' although not explaining the 'Firestarters' power. Saying that, I enjoyed the performances of Zac Efron and Ryan Keira Armstrong. I felt that the film needed to be that little bit longer as with half an hour remaining I was struggling to see how they could possibly explain and conclude the series of events to a satisfactory ending and for me, this stayed a struggle and I was left in that horrible position of asking 'Well what happened next then?!' ★★★☆☆ 3/5

Platinum Jubilee Commemorative Mugs


There are plenty of free Jubilee Presentation Royal mugs available at the time of writing (16/5/22) for children of Primary School age and under living in the village.

The Queen's Platinum Jubilee

This month we celebrate the Platinum Jubilee of Queen Elizabeth II, a feat matched by only three other recorded Monarchs before her, the record longest reign being Louis XIV of France (Died 1715) of some 72 Years, 110 days, although taking the throne aged just 4 certainly helped his longevity of reign!

Queen Elizabeth II is the longest running British Monarch by quite some distance though, currently almost 7 years in front of Queen Victoria, our previous longest reigning Monarch. This obviously makes Queen Elizabeth II the only British Monarch to celebrate a Platinum Jubilee.

Among her many titles, the ones she held prior to becoming queen were:

- † 21 April 1926 11 December 1936: *Her Royal Highness* Princess Elizabeth of York
- † 11 December 1936 20 November 1947: *Her Royal Highness* The Princess Elizabeth
- † 20 November 1947 6 February 1952: *Her Royal Highness* The Princess Elizabeth, Duchess of Edinburgh
- † And of course, Since 6 February 1952: Her Majesty The Queen

Queen Elizabeth has had 4 children from her Marriage to Philip, Duke of Edinburgh in 1947, Her Heir, Charles - Prince of Wales (Born 1948), Anne - Princess Royal (Born 1950), Andrew – Duke Of York (Born 1960) and Edward – Earl of Wessex (born 1964).

This Jubilee marks the sixth Jubilee celebrated by Queen Elizabeth II, having celebrated her Silver in 1977, Ruby in 1992, Golden in 2002, Diamond in 2012 and Sapphire in 2017.



She is, of course, not only our Queen, but also the Monarch of Antigua and Barbuda, Australia, Bahamas, Belize, Canada, Grenada, Jamaica, New Zealand, Papua New Guinea, Saint Kitts and Nevis, Saint Lucia, Saint Vincent and the Grenadines, Solomon Islands and Tuvalu.

Her many titles include Duke of Normandy (Channel Islands), Lord of Mann (Isle of Mann) and somewhat strangely, Admiral of the Great Navy of the State of Nebraska! The latter being an honorary title as Nebraska not only does not have a Navy but is the only triple land locked state in the US meaning it's the furthest from any great body of water.

So, wherever you are over the four day Jubilee Weekend, be sure to celebrate and raise a toast to our longest serving Monarch, Elizabeth II, a lady who has seen a great many changes in her time, but has remained a great constant in this ever changing world.





The ladies of Caythorpe & District WI were fortunate to have two very interesting speakers this month. The first was our very own Daphne Page who looked lovely in her two-piece suit adorned with a beautiful brooch defying the fact she is in her early 90's. She is the most interesting of people to listen to, she is articulate and added humour to her account of life in Leadenham which we were privileged to be able to hear.

The second was our Lincolnshire South Federation advisor, Marilyn Hood who came along to tell us of her personal experience of late diagnosis of ADHD in her 33 year old

daughter. The resolution being discussed at the Annual Meeting in Liverpool concerns the fact that ASD and ADHD are under identified, under diagnosed and under supported in women and girls compared with that of men and boys, a situation the WI would like to see being addressed.

Daphne began by telling us that her story came about when someone from Leadenham asked her to write down her memories which she did for her village magazine. She has lived there all her life from when her father, who was in the RAF got posted up here and they ended up living in LONG Leadenham as it was then known in 1928. Daphne was born in the RAF hospital which at that time was at Cranwell base and is the oldest living resident of Leadenham.

The railway station there was known for hosting the Royal train as it was the only local village to have a suitable siding. (*if anyone can tell me, I'd be interested to know if it's correct that the Royal train used to stay overnight at Carlton Scroop in the area between the railway bridge on Newark Lane and the one on the main road to Grantham. Both bridges were guarded and the train could be seen from either end).

Daphne remembers waving to the King and Queen and seeing the Queen Mother in 1963 walking her dogs nearby. The station closed in 1965 but prior to that the Royal Mail and animals were brought on the train regularly. All the stations between London and Leadenham were guarded and the detectives there would go to Troops for their coffee breaks.

There were so many other interesting facts which enthralled me so much, I forgot to note it all down but did remember that Cromwell had sent men to destroy the church but they had caught the Plague and their bodies are in six unmarked graves with the headstones lying flat in the churchyard. Because of this the church remained intact and the ceiling by Augustus Putin is still there, so a visit to see that is on my to do list.

She worked as secretary at the newly opened William Robertson school and remained there for fifty years seeing its various transitions. I am sure that there will be a publication of her memories one day for us all to enjoy, I sincerely hope so.

Daphne was thanked for her talk and presented with a standard lavender for her garden.

We had our break for refreshments and Marilyn Hood then told us of her experience of getting her daughter diagnosed with ADHD. It gave us food for thought as we then voted on whether

we were For or Against the Resolution being taken further at the AGM in Liverpool on 10th June. I will be the delegate for this event and will be representing Caythorpe, Cranwell, Leasingham and Bassingham WI's and needed to know how each of them wishes me to vote.

A lavender was presented to Marilyn too along with the vote of thanks.

Our next meeting is on Thursday 9th June at Caythorpe Village Hall 2-4pm, please do all come along and celebrate with us our 69th birthday and our own celebration of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee.

We are being asked to dress as if going to a wedding or special occasion and to wear a hat if possible AND take our own china cup, saucer and a spoon! We will be having an Afternoon Tea and the speaker is to be Baroness Bolsover (Linda Jane Holmes) who will demonstrate the "Do's and Dont's" of afternoon tea etiquette and apparently Afternoon Tea will never be the same again!

The competition in June will be for any item of your choice beginning with the letter "I" and flower of the month donations will of course go the ACWW (Associated Country Women of the World). Sue Case

In & Around The Garden

As we move into summer, early flowering perennials follow on from daffodils and tulips. In my garden, small patches of acid yellow and orange Welsh poppies are blooming all through the borders where they seed themselves around. Dicentra are good too, in shades of pink and white with ferny foliage. Hardy Osteospermum are making a fine show; I grow both the white and pink forms. There are lots of early summer perennials, but unfortunately these plants don't get a lot of publicity. Most are not as large or striking as those of high summer, and early garden shows and garden centres seem to prefer to display forced plants that would normally flower later. Amateur plant sales and nurseries that grow their own are the best source, or seeds if you have the patience.

The cherry-blossom season has come to an end, but other trees are in flower, including a spectacular tamarisk covered in small, fluffy, pink flowers. The little rockery is also very colourful at the moment with, amongst others, a pink alpine phlox, lime green euphorbia and a white daisy (Rhodanthemum) that flowers for months amongst the rocks. I am particularly pleased with a Lewisia, that is in its third year – I usually lose them after just one.



In the hedgerows wildflowers are now abundant. Cow parsley is the most obvious, but on the protected verges around the High Dyke, there are large groups of cowslips in the grass. Hawthorn, also know as May blossom, is also in flower, so maybe it's time to 'cast a clout'.

Along with more flowers, there are more insects about. Butterflies and bees are the most conspicuous, but there are plenty of smaller ones that feed nestlings. We have great tits in one of the nest boxes, and robins and wrens are nesting somewhere nearby. I see the adults with food in their beaks, but I haven't looked for the nests for fear of disturbing them. The first fledgling blackbirds appeared earlier in May and are now independent. A somewhat confused great spotted woodpecker attacked our wood-effect PVC window frames, but gave up before causing any damage. It was nice to see one so close.

Less nice to see was a hornet on the inside of the same window. I managed to catch it in a little pot – very warily- and really appreciated just how big they are. I took it outside and let it go, and could see that it was lost by the way it flew round in a circle twice to get its bearings before heading off. Also seen recently were some rosemary beetles. These alien bugs appeared in 1994 and have since spread throughout Britain. They eat Mediterranean shrubs such as lavender, thyme and, of course, rosemary. They can cause considerable damage, but unlike the dreaded lily beetle, they do have predators here, so I'm not rushing out with the insecticide just yet. And they are very pretty. JA

Caythorpe & District Garden Society

The speaker for our May meeting was Peter Williams, whose subject was "Propagation for Grown-Up Gardeners". Peter was formerly principal biology lecturer at York St. John University, and is now an enthusiastic gardener and keen plant propagator.

Seed sowing is the most obvious way, as plants do this themselves, and it is the only way to propagate annuals. For unusual plants, specialised seed companies and seed exchanges are good sources. Peter took us through the process, pointing out some of the difficulties of getting seed to germinate and how to overcome them.

Plants that form clumps can be divided, either by digging them up and splitting the clump, or by removing offsets. Success rates are usually high. Taking cuttings is 'a race between rooting and rotting'. Peter showed us how to improve success by appropriate preparation of the cutting material: not every one will root, but those that do will reach maturity much faster than from seed.

Peter also advocated grafting for specimens that are difficult to root as cuttings or grow poorly on their own roots. There are several different methods and some skill is required, but for expensive shrubs and trees, such as maples, magnolias etc., it is worth having a go – and very satisfying when it succeeds.

Our June meeting is for members only, but visitors will be most welcome (£5) to the July meeting on Tuesday 12th. Geoff Hodge will talk about gardening in drought conditions. Just come along to Carlton Scroop Village Hall, 7:30pm for 7:45pm.

Caythorpe Cricket News by Dave Cree

The 2022 Cricket Season got underway at the end of April with dry but cold weather for the first couple of weeks.

Junior Training started with good numbers, except for the Under 15 age group, and some Teams have already played competitive matches. The Seniors have made a bright start to the Season in Division One of the Lincoln and District League.

Off the Field the Annual General Meeting was held. Henry Lamb was elected Chairman, and the other Office Holders are Sophie Burkett (Secretary), Stuart Spratt (Treasurer) and Kathryn Betts (Welfare Officer). The Coach/Managers of each age group and the Senior Captain fill the other Committee positions.

Our Under 9's have played two games already, being narrowly defeated in the first by just two runs by Welton. In their second game they were victorious against Hartsholme Falcons, winning by four runs. Two very close matches saw good play by our young girls and boys, some playing in a match for the first time.

Under 13's started the Season with a defeat by Boston, who scored 96 runs for seven wickets. Caythorpe replied with 56 runs, all out.

The newly-promoted Seniors started their campaign with a win against Billingborough. On a cold dull day Caythorpe batted first and scored 105 runs, all out. Jack Butler and Joe Dickinson were our top scorers, each making 25. Very tight bowling and some good fielding then restricted Billingborough to just 64 runs, being all out in only 18 Overs. Theo Mussell took 3 wickets for 22 runs, Dan Pinfold 4 for 34, and Jamie Watson 2 for 2.

The next Sunday saw a high scoring game against Nocton, who batted first and amassed 278 runs for 6 wickets from their allotted 40 overs. In reply Caythorpe scored 209 runs for 7 wickets, but were always behind the required run-rate. Chris Wharmby scored 60 runs, Sandy Ireland scored 47 and Captain James King added a very rapid 58 (not out).

The first Away Game of the Season saw Caythorpe travel to Barkston, for our local "derby" match. Batting first Barkston were restricted to 116 runs, being all out in 39 Overs. Wickets were shared between Alex Dickinson, Dan Pinfold, Jack Butler and Joe Dickinson, backed up by hostile bowling by Theo Mussell who conceded only 15 runs from 10 Overs. In reply Caythorpe scored 119 runs for just 2 wickets, in 25 Overs. Joe Attewell top scored with 45 not out.

Back on Home territory the following week Caythorpe came away winners in a high scoring game against Morton. Morton (from near Gainsborough) won the toss and elected to bat. They scored 211 runs for the loss of 5 wickets from their 40 Overs. Theo was the pick of the bowlers, taking 2 for 27 from his 10 Overs. Not daunted by this high score to chase, Caythorpe's batsmen reached the target in just 30 Overs, losing only 3 wickets. Opener Sandy Ireland hit a powerful 76, but this was overshadowed by a commanding innings from Joe Attewell, who scored 101 not out, with three sixes and 13 fours. Joe won the match and reached his Century with a huge six.

The Seniors are currently in second place in the League Table, just behind Woodhall Spa.

Portfolio Update from Cllr. Jonathan Betts

Speeding Assessment: Last year we borrowed the speed sign from Carlton Scroop & Normanton On Cliffe Parish Council to assess the extent of speeding throughout the village. We set up the speed sign in 8 different locations around the village. We saw an average of 10% of vehicles speeding, yet there were some significant variances between each location (See summary below). It was agreed at our Parish Council Meeting in July 2021 that given the low level of speeding throughout the village that we would not pursue other traffic calming measures such as speed bumps or reduced speed limits.

Highways: Potholes have been one of the main topics of discussion in respect of highway matters in our Parish. In April 2021 the Parish Council and Cllr. Alexander Maughan petitioned Lincolnshire Highways to address the dire state of Gorse Hill Lane where patch repairs had been completed the previous year yet had subsequently failed. In July 2021 the scheme to replace the lower section of Gorse Hill Lane was agreed and the replacement of the lower section of the road took place in August over a two week period. Other roads around the village are still in need of repair as large potholes have not been addressed yet have been logged on www.fixmystreet.com, notably the High Street and Frieston Heath Lane.







We have now escalated this to our Highways Officer and Cllr. Maughan and have requested dates for when these stretches of road will be repaired. The good news is that by the time you are reading this the repairs to Frieston Heath Lane should be completed as the highways department are due to address the potholes before the end of April. Once again if you do see potholes when out and about in the village please take a photo of them and upload them to www.fixmystreet.com. It takes 5 minutes and unless the council are made aware of specific issues they will not address them.

Facebook: We have continued to post all important notices and planning applications on our Facebook Page to reach as many Parishioners as possible. Our Facebook page now has over 350 followers, up from less than 10 in 2020. Facebook Messenger continues to be a popular way for Parishioners to contact us about any topics they wish to raise.

Not from the Rectory

The Rector is reminded of Crimplene and brings home a 'Fat Rascal'

As well as offering a direct service from London via Grantham to Lincoln, LNER also offer a direct service to Harrogate and on a bright day in March the opportunity was there for the taking: the Azuma train switches from electric power to diesel at Leeds for the onward journey of some 39 miles to Harrogate.

The journey includes both the Bramhope Tunnel of two miles and the impressive Crimple Valley Viaduct – a Grade II listed structure of 1,872 feet in length and 31 arches. Some of us will remember how Terylene was modified in 1959 to become Crimplene: ICI bought the patent and as their HQ was in the Crimple Valley the fabric acquired its name. It was popular in the 1960's providing A line dresses for the ladies and button-down shirts for the men.

Like bees to the honey-pot, the visitor to Harrogate is drawn across town to the celebrated tea shop that is Bettys for morning coffee and 'something on the side' – a Yorkshire curd tart and a fondant fancy in our case!

Time to head via the Valley Gardens into the 'most luxurious and elegant' part of Harrogate to seek out the Church of St Wilfrid – a Grade 1 listed church by Temple Moore and consecrated in 1914.



Temple Moore (1856-1920) was one of Victorian England's greatest Church architects, building more than 40 churches, which today are considered masterpieces of late Gothic Revival. St Wilfrid's was designed and built to be an Anglo-Catholic place of worship with its architecture inspired by the ancient monasteries with cloisters, 'night stairs' to the organ loft and a Lady Chapel to the east of the High Altar as in many a cathedral. St Wilfrid's – along with the adjacent Harrogate Ladies' College – was built on land belonging to the Duchy of Lancaster and the entrance is indeed on Duchy Road with the scene at Calvary by the main door while inside the eye is drawn to the soaring roof space and the baptistery at the west end.

St Wilfrid's is described as one of Harrogate's hidden treasures but is only a short walk from the Valley Gardens through which we wandered back into the centre of town for lunch – at Bettys of course – bringing home one of their delightful 'Fat Rascal' plump and fruity scones to enjoy later: Father David Hope in his diary of Parish Life at St Margaret's Ilkley refers to Bettys as Yorkshire's upper-crust tea shop and delights in the daily arrival on his doorstep

from Bettys' Ilkley branch – thanks to grateful parishioners – of Fat Rascals and their trade mark ginger cake (David Hope: Better to Travel Hopefully).


Trains arrived in Harrogate in 1862 making its famous health-giving waters more widely available to the general public. The benefits of the town's sulphur spring water had been noted as far back as 1626 but it was not until 1841-42 that the Royal Pump Room we see was built – though one tasting of the waters several years ago was quite enough for me! I will stick with the bottled Harrogate Water served up on the return LNER service – an excellent day out to what is rightly known as 'God's own county'!

Had we the opportunity this year to be anywhere near the Severn Valley Railway we would have wanted to pay due respect to her Majesty Queen Elizabeth 11 in this her Platinum Jubilee year and travel on a train hauled by the repainted and re-named SR West Country 'Taw Valley' steam locomotive. 
Farewell to a Friend by Archdeacon Brian Lucas

A valued friend and a notable Caythorpe resident died suddenly on Monday, 16th May. Peter Atley lived with his wife, Sally, in their historic house in the High Street. We were both in Oxford at the same time in the 1960's: he studied Mathematics (I think) at Wadham College while I studied Theology at St Stephen's House, but our paths never met. I came to know Peter soon after I became Rector of Caythorpe in 1996.

The bell chamber in St Vincent's Church was declared unsafe due to the rotting woodwork in the structural beams, and the eight bells were silenced while we tried to raise over £18,000 for the remedial work. When Peter learned of this, he rang me and told me how much he liked to hear the bells ringing out over the village and gave a very substantial sum anonymously which enabled the work to begin immediately. The time has come to remove the anonymity.

Peter Atley had a wide circle of friends all over Lincolnshire and beyond. Whenever I called on him the conversation would range widely and and often include argument and strong debate about the issues of the day, but the repartee was incisive, witty and scintillating. Peter detested hypocrisy and cant: his word was his bond. He had a keen sense of humour fed by his keen sense of the incongruous. He was generous, clear-thinking, honest and totally without malice.




