Richard Naylor

The Autobiography

Richard Naylor lived at Frieston Manor Farm from a 10 year old boy until his death at 73 years old in 2012. Before he died, he dictated much of his life story including many recollections of life in and around Caythorpe and Frieston...



The cows were milked in an annexe to the barn that I use as my workshop, there were standings for 24 milking cows. They grazed over the main road (A607) and were bought up twice a day. During the winter they were bedded down in the milking parlour with access to the crew yard. Charlie Godson used to help and Tony Weatherall. At this time the large barn was kept full of hay and cattle feed.

We had over 100 cattle, milking would last for 2 hours then again repeated in the evening 4 until 6 or 7pm. We used 2,000 gallons of water a day for all this. There was a pathway running up towards the milk churn holder.

My dear father and I rebuilt an old T50 international baler with a farm all M engine on it as the power source, in 1962 it was run 12 hours a day and petrol then cost 4 shillings a gallon (20 pence). My father and I between us had S49 timothy grass and clovers. The beauty of


the Loogan family is that the roots produce nitrogen in the roots structure and enrich a pasture tremendously. Of course, they benefit the bees and all manner of insects. Today would have been a good income but in those days the markets were always against you as a small farmer and you were paying to work.

The local bank, helped to ruin my father. They advised him to invest £60,000 into British companies to create wealth for other business that were supposed to be safe investments in Blue Chip companies. We were put in a ghastly situation where the shares began to go through the floor and he lost £58,000 worth in a matter of days. The bank then began to purge saying they wanted the overdraft paying off it was £3,500. He said the shares might pick up, but they never did. He gave the land away over the main road on May 30th 1963 for £115.00 per acre. My dear mothers £4,000 and my £4,000 went into the farm to keep things going.

From the age of 23 it has been a veil of tears. Never had anything go in our favours, nothing but pain and frustration. To try and get out of this situation that he had been put in he bought the local machine shop, now the waggon & Horses, from the blacksmith called Bill Leeper,

After leaving boarding school at 15 $\frac{1}{2}$. I was accepted as an apprentice at Ruston and Hornsby's, my dear mother paid £6.00 per week for me to be in digs at the side of Youngs garage where Mrs Grundy would wake me at 5 am with a pointed stick. I used to bike down Lincoln High Street to clock in at the apprentice shop at 6am. 55 hour week £2.4shillings and a penny. I still have my first wage packet.





That was the Year that was...

...Quite extraordinary for many reasons. In **Politics** it started off with lunacy on the other side of the pond with Trump inspired conspiracy lunatics storming the Capitol Building ahead of President Biden's Inauguration...How mad they all seemed....nothing as mad as that could happen over here in jolly old sedate Britain could it?...3 Prime Ministers and the pound crashing us into unprecedented levels of national debt later we are not so sure! We thought Johnson had set a new modern record for shortest reign, until Truss came along and said 'Hold My Beer' and was gone in the blink of an eye after a disastrous month or so, David Blaine actually spent 2 hours longer suspended in a box over the Thames than Truss did in Downing Street! Now we have Sunak, a man twice as rich as our current Monarch, who then tells us we have to make some tough decisions on spending...If this was an Oscar Wilde farce we would dismiss it all as too unbelievable!

The award for awful politician of the year will surely be won by Vladimir Putin, following his invasion of Ukraine in February in what has become Europe's biggest deployment of troops since World War II.





In and Around the Garden!







We are all being encouraged to plant trees, and I have rather taken this to heart. There were a lot of large trees here when we moved in 17 years ago, and some smaller ones. We have removed a few over the years for one reason or another, but I have planted 25 new trees in that time. The garden isn't vast, so some of them are fastigiate, having a mutation that makes the branches grow almost parallel to the trunk. As a result they have a narrow columnar shape and add height to the borders without taking up a lot of space

or adding much to the shade. Not all fastigiate trees are small: the Lombardy poplar,

beloved of the French Impressionists, gets very big indeed, but the flowering cherry 'Amanogawa' (above) which I planted about 15 years ago has reached only 7 meters and it still just 2m wide. More recently I have added a rowan 'Autumn Spire', which I liked so much I bought a second one. A hornbeam 'Frans Fontaine' is starting to hide the telegraph pole in the front garden. Two Irish yews (*Taxus baccata* 'Fastigiata', Right), which replaced 2 overgrown Leylandii, frame the front door and rarely need trimming,



while two slower growing specimens ('Standishii') are in pots outside the conservatory. The latest purchase is Ginkgo 'Menhir', currently a four foot stick with buds on. It will probably

be the last one as I am running out of space. This is a pity as there is also a form of English oak I would like to try, although it gets rather large.....

Other columnar trees can be produced by suitable pruning. Minarette fruit trees are less productive than the regular sort, but are ideal in a small space. We have a pear that a previous owner planted, and I have added a plum and a greengage. Espalier and fanned trained trees are also solutions that allow fruit to be grown in a small space, and most fruit trees can be grafted onto a dwarfing rootstock. Every garden, however small, can have a tree. **JA**



Dr Andrew Ward of Norwell Nurseries and Garden was our speaker for November. He holds National Collections of hardy chrysanthemums and astrantias at the nursery, and also sells an extensive range of other hardy perennials. His talk on 'The Joy of Geraniums: Foliage Form and Flower' was a tour through this popular genus, illustrated with excellent slides.

Not to be confused with pelargoniums, the hardy geraniums, or cranesbills, are a large group of perennials. The flowers range in colour from darkest purple, though pinks and blues to pure white. Some are attractively veined, or have dark central markings. Apart from a few double or semi-double varieties, they have quite flat flowers with 5 petals and rounded leaves divided into 5 segments.

Andrew showed us that they are, nevertheless, far from uniform. Some species have leaves with coloured markings, some are variegated and others are dark bronze or golden. Size also varies from tiny, low-growing species and hybrids, best suited to a rockery or trough, to tall ones such as G. psilostemon, which can reach a metre in height. Others, including the well known 'Rozanne', trail and scramble in all directions and can spread widely. Varieties based upon our native meadow cranesbill and bloody cranesbill are generally well behaved and

compact. Most are easy to grow — Andrew has had some plants for decades - , and are tolerant of some shade, though a few need sharp drainage. Some of the species flower just once in late spring, but the best hybrids will flower for months. Andrew has dozens of varieties at the nursery and every garden should have some.



Not From the Rectory

The Rector considers travel at what is 'just the worst time of the year for a journey – for such a long journey'

It was of course TS Eliot who famously described travel over the Christmas period in the words I have quoted above from his 'Journey of the Magi' and even 2000 or so years later we still hedge any commitment to travel to family gatherings over the festive season with such words as 'weather depending of course'!

Mary and Joseph were unable to make any such caveat around their journey as Joseph was required to register in his home town of Bethlehem and in this year's large 2nd class postage stamp the artist has depicted the Holy Family as they made their way – Mary heavily pregnant – from Nazareth to Bethlehem and just as we are very much aware of people fleeing from one country and seeking safety in another so, soon after Our Lord was born, the Holy Family was once again on the move this time to whatever sanctuary they could seek across the border in Egypt. It would be a much shorter journey for the shepherds summoned by the angel [the £1.85 stamp] but for the Magi [the £2.55 stamp] it involved that journey, 'such a long journey', at 'just the worst time of the year... [with] the ways deep and the weather sharp.







This year we have been made very much aware of families required to move with just the possessions they can carry with them receiving (hopefully for those fleeing hostilities in the Ukraine) a warm welcome from their host nation and host family. Some who end up on our Channel shores receive perhaps a different type of welcome from the Immigration authorities and no doubt the churches in Kent would paint a fuller picture for us of what is happening on the ground. Into this mix we have our traditional gatherings of families and friends for Christmas and or the New Year.

Travel is at the heart of the biblical narrative from Abraham being called to set out from the Fertile Crescent to the Land of the Promise, through to the movement of the People of the

Promise to Egypt and their return via the Wilderness; the movement of the people once again into Exile in Babylon before their return.

The writer of the Letter to the Hebrews suggests that this historic pattern shows that men and women of faith are but 'strangers and foreigners on the earth' who travel towards 'a better country, that is, a heavenly one'. The idea that the Christian way involves travel has been expressed for our own generation most memorably in song by the late Sidney Carter in his hymn 'One more step along the world I go' with its catchy refrain 'And it's from the old I travel to the new; keep me travelling along with you'. It is with this sense that travelling is rooted in our Christian faith that I make the various journeys which I report on to you – whether that is going the distance on the train from Grantham to Geneva or more locally letting the train take the strain on a day out to Bradford or to Bridlington.


But for the New Year we should let the last word be with our county's poet, Alfred Lord Tennyson, and his Prayer for the New Year:

Ring out, wild bells, to the wild sky,
