Richard Naylor The Autobiography

Richard Naylor lived at Frieston Manor Farm from a 10 year old boy until his death at 73 years old in 2012. Before he died, he dictated much of his life story including many recollections of life in and around Caythorpe and Frieston...

My dear mother was a state registered nurse, theatre nurse, midwife and pharmacist and I was born at the Bromhead where she nursed, now known as the Nuffield Centre. I appeared after a 7 hour labour and my father said he could hear me hollering out from where he worked at Newport Garage nearby. At the side of my

mother's bed at the Bromhead a family of thrushes were being fed by her window. I arrived on the 30th March 1939 pre-war quality.

My first home was Stonefield Cottage, Stonefield Avenue, Lincoln. This was a wonderland; we had a 2 acre kitchen garden that my father bought a British Anzani Iron Horse tractor and we produced all of our own vegetables. I can remember hollering my father because he never used to take the clutch out and he could swing the whole assembly around while he was horizontal in the air, he weighed 18 stone. It had a J A Prestwick engine going full chat. I was following him collecting silver and bronze roman coins that he dragged up behind the plough. He gave all of these to Lincoln Museum.

I was Christened Richard Edward Naylor. School was frightening, my mother used to wrap up digestive biscuits in grease proof paper inside my satchel. I called in with her see father at Newport Garage every morning before I went to school. Then we would wonder holding hands up the Bailgate in Lincoln, turn left at the White Hart Hotel, past George Dusty my friend whose father was an electrician. Past one of the famous residents Tony Crook who kept his racing cars at my father's garage a 2.8 Tipo Alfa Romeo, 2 stage supercharged and a 1938 328 BMW in the days when the white and blue emblem was done with enamel. I used to sit in them as a little boy and dream on. I always wanted to be a racing driver.

Now we come to a cul-de-sac on the left where I clutched my mother's hand in a nervous state, we would ring the doorbell to two kind sisters who were the school mistresses. At 11 o clock I tucked into my digestive biscuits which injected some reality into life that normality was even possible in a school room.

After the two mistresses retired due to ill health I was abducted and forced into a new school which was horrific. Westgate School Lincoln. Headmaster was a man called Friskney. I remember us all being marched in and of course being a precocious little lad, I thought that school was all about asking questions to get answers for which I was set upon with Friskney and other teachers with a cane. They would march me down ghastly green corridors where he had numerous canes in a glass cabinet, for which he would give 6 of the best trying to break your fingers. If you moved your hand away, he would bring it back up with the cane. I hated the whole experience. And then one would be marched back down to morning prayers where one was forced to stand in line. Then Mrs Cringe would start up the piano and we were forced to sing about 'Gentle Jesus who loved us all' which I always thought was somewhat incongruous... 

Caythorpe Gala - A Reason To Celebrate



For any newcomers, or maybe just those who are unaware, here is a brief history on what the Gala is all about, taken from the Caythorpe & Frieston Parish Council webpage;

"During 1944 the 1st Airborne Signals Regiment was formed with approximately 450 men all ranks. The first major battle they became in engaged in was, Operation Market Garden, the battle for the bridges of Arnhem. The regiment was based in and around Caythorpe for training prior to the operation; Holy Cross House (now Holy Cross Gardens) was the Headquarters, the village hall served as a billet and work shops for the blacksmith and boot repairer and

the NAAFI was in the upstairs room at the back. Officers and men were billeted in local houses and in Caythorpe Court.

After the war a few survivors of the operation started visiting Caythorpe on the anniversary of Arnhem, to visit the Church and remember lost Comrades. As time passed by the event became officially recognised and the 1st Airborne Signals Regiment modern day equivalent, 216 Signals Regiment, now visit annually and hold a memorial service for all comrades lost in Arnhem and other conflicts since.

During the Regiment's service in Aden their camp was called St Vincent's and this tradition has been carried on in other conflicts. Today when talking to the younger members of the Regiment they consider Caythorpe to be the spiritual home of the 216 Regiment and over the years the Village has always welcomed the Regiment and combine their annual visit with a Gala Weekend."

That briefly sums up the reason why we celebrate with a Gala Weekend, the 'Where' is the Playing Field, Old Lincoln Road, Caythorpe, the 'When' is always on a Saturday in early September, this year its 3rd September between 12:00 midday and 16:00.

In and Around the Garden!

It has been a trying time for gardens and gardeners. For the last eight weeks we have had just 13mm of rain, mostly short showers that barely wetted the ground. I remember 1976 — the solution then was to appoint a Minister for Drought and for my husband and I to go on a camping holiday. The drought broke almost immediately, and it rained so hard that our borrowed tent shrank and had to have its poles shortened the next time it was used. We won't be camping ever again, so the garden will just have to wait it out. Rain is forecast, so fingers crossed.

The 'no water' experiment continues. The woodland area looks awful: some plants have died, including *Viburnum davidii*, a shrub that looked fairly drought resistant, and others are still green but prostrate – Brunnera and our native hellebore among them. It remains to be seen whether they will come back when it finally rains, but they look very sad and rather depressing at the moment. Mahonia and a variegated Eleagnus are hanging on, but the one plant that looks OK is *Euphorbia amygdaloides robbiae*, which remains green and glossy.



The rockery looks pretty good, considering. Star plant of the moment is the California fuchsia (*Zauschneria californica*) covered with bright orange trumpets, but assorted sedums are also coming into flower and Artemesia 'Powis Castle' provides a pretty silver backdrop at the top of the slope. Penstemons continue to flower, and the Californian poppies are still going strong.

In the surrounding countryside, many of the verges have been cut so flowers for bees and butterflies are scarce. Gardens can provide back-up supplies, and here, oregano and other herbs are proving popular with honey bees. Bumble bees prefer toadflax and lavender, but there are fewer about than there were a few weeks ago. It hasn't been a good year for butterflies, though I have seen more gatekeepers than usual and some hummingbird hawk moths. The others have just appeared in ones and twos, even on buddleia. There are few birds about just now, but more goldcrest sightings than ever before. They all look the same to me, but as surprisingly loud contact calls went on and on for hours, I think there must have been a family. There are still robins and wrens in residence, but as usual, the most common bird is the woodpigeon.

I have kept a dish of water on the ground for hedgehogs, and set up a camera to see what uses it. On one night there were seven visits for water by three or four different hedgehogs, and between them they ate all the food I put out — so it isn't being taken by cats. One is a lot smaller, and gets bullied by a bigger one if they chance to meet. The little one curls up and gets punted around like a football, but unrolls and walks off unharmed once the bigger one leaves, having asserted its dominance. JA

Our planned speaker for August had to cancel due to Covid but fortunately Alan Mason, gardener, garden designer, broadcaster and raconteur, kindly volunteered to present his talk on 'Gardens of the Italian Lakes' at very short notice. Alan is well known for his garden designs both locally and internationally, but he also enjoys a part-time career as an expert guide on garden cruises, including around the Italian Lakes. His talk, beautifully illustrated with pictures of the gardens he knows well, covered the large gardens associated with the big houses around the lakes.

Isola Bella is perhaps the most remarkable. It is built on a rocky island in Lake Maggiore, which was flattened and carved into a series of terraces to accommodate a villa and an extensive baroque-style garden. From a distance it looks more like a cruise ship than an island! By contrast, Villa Melzi on Lake Como shows influences from both Japan and Britain in its less formal, park-style design. A variety of other gardens were described, each with its own individual character, some very formal with parterres and sculpture, others with a more naturalistic design and choice planting. Villa Cicogna Mozzoni, overlooking Lake Lugano, even has a 500 year old, double staircase with 156 steps and a rill running down the centre, lined with cypress trees that Alan had a hand in planting.

Alan interspersed his garden tour with interesting and amusing anecdotes, that made for a very entertaining evening. Many thanks to Alan for stepping into the breech.

Cricketing News with Dave Cree

With the Junior Season now concluded, all attention is on the Senior's performances at the top of Division One of the Lincolnshire Sunday League. With four games (for Caythorpe all away from Home) remaining to be played Caythorpe and Woodhall Spa are way ahead of all the other Teams. Caythorpe have lost once, to Woodhall, who have had a game called off due to weather so at this stage Woodhall have 225 points to Caythorpe's 224. The game between the two Clubs on 4th September, at Woodhall, could well decide the League Championship.

In June Caythorpe played Blankney and won by 10 wickets. Batting first Blankney only managed 104 runs, with Jack Butler leading our bowlers with 5 wickets for 12 runs. He was ably assisted by Alex and Joe Dickinson and James King who share the other wickets. In reply our opening batsmen, Chris Wharmby and Joe Dickinson, scored the 105 runs to win in just 19.4 Overs.

The following week the opposition were Woodhall Spa. As it happened that Sunday Woodhall's First Eleven didn't have a fixture - so they brought five of their first team players, including a "Pro" to Caythorpe. Caythorpe batted first, and scored 158 for nine wickets. Joe Attewell was top scorer, with 61 runs. Battling hard in the field, Caythorpe only managed to take two Woodhall wickets but it took the Sparites 32 Overs to score the runs needed for victory. This was good experience for our Players, as if they are promoted to the Premiership, which looks very likely, it will be Teams like Woodhall Spa First Eleven that they will meet next year.

Moving on to July, our first game was at Home to Cherry Willingham. Caythorpe batted first and scored 207 runs with Joe Attewell making a fine unbeaten 137. Good fielding restricted Cherry to 179 runs for 6 wickets, shared between James King, Jack Butler, Chris Wharmby and Councillor Darren Lee making his first 2022 appearence in a Caythorpe shirt. Several regular players were absent on holidays, so Andrea Kiddle, a County Under 18 Girls player, made her Senior debut.

Caythorpe's next match was home to Barkston, an opportunity for aCaythorpe "double" as Caythorpe had won the match at Barkston earlier in the Season. This was a fiercely contested local Derby, with Barkston being bowled out for 76 runs. Alex Dickinson took 4 wickets, brother Joe got three, as did Chris Wharmby. Joe Dickinson and Vince Markham led the reply, each scoring 27, as Caythorpe triumphed by five wickets. Fixtures against Barkston have extra spice as some of their Players played their Junior Cricket at Caythorpe.

The first match in August saw Caythorpe start a run of six consecutive Away games, a most unusual fixture list this year! Playing at Blankney with Caythorpe looking for another "double", a very one-sided game saw Blankney bowled out for just 79 in 26 overs. Wickets were taken by Alex and Joe Dickinson, Darren Lee, Vince Markham and Chris Wharmby. In reply once again our opening batsmen scored rapidly and finished the game in just 10 overs. Joe Dickinson finishing with 54 runs, and Chris Wharmby scoring 20 runs, giving Caythorpe a 10 wicket victory. Sadly Blankney were only able to field 10 players, and their next game,

against Woodhall, was conceded due to player shortage. We hope they will be able to continue, as already this season Nocton have dropped out of our Division due to lack of Players. This shows the importance of having a thriving Junior section which we have emphasised for many years at Caythorpe. We read that unfortunately Fulbeck have had to withdraw from the Premier Division for a similar reason.

Caythorpe's next fixture was at Hartsholme (in Lincoln) and on a very hot Sunday afternoon Caythorpe won the toss and elected to bat. Joe Attewell and Joe Dickinson led the scoring, with 59 and 45 respectively, as Caythorpe amassed 213 runs for 7 wickets. In reply Hartsholme struggled to 120 all out, Alex Dickinson again impressing with 5 wickets for 19 runs. Other wickets were taken by Chris Wharmby, Vince Markham and Andrea Kiddle.

Caythorpe now have three games to play, at Morton, Cherry Willingham, and Aisthorpe, who have all been beaten at Caythorpe, and the all-important game away at Woodhall Spa. However Woodhall Spa's team cannot be promoted, as Woodhall already have their First Team in the Premiership, but we can be sure they will give us a hard game to probably decide the Division One Championship.

Several of our Players play elsewhere on Saturdays and have recorded some very impressive performances for those Teams in addition to Caythorpe. Quite regularly "our" players figure on the weekly Lincolnshire Honours Board published by the English Cricket Board.

As we move towards the end of the Season we will be holding our Junior Presentation night on Friday 9th September, and plans are already being made for winter nets at Carre's School.

Finally, a most important new development for Caythorpe Cricket Club is the launch of a Ladies Team. Hopefully they will play in a League next year, but in September they will be taking part in a Ladies Softball Tournament at Lindum Cricket Club. Our Ladies will be coming to the Ground for taster / practice sessions on 8th & 15th September, 6-7:30pm, when our Senior Coach, Vince Markham, will be giving some training. Several of our prospective Team have played in Junior Cricket, but for others it will be a first experience of competitive Cricket.

Not From the Rectory

The Rector has a 'wherry' nice time in Norfolk and remembers that for the Poet Laureate it was 'Bliss to be in Diss'



The opportunity to travel the 'Bittern Line' between Norwich and the north Norfolk coast came finally courtesy of a two night stay in Ipswich: the train from Ipswich to Norwich stops at Stowmarket and then at Diss which John Betjeman and Mrs Mary Wilson (wife of Harold Wilson) celebrated in verse of 1974.

The landscape, as JB wrote, 'yields on left and right to widening fields (and) flint church towers sparkling in the light'.

Today's comfortable Greater Anglia trains offer a convenient connecting train from Norwich to Sheringham via Cromer: the train leaves Norwich over the Yare and turns away from the lines to Yarmouth and Lowestoft to head north in a straight line through Salhouse to the station at Hoveton and Wroxham to which the writer would shortly return; happily a train was in the station which serves the miniature railway running along the Bure Valley towards Aylsham while the main line continues through Worstead and North Walsham and somewhat

improbably stops at Gunton station built for the convenience of Lord Suffield when visiting Gunton Hall.

Approaching Cromer the train loops around the town and enters today's truncated station along the line from Sheringham to which the train now runs via West Runton with glimpses of the north Norfolk coastline. There is just time to look across the level crossing and glimpse activity on the North Norfolk Railway which today uses the original Sheringham station before the Greater Anglia service returns to Cromer and in due course deposits the writer in the 'Capital of the Norfolk Broads' in good time to walk down to the moorings for the 'Broads Tours' and take his pre-booked seat on the one and half hour 'Vintage Broadsman' to explore along the River Bure and into both Wrexham and Salthouse Broads - created after peat had been extracted on a commercial scale - and marvel at riverside thatched roof properties which have replaced garage and car with boat house and boat!

In Wroxham Broad we saw one of the original Norfolk Wherries now converted for passenger carrying and no doubt available for those with suitably large budgets on which to draw.

A rather up market station buffet served coffee and Eton Mess before the Norwich train arrived which connected with the next London departure for Ipswich. 'What day could be more sweet than this, Dear John, the day we came to Diss'!





The Norfolk Broads are patrolled by Navigation Rangers and while in the main they check boats which are travelling in excess of the 5mph speed limit they do get involved in crime as Chris Crowther explores in his murder-mystery 'WaterProof' [2007] in which the Ranger is a retired Metropolitan police officer, Jack Fellows. His wife Audrey is churchwarden and the vicar of St Cuthbert's a frequent visitor to their house. The vicar, Julian Jamieson, we learn had formerly been an Army Padre serving with the Royal Leicester's and so knew the local colonel from his army days. However, the 'colonel' was an imposter and while the vicar did not as such blackmail him, he did suggest that St Cuthbert's was badly in need of restoration and that generous donations would be more than welcome – and hence the anonymous donations which had been streaming in to the church fabric fund since the new vicar had arrived! But don't worry – spoiler alert - the vicar did not commit the murders!

Hi Laura & Pete,

If you go to www.traveline then click on 'Plan your journey' you need to enter the date of travel then you get a box where you enter where you want to start from and another where you want to go to, the time you want to start your journey or arrive at your destination. It then checks the information and may ask you for more details.

Next it will work out several possible journeys nearest to your requested times. These show the time of departure, time of arrival, number of changes, type of transport (Bus, walk, train etc) and length of journey.

You can then click on a particular journey and it will break it down into more detail giving you times for each leg of the journey.

A couple of examples are when I had to get to Louth Hospital and Stone, Staffordshire so it can be very useful if travelling somewhere you're not used to going to.




