

Richard Naylor The Autobiography

Richard Naylor lived at Frieston Manor Farm from a 10 year old boy until his death at 73 years old in 2012. Before he died, he dictated much of his life story including many recollections of life in and around Caythorpe and Frieston...

While working at Ruston and Hornsby's I was also studying at Technical College. The highlight of the day would be going to the stores for a wiper. Conversation was impossible because the apprentice shop was stationed next to the marine text bed. Engines were going flat out all day. Friday afternoon I was working in the foundry, they would give you salt tablets for all the sweat you lost. Of course then one was looking forward to the great escape. I would get my push bike and cycle back from Lincoln to Frieston. I left at 5pm and got home faster than the Road Car bus. When I got back to Frieston my mother was almost in tears because I was covered in moulders sand stuck to the sweat. I would go and have a bath before tea.

My Father

My Father was the 7th son of the 7th son. When he left Duaston School because he was a very strong boy they had him carrying the crucible of molten metal to pour into the moulds at A J Allans at Market Rasen. His first job was casting Cambridge Rolls engine blocks and a multitude of other castings as required. Two strong boys like my father and a friend would pour the molten metal from the crucible. In my father's 1918 diaries he has put an entry 'cleaning out the crucible to ensure there is no water in the vessel to avoid explosion'. The next day he was doing brass castings. All this labour amounted to a 60 or 70 hour week. He has made an entry that he was paid the sum of 3 shillings and sixpence d per week.

My father could repair everything that needed repairing. Cars, motorcycles, tractors. He had a 75occ new Hudson motorcycle that he put a large water tank onto the side car frame to put all of his tools in so he could go and repair tractors in the fields. He soon found he was making a lot more money having grasped the whole knowledge of the internal combustion engine and transmission.

Bill Leaper, local Caythorpe blacksmith (operating out of The Waggon and Horses) came to see my father one afternoon at Frieston. My father was sat in the corner of the sitting room smoking a cigar with a lovely fire going. Mr Smokey, the cat, was on his knee, happy and Sue the Scottie terrier. 'Take a seat Mr Leaper, how can I help you?'. 'I want to sell the business, will you by it?' So my father bought it unseen and wrote him a cheque out that solved his problems but started some of ours. I went up the next day and spent a week trying to expose the floor by tidying tools, nuts and bolts by the thousand, lengths of steel, lengths of wrought iron nearly up to your knees. By the time my father had got it 'ship shape' it was

a beautifully equipped machine shop. Pedestal drills from AP Herberts of Leeds, power hammer with a 5 horse power concentric cam on it with a treadle to operate the hammer at the side of the forge. My father called the business 'The Forge'. There was every imaginable tool to do any complicated repair we were blessed with threading tools, grinding tools, compressors jacks, you name it!

Some things were special things for me and some were for my Mentor (she's a dab hand at these things having done them for a number of years) and some were for Mr Hissy.

Most days new people would come around and see me, this was great as I love seeing people! I met a few people I'd not met before, that was really good, lots of new sniffs to be had there!! Mr Hissy wasn't overly mingly, he just sat in his box or hid under the settee despite my best efforts to out him.

Hudad has been out walking with me a lot. I like our walks, I even found myself a girlfriend on one of our outings, she looked a lot like my Mentor but she was brown not black, she was very pretty and didn't live too far away but I've not seen her again yet. I look for her every time we go out.

In other Mr Hissy news, Humum was clearing stuff away the other day, I found a ball of what looked to be 'fun' so took it away, Humum saw and removed it from my mouth, said I'd end up looking like I was on a washing line! However, she then took it into the eaty and cooking room and proceeded to dangle it in Mr Hissy's face, he played and purred and she cooed over him...honestly, what's a pup to do?!

In other news, apparently I'm a teenager now, this means that new methods have been deployed to distract me from doing stuff I shouldn't. It's amazing how much control they have over me with a plant mister (I call it the spray of doom), they don't even have to deploy the mist, just the threat of water touching my face is enough of a deterrent...I'm not a fan of the water apart from my drinking bowl, I love that, it's the best, I take it all over the eaty room floor and make it wet!

I must just tell you about my new favourite thing - when I go on my walks, I've found these fantastic things to look at, they are just the best, they are 'field clouds' and they move into different fields, I assume the wind blows them, but I am always so excited to see them, we just observe one another, some dogs chase the field clouds but this is bad, it worries them, Hudad told me! 

ENCOUNTERS ~ Martin Benson

Interesting Acquaintances of Brian Lucas, the last Rector of Caythorpe.



When I first met him in 1996 as a fellow member of the Savage Club, Martin had been famous for over forty years for his role as the Kralaholme, the King's Grand Vizier, in the original London production of "The King and I", a role he recreated in the Oscarwinning film version. I admired him more for his role as Maurice in the Pink Panther film "A Shot in the Dark" (1964), in "Sea Wolves" (1980), and as Mr Solo in "Goldfinger." Appearing in films for over six decades, Benson played mostly supporting characters or villains in over thirty films, in addition to television work. His last appearance was in "Casualty" in 2005.

It is not widely known that he was a notable artist, and a very competent restorer of oil paintings. While conversing over a glass of wine in The Savage Club one evening in 1997, I mentioned that the oil

painting forming the reredos of my parish church at Caythorpe is in urgent need of cleaning. At once Martin offered to visit Caythorpe to look at it. A month later, I met him at Grantham station and we drove to the Parish Church of St Vincent. It was an overcast morning, and as we walked through the nave the reredos was hardly visible in the relative darkness of the sanctuary. The High Altar and Reredos were donated anonymously in 1893. The Reredos painting depicts the Crucifixion of Christ with figures of the Virgin Mary, St John, and, at the foot of the cross, Mary Magdalene. I had erected a step ladder behind the altar so that Martin was able to inspect the canvas closely. I busied myself in the Sacristy while he carried out his

investigation.

Forty-five minutes later we drove to the Rectory at 6 Arnhem Drive, where my wife had prepared lunch. Martin thought that the painting was completed in the early 19th century, probably for the private Chapel of a country house rather than for a parish church. That might account for the anonymity of the gift fifty years after its completion. He liked the vibrancy of the subject, and once a hundred years of dust and candle smoke had been removed he said that it would glow with colour and gilt, and generally provide a brilliant focus for the worshipping community.



If he was asked to carry out the restoration the reredos would have to be removed and laid flat across the pews in the south aisle. As he was rather busy at the time, he would have to work around his filming schedule (I assumed for "Angela's Ashes", 1999) so the work could spread over several months. I feared for the security of the canvas; Martin agreed and suggested an approach to the Lincoln College of Art would be a safer avenue.

Born in 1918 of a Russian-Jewish father and a Polish-Jewish mother, Martin Benson began his acting career with Arthur Lowe (aka Captain Mainwaring in "Dad's Army"), when they were together in GHQ Alexandria in 1945. He was a brilliant raconteur, and his recounting stories from an imaginary Jewish newspaper had Savage Club members convulsed in laughter at his after-dinner entertainment. The next time you watch "Maurice" coping with Inspector Jacques Clouseau's wayward billiard cues in "A Shot in the Dark", try to imagine this gentle Jew on a step-ladder at the High Altar in Caythorpe Church.

I Wanna Dance With Somebody - Synopsis: A joyous, emotional, heartbreaking celebration of the life and music of Whitney Houston, one of the greatest female R&B pop vocalists of all time, tracking her journey from obscurity to musical superstardom.

Three words to sum up how we felt after watching this film - Absolutely Blown Away. What an amazing journey this film takes you on. One thing we have to say is when doing these reviews we usually sit watching a film with half an eye on what we're going to write about it, looking for little aspects or nuances, things we can pick out as nice touches etc. but we just couldn't do it with this film, it grabs you from early on and you are submerged into the film completely, it flies by without a pause for breath and you are transported back to the 80's and 90's pop scene for a musical extravaganza.

Anyone familiar with the Whitney Houston story knows it's a massive rise and fall story, but thankfully this film, while certainly covering all aspects of the dramatic and complete fall, does not dwell on it mawkishly, more starkly presents it matter of fact while the whole dramatic finale is tastefully and lovingly done. London born Actress Naomi Ackie plays the role to perfection, pretty difficult playing an absolute diva without alienating the audience but she pulls it off with aplomb. This is a must see for any Whitney or pop fan, and a highly recommended to anyone else. Personally we both came out of the cinema feeling great and knowing this was an smash hit 5 out of 5 stars for us. It is pretty hard story material to deal with in parts, however, you still walk out feeling uplifted and joyous, a great cinematographic event that truly celebrates her story.

The only aspect we were partially unsure of was the story telling of her ex husband, Rap Artist Bobby Brown, while the film shows some of the turbulent times of their drug addiction and infidelities, it only touches on these briefly and does not attribute blame to either party. It alludes to certain aspects but falls short of pointing fingers at anybody, it remains somewhat ambiguous on this part of her story.

Neverland and Enchanted Forest's Big Bang!

EYFS and KS1 topic for this term is "How does the climate influence our lives?" The children have created mini biomes as their big bang to start their learning in this geography themed topic. Biomes are regions of the world with similar climate (weather, temperature) animals and plants. There are terrestrial biomes (land) and aquatic biomes, both freshwater and marine. The children created their biomes based on the climate of the British Isles.

Maths Workshop

Thank you to all the parents and carers who attended the Maths workshop last term. To begin our visitors saw maths in Early Years and Key Stage 1. Mr Murphy then led a talk through how maths is taught at Caythorpe in the hall. Finally, we saw maths in action in Key Stage 2. Children throughout the school where applying their knowledge to problem solving activities.

The children demonstrated how they use different resources to support their understanding such as base 10 materials, Cuisenaire, Numicon, number lines and Renkerek counting frames. Nurture Group - Well-Being

This term we introduced a "nurture" group for three lunchtime sessions. The aim of the nurture group is to give children the social and emotional skills to do well at school and with peers and develop their resilience and self-esteem. There is plenty of time for speaking and listening and communication and development of language. The school council asked their classes who would like to attend the group with Mrs Palmer. Currently identified children from that list have been "invited" to attend to keep the numbers to a smaller group which is a principle of nurture. It's proving very popular as some children have expressed that they would like to attend too. To continue the support for the well-being of our pupils – Miss Cook will continue well-being club on Tuesdays in the Spring term. At well-being club, children have the opportunity to share games and activities with friends and talk about what they do or can do to improve their sense of well-being.

In and Around the Garden!

With the current (and, I hope, lasting) interest in biodiversity in our gardens, we are being encouraged to provide food for pollinators all year round. With this in mind, I have started to record which plants are in flower in the dark days of winter. The only pollinators at this time of year are likely to be bees, which sometimes emerge for a quick snack on mild days before going back into hibernation.



Late December offers little choice in my garden. A mahonia and a viburnum were the only shrubs with flowers, plus a very early hellebore and some primroses at ground level. A winter jasmine had a few flowers, but a big surprise was a clematis (*C. cirrhosa - Pictured Top*) bearing lots of pale yellow bell-shaped flowers. I planted it several years ago at the back of a border and forgot about it. As a result it hasn't been fed or watered since and must have been slow to establish, now coming into its own at last. It looks such a frail plant with its little ferny leaves, but clearly a survivor. In mid January, things are looking better for the bees. More hellebores, snowdrops, winter heathers, *Cyclamen coum* and a winter cherry join the list of plants in flower. I haven't seen any bees for a while as the wet and windy weather doesn't suit them, but at least I can enjoy the flowers.



On a very cold but sunny day in December we visited Bodnant Garden in North Wales (Left). There was a backdrop of snow covered mountains, and the gardens looked beautiful. Some of the paths were closed because of ice, but the Winter Walk was very colourful in the sun. Coloured stems of dogwoods, maples and willows glowed amongst sweetly scented winter flowering shrubs. Some of the trees had bark that shines in the low sun – white birches, glistening russet Tibetan cherry (*Prunus serrula*) and the shaggy paper-bark maple (*Acer griseum*). In previous winters we have visited winter walks in Harlow Carr and Anglesey Abbey gardens, which are nearer to home. The plantings are similar, as the choice of plants that perform in

mid-winter is limited. Snowdrops, hellebores and early daffodils extend the season of interest, but unlike most of us, these large gardens have the space for dedicated winter beds. They are, however, full of ideas for brightening up at least a corner of our own garden – all we need is some sun.

We started feeding the birds when we returned from Wales. A big flock of goldfinches appeared soon after, but they haven't been seen since. Most days a group of around ten long tailed tits descends briefly on the fat balls. A few blue tits usually accompany them, but great tits and coal tits visit alone. We have often seen red kites gliding low over the garden in recent weeks, probably checking the verge behind for road kill. There are at least two birds, so perhaps they will breed nearby. **JA**

Not From the Rectory

The Rector enjoyed crepes for Sunday lunch – and ministers to fallen women!

Some of the most loyal readers of this letter have expressed their concern that with the wave of strikes on the railways I would be unable to write the usual letter. I am pleased to advise that I have a couple of rail trips 'up my sleeve' for just such an eventuality!

This particular journey took place after Easter 2022 when, with the complete lifting of Covid travel restrictions, we were able once again to travel abroad and meet up with family – last seen in September 2019!

So, on the day in question, the taxi was with us for 05.40 to take us to the station for the LNER Azuma to King's Cross to allow time for a coffee at Le Pain Quotidien over the road at St Pancras before the rigmarole of security, Covid passport and Passport Control receiving for the first time in many years a stamp in our UK passports!

We had an excellent Eurostar journey to Paris Gare du Nord followed by an expensive taxi ride across the city to Gare de Lyons for the TGV Lyria to Geneva on which – with help from the man in Seat 61 – we knew how to book seats on the upper deck to enjoy the journey on the fast line as far as Bourg en Bresse at which point the train turns away from the TGV line and wends its way through the Alps to emerge on time at Geneva where the nearby Ibis serves the traveller well.

It would be the next morning when we met up with the family having taken the train the shortish distance along the northern shores of Lake Geneva as far as Nyon – a journey which reveals that the Swiss too have great vineyards though very little if any of their wine seems to be for export.

From Nyon the ferry took us across the lake to the French shore at Yvoire — a little to the west of Evian famous for its bottled water: Yvoire was a fortified medieval town with a church dedicated to St Pancras and the town offers many restaurants tempting the visitor to the traditional lunch of fried fish served with French fries and salad and followed by ice cream such as we enjoyed at the Place des Pecheurs.

Geneva hotels give the guest a travel card which entitles you within the city to free transport so it is only as we cross the border that we have to present our bank card and pay for an 'extension ticket' as the bus continues its journey into the French villages nestled below the Jura.





The granddaughters happily re-enacted their Easter Day search in the garden for Easter Eggs and the little one ran back and forth chasing 'buffer-flies'. We associate Switzerland with cheese and chocolate and we had a day to explore the region east of Lausanne where the cows produce the milk which enables the production both of Gruyere Cheese and Maison Cailler chocolate.

One of the highlights of these visits to Geneva is joining the Anglican congregation at the church of the Holy Trinity on the Rue de Mont Blanc: it was a said service of Holy Communion with hymns (the choir being at a choir competition in Zurich) with coffee and croissants served

outside the church – a remaining Covid precaution - by a lady who hailed from Spalding of all places. The Easter Garden was within the altar and in a nod to Swiss tradition included little Easter bunnies!

Sunday lunch was very much a family affair in France at Gex with diners arriving having cast their votes in the French presidential election and in place of English Roast Beef and Yorkshire Pudding it was lunch of savoury crepes followed by sweet crepes for dessert. By the time we caught the bus back to Geneva the exit polls were indicating that Macron would retain his place at the Elysee Palace – and for this cold weather I see Macron is promoting the wearing of turtle necked jumpers in an effort to keep warm! Hopefully another family get-together beckons – but this time in the UK.

When the final steam-hauled train ran on British Railways in 1968, no railway enthusiasts ever expected to see one on a mainline again.

In steam days this class of locomotive would run on the east coast mainline from Kings Cross to Edinburgh and other routes. 


