

Hogwarts start their topic with a Big Bang

Hogwarts topic for the term is "How can we beat climate change. To start the topic the children have been taking part in the project 'Beat the Flood'. Their challenge was to build a strong, waterproof home that would be able to withstand torrential rain and a flood. The children co-operated brilliantly in their teams and gave clear explanations for the purpose of each element of their houses. We then tested the children's designs using a simulated flood.

How does your garden grow?

Narnia and Enchanted Forest's topic for the term is "How could we improve our school garden?" They certainly started it off with a big bang by spending some time outside clearing overgrown areas with help from volunteers Pete and Margaret in preparation for planting seedlings into the existing beds. The children also found we had sweet pea flowers growing and created a tripod cane structure for them to grow up. They found potato plants, planted cabbage, beans, replanted some strawberry plants and Miss Cook thinks we've won the unknown competition of nurturing the tallest weed ever! (Over 120cm)

The children also developed skills of observation by sketching plants and flowers. The children planted their own poppy seeds which they will track the growth of over the next term.

Emotions and Friendship Workshop

On Wednesday, Year 2 were lucky to have a workshop delivered by Neil from the Safer Lincolnshire team. They learnt all about emotions and different times when we feel different things. They discussed how it is ok to feel these emotions but the important part is how we choose to then deal with them. They were shown some different breathing techniques, which they could use when they may feel angered in the future as well as sharing some other things they do when they want to relax.

2022 Commonwealth Games

This month sees the start of The Birmingham Commonwealth Games, based across the West Midlands with Birmingham at its heart. The BIRMINGHAM venues being used for the Games stretch from Coventry, Solihull, and Royal Leamington Spa to Cannock Chase Forest, Royal Sutton Coldfield, and

Wolverhampton.

The official mascot for the Games is Perry the bull who was created from the design of a ten year old girl. Perry has so far visited more than 120 schools in the West Midlands region, taking part in fun and active assemblies to entertain school pupils and increase awareness of the Games amongst young



people. The Games run from 28th July until the 8th August.

Much like the Olympic Torch run, Commonwealth Games has its own version, a 'Queen's Baton Relay'. The route of the Queen's baton relay takes in all Commonwealth countries and territories during a 294 day schedule. The Relay began on 7th October 2021, with Her Majesty The Queen placing her message to the

Commonwealth into the Baton. The Baton is now on its 294 day long journey to every corner of the Commonwealth, completing its journey at the opening ceremony. Paralympic gold medallist Kadeena Cox OBE received the baton from Queen Elizabeth to become this games first baton runner. Apart from the platinum the baton has purposely been made from non-precious metals and alloys (copper, aluminium and brass) to represent the gold, silver and bronze medals awarded at the games. It includes a camera, a heart-rate monitor, an atmospheric sensor and lights that change each time the baton is passed from person to person! Beat that Olympic Torch!

If you want to catch a view, the Baton passes through our locality in Lincoln on 10th July and Grantham on 11th July.

The Lincoln Route will take in some key locations such as International Bomber Command Centre (IBCC), the LNER Stadium, Stonebow, High Street, Steep Hill, and Cathedral, approximate timings will between 17:00 and 18:15.

The Grantham route on Monday July 11th, is the last day of the baton route through the East Midlands. Grantham will officially welcome the baton at around 10.15am at Wyndham Park Visitor Centre and will then travel through the town's historic quarter.

Starting along Redcross Street and turning left along the length of Castlegate past the King's School where Sir Isaac Newton was educated, St Wulfram's Church and the National School. It then turns left again onto Avenue Road, to its junction with the Riverside Walk, following the River Witham back to Wyndham Park. Road closures will be in place along the route.

Birmingham Commonwealth Games Quick Facts

- 1. 72 nations and territories are planning to send teams to the Birmingham 2022 Commonwealth Games.
- 2. Around 6,500 athletes and team officials will be coming to Birmingham for the Games.
- **3.** There are 19 sports and eight Para sports that will feature making it the biggest sports programme ever for a Commonwealth Games.
- **4.** Women's cricket will be included for the first time, and it is the first time that T20 cricket has ever been included in the Commonwealth Games.
- **5.** Across the 11 days of sport there will be 286 different sessions of sport.
- 6. There will be two super Sundays at Birmingham 2022 and the second super Sunday is a

huge day for women's team sport featuring the women's cricket T20 final, the netball final and the women's hockey final.

7. Three students from the School of Jewellery have designed the medals, ribbons and boxes that will be awarded to athletes at the Games and the medals are being made in Birmingham's Jewellery Quarter.



- **8.** Across the 11 days of sport there will be 286 different sessions of sport.
- **9.** Around 14,000 volunteers will be helping to make sure that the Games runs smoothly more than 41,000 people applied to be a volunteer, the volunteers are know as the Commonwealth Collective.



- **10.** The Opening Ceremony for the Games will take place on 28 July in the Alexander Stadium with a live audience of around 30,000 people and is expected to have a TV audience of around one billion!
- **11.** With 2022 acres of new forest being planted, this will be the first 'carbon neutral' games!
- **12.** More than one million tickets have already

been sold for the Games. The remaining tickets are available now, what are you waiting for!

When he finds himself training a detachment of Top Gun graduates for a specialized mission the likes of which no living pilot has ever seen, Maverick encounters Lt. Her: Well, what a film!! This has to be **the** film of the year! Top Gun Maverick was due to be released during 2020, it's one of those highly anticipated films that had no option but to be amazing and with so much to live up to it certainly did not disappoint. With Tom Cruise reprising his iconic role as Maverick, the storyline was very much history repeating itself but with a modern day twist and in full knowledge that time had moved on. The iconic soundtrack from Top Gun was present from the start with a number scenes mirroring the original movie, plus, I noted a few throwback lines that we all know and love that were first heard back in 1986.

We've never met Penny before but we know from Top Gun that 'Mav went ballistic with Penny Benjamin'! Played by Jennifer Connelly in Top Gun Maverick, Penny is an interesting addition to the line up and we are given a view of how Pete Mitchell's life will carry on. Looking at it objectively, I think the inclusion of Kelly McGillis would have placed the film at a supersonic 10/5.

We didn't get to know the Top Gun Pilots very well, however, the film served to allow Maverick and Rooster, the son of Maverick's original wingman, Goose, to make their peace with each other as the story of their last 35 years unravels over the course of the 2 hours.

I'd be doing a dis-service if I didn't mention the flying scenes which were out of this world. Tom Cruise is well known for doing his own stunts and, from what I've read, wanted to make

Top Gun Maverick using camera's which captured the actors from all angles, to show the realistic force exerted on their faces during their flights.

Another busy month for the ladies of the WI what with the Platinum Jubilee, Lincolnshire Show and our own birthday/Jubilee Tea Party. Whilst there are some of our members who are cake makers and often get called upon to donate cakes to whatever forthcoming event requires them, it is not what membership is all about. For example, we get involved in national and local campaigns to help raise awareness of the symptoms and signs of Ovarian Cancer, we have our own Climate Change Ambassador, we are involved in making people aware of what Modern Slavery looks like and our most recent campaign, launched

on 11th June, is to call on the Government to fund research into improving the diagnosis process of Women and Girls with Autistic Spectrum Disorder (ASD) and Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD) which are currently being under-diagnosed, under-identified, mis-diagnosed and under-supported.

Members were greeted by tables bedecked with beautiful cloths, flags and the three-tiered caked stands ready for Afternoon Tea as they arrived in their finery for our June meeting. They wore beautiful hats, and all looked almost as resplendent as the guest speaker who came in the guise of Baroness Bolsover aka Linda Jane Holmes.

Angela Turner welcomed everyone and thanked those ladies who had made the cakes for the village church for the Queen's Platinum Jubilee service, the WI tent at the Lincolnshire Show and for all the food and cakes provided for our own celebration today. We were celebrating not only the Jubilee but also our own Wl's birthday which is 69 years this year, OUR 70th being next year! The "Baroness" was dressed in late Victorian style and admired the wonderful table settings and bone China teacups which members had brought with them. She explained the history of Afternoon Tea which began in the 1850's and soon became "de rigeur" within high society including Queen Victoria. There was a certain etiquette required; straight back, good posture, no slurping, napkin folded in a particular way so that crumbs went on the floor and not the dress and so on. High tea got its name by being taken from a "high" table which later became a more substantial meal whereas low tea was taken from a low table meaning the cup and the saucer needed to be lifted. Sugar was never stirred but moved around the cup and it was regarded as rude to put used utensils facing away from the body. Interestingly, the way in which one held a cup was the opposite of what most people think; the cup is picked up by pinching thumb and forefinger together and placing middle finger under the handle and, the little finger was always tucked IN! Tea was made in a pot and always poured into the cup first and then followed by the milk. Coffee was also offered as well as a fruit punch. I wonder what Queen Victoria would have though about throwing a teabag into a huge, heavy mug and never using a teapot, something that seems to be becoming increasingly popular today? There was an etiquette with the sandwiches too; they often had the crusts removed and should be finger width and nibbled daintily. Cakes were small and consisted of Victoria sandwich, Garibaldi biscuits from 1862, Battenberg from 1884 and scones with jam and cream. Happily, for the hostess, she was not required to wear a corset but was expected to wear a soft, floaty tea gown. Ladies might attend the tea for thirty minutes before going on to



the birthday cake made by Janet Hodell as she was still in hospital. Marilyn Ritchie stepped in at the last minute and did a super job.

Sadly, we have lost former member Linda Bartlett who had moved from the village, Linda passed away suddenly and was just 70 years old. She was a lovely, fun person to be with and helped with lots of village events we send condolences to her family from us all.

Craft Club met this month but only nine were able to attend, others were helping get the church ready for the Jubilee, attending a funeral and another at her grandson's birthday party.

In & Around The Garden

After a cool start June has finally reached summer temperatures, and a whole new cast of flowers is taking to the stage. The last of the early bulbs, Allium cristophii, makes an impact with flower heads 9 inches across, and on a sandy bank a Californian poppy (Pictured Right) is covered in eye-watering orange flowers. There are a lot of blue flowers at the moment - a low growing sky-blue veronica, and Campanula portenschlagia (it used to be C. muralis until the taxonomists got at it) covered in blue bells. Annual Love-in-a-mist 'Blue Shades', seeds itself around every year, and this year most of the flowers are a very striking navy blue over feathery foliage.



I failed to do some of the pruning over the winter, and as a result some of the shrubs I grow mainly for foliage are bigger than usual and have far more flowers. The best of these is a



dark leaved elder 'Black Lace' (Pictured Left), now covered with flat heads of pale pink flowers and looking very showy. The earliest cranesbills are in flower too, including our native meadow and bloody cranesbills. One native cranesbill, herb robert, is taking over the shady area at the end of the garden. I was warned that it might be a problem and because of its ingenious seed dispersal mechanism, it spread far and wide. I filled half a green bin pulling just some of it up. Even with 45 years gardening experience, I can still make big mistakes.

Although we just have fat-ball feeders out at the moment, we still see a lot of birds. The tits pick

over the plants looking for insects, mostly aphids, and a chiff-chaff, usually a secretive bird, has chosen the TV aerial as a singing post. We have also seen a lot of the great spotted woodpeckers on the fat balls lately, though I was reminded that they are essentially predators



when a friend showed me one of her tit nest boxes. The metal plate protecting the entrance hole had proven to be useless, as a woodpecker had bored through the wood below it to take the nestlings. Crows, too, are predators — one took a newly fledged blackbird from the garden next door.

The pond plants are beginning to cover the surface of the water, with water lilies and bog bean taking a lot of the space. Water buttercup and forgetme-not are in flower, and the water crowfoot and water soldier I added last year have started to grow away. Lots of damsel flies, both turquoise and red, are mating and laying eggs at the moment, and we saw a green and black dragon fly emerge a few days ago.

Beyond the village, the hedgerows are bright with white elder flowers and hogweed, with red poppies where the ground has been disturbed. On the High Dyke towards Ancaster dog roses are



flowering and look lovely, and on the protected verges tufted vetch, dyers greenweed and buttercups are beginning to replace last month's cowslips. It's summer at last. - JA

The society's summer social replaced our usual meeting in June. On a warm sunny evening around 30 members gathered in a lovely garden belonging to two of our members and enjoyed a 'bring and share' buffet.

The garden we visited was looking very attractive. The owners grow an extensive range of roses which were in full bloom at the time. They are incorporated in the hedges and borders that divide up the garden and made a colourful and fragrant show wherever one looked. As well as roses the garden includes a wide selection of other plants, chosen for their resistance to rabbits – an important factor as the garden is surrounded by fields. At the time of our visit foxgloves, poppies and red valerian were among the plants in flower, with many more ready to take over as the season progresses. Less vigorous plants that might be overwhelmed in the packed borders are grown in pots and displayed on a paved terrace when at their best. Although roses are the star performers, the other plants, including some choice trees, complement them to give a long season of interest. Many thanks to our hosts for sharing it with us.

From the Archives by Andy Roberts

35 years ago Mrs.Cis Dalton (nee Taylor) visited her home village of Caythorpe to promote the sale of her autobiography. I bought a copy. Cis Taylor lived initially at Bleak House Farm on Caythorpe Heath moving in 1912 to Hall Farm beside St Vincents Church where her father was a farm bailiff. By the standard of the time the family were quite well off, however, she recounts the hardship and poverty in Caythorpe particularly during and after the 1914-1918 war. The local M.P. Colonel Royds of Holy Cross House, demolished 1966, established a soup kitchen in the village. She said that some women were so embarrassed at receiving charity they would hide the soup jugs under their coats.

Col Royds spoke in Parliament about the financial plight of the war widows and their families and the need of the country to help them. She says she got into a fight at school with another girl who mocked a boy who had come to school with his boot soles tied up with string.

Mr.Stokes the Headmaster at Caythorpe Primary School went to cane her for fighting but she stood up to him and told him the reason for the fight. He backed down and gave her extra arithmetic instead. She told her father what had happened who bought the lad a pair of boots and gave him a part time job looking after the farm chickens to help his mother make ends meet.

At the end of the war word was received that a local man was arriving at Caythorpe Station having been released from German Prisoner of War Camp. When he arrived everyone was shocked at his poor physical state. Working on the Hall Farm were a number of German Prisoners of War. Such was the animosity towards them following the village mans return the authorities had to relocate the German prisoners away from the village.







Caythorpe Cricket News by Dave Cree

The Cricket Season continued in good weather - fortunately there were no fixtures scheduled for the Platinum Jubilee weekend - the only Sunday we have had rain in Caythorpe.

The Seniors are currently top of the League, having suffered only one defeat after eight matches. Playing Aisthorpe, Caythorpe won by 10 wickets. Aisthorpe batted first and were restricted to just 124 runs all out, from 38 Overs. The wickets were shared between five bowlers, Dan Pinfold taking 3 for 31, Theo Mussell 2 for 22, Alex Dickinson 2 for 31, Jack Butler 1 for 19, and Joe Dickinson a very economical 2 for 3. In reply our Openers carried their bats, Joe Dickinson scoring 60 runs and Chris Wharmby made 56.

Following this our next opponents were Hartsholme. Caythorpe batted first, and scored 177 runs, being all out in the final over. Chris Wharmby top-scored with 39 runs, closely followed by James King with 38. Hartsholme were then bowled out for only 102, Dan Pinfold taking 4 wickets for just 10 runs from 10 Overs.

The weekend after the Jubilee, Caythorpe travelled to Billingborough. Caythorpe scored freely, making 239 runs for just 4 wickets in their 40 Overs. Joe Dickinson led the way, with 120 runs, Sandy Ireland added a quick 69. Billingborough were restricted to 130 runs all out, with Joe Dickinson leading the way again, with 4 wickets for 43 runs.

The last game in this period saw Blankney suffered a huge defeat by 10 wickets, being all out for 104 runs in 37 Overs. Jack Butler took 5 wickets for 12 runs, a superb performance. In reply Caythorpe's openers were again undefeated, Joe Dickinson scoring 59 runs, and Chris Wharmby 44, and took only 19 Overs - not even getting to the drinks interval!

Our Under 9's are enjoying the Season, having won three of their five matches so far. Playing Market Rasen they won by 52 runs, against Hartsholme Eagles the winning margin was 56 runs. Unfortunately they lost to Nettleham Barracudas by 26 runs, too many wickets being lost.

Under 9's play "Pairs Cricket". Each batting pair face 4 overs, and have five runs deducted for every wicket lost. This ensures all children get to play an equal part in the game.

The other Junior Teams are on a steep learning curve, and have yet to record victories but they are rapidly improving, playing against the "town" clubs who benefit from training facilities all through the winter.



Not from the Rectory

A month in which the Rector asks 'Brother, Sister, can you spare a dime – or allowing for inflation shall we say £50?

Church organs have been around since the time of Pope Vitalian in the 7th century: an organ, with its sustaining tones, is ideally suited to accompany human voices, whether a congregation, a choir, or a soloist, and this is one of its key purposes.

The organ is a keyboard instrument with one or more manuals, and usually a pedal board. In contrast to most other keyboard instruments, the organ's sound output is continuous and constant for as long as a key is depressed and the organ is one of the oldest musical instruments in the Western musical tradition.

The most well-known type of organ is the pipe organ, so named because it produces its sound through pipes, although many people simply refer to it as the "organ". A musician who plays the organ is an organist and a person who builds or maintains organs is an organ builder - and the most famous composer of music for the organ is Johann Sebastian Bach.

At a recent service in St Vincent's, Caythorpe, the guest organist was Dr Tim Williams of St Wulfram's, Grantham, and while commenting on what a superb instrument St Vincent's has he also agreed that work is necessary to maintain the organ and hence this appeal to you:

The organ in St Vincent's was originally built in 1871 by the Hull firm of Forster and Andrew at a cost of £270 (John Heald has a copy of the signed receipt) but by 1984 it had become ravaged by woodworm and the floor underneath unsafe with wet rot. As a result, in 1985 the organ was rebuilt, using most of the original pipes at a cost of £8000 raised by giving, entirely from the village, and resulting in the instrument we now have in our Parish Church.

The organ at the west end of the nave contains the pipes – there are over 700 - and it is played from the remote console in the Arnhem aisle and the two are connected by 3 cables each containing 1000 separate wires.



Initially, in the 1980's, quotations were sought to repair the existing organ as it stood but these were beyond our means and at this stage the Diocesan Organ Advisor came to the rescue and put John Heald and the Rector at the time in touch with Charles Groves & Son of Nottingham who had recently removed a Gray and Davison organ from a church in Chilwell.

This organ had been re-constructed in their workshops and electrified and the decision was made to site the console in the north aisle where we see it today and to incorporate some of the ranks of pipes from the old organ into the new one while retaining the best of the Gray and Davison pipework. Approximately half of the pipes are original – the loud pipes plus the painted front



pipes – and half (the quiet pipes) came with the 'new' second hand Gray and Davison organ.

John Heald – who has supplied the information about the history of the church organ in St Vincent's – has advised the PCC that the 'rebuilt organ has served us well for almost 40 years but now the tab switches (or stops) on the console which control the choice of pipes and hence the sound, are worn out and need replacement'.

There are 20 such tab switches and each costs £50 to replace and the labour to do the work costs a further £500 and the VAT on this will be £300 – in all £1,800 and the PCC is looking for 36 donors willing to contribute £50 each to cover this project as we have no available funds for this – such funds as the church has are required to low level stone work on the north chancel wall to make it watertight.

If you would like to support St Vincent's in this and enable the PCC to order the required work can you kindly make out your cheque to 'PCC St Vincent's Caythorpe' and hand it either to the Treasurer (Richard Johnson) or to one of the Wardens (John Scott and Jo Russell) or to the PCC Secretary (Judith Scott) or indeed make a direct bank transfer to the PCC bank account at 30-93-58 ac 00181499 and use as the reference the word 'Organ'.

On behalf of the Wardens and PCC may I thank you for reading this appeal and for your generous response to ensure the organ in our Parish Church continues to be one which gives praise to the Lord:

All things that give sound; Each jubilant chord, Re-echo around; Loud organs, His glory Forth tell in deep tone, And, sweet harp, the story Of what He hath done




