Richard Naylor

The Autobiography

Richard Naylor lived at Frieston Manor Farm from a 10 year old boy until his death at 73 years old in 2012. Before he died, he dictated much of his life story including many recollections of life in and around Caythorpe and Frieston...

To inject a little bucolic humour I was being tutored by my father on repairing and rebuilding the 1934 Wolesley Hornet engine, this car being the property of our local Rector, Ison, who was the brother of one of the finest tutor's I have ever known, Harold Ison, who was a tutor of Caythorpe School when I was a ten year old boy. He used to write poetry and lived at Cranwell. A fine fellow.

The Rector appeared into the workshop at the same time as the local father of the bride Mr Mike Ward, he was apparently in the Navy and they took photos of his feet which were perfect size 14. Anyway, his father in law was Mr Pepper who lived originally at Far Away Farm (up on Caythorpe Heath). The Rector asked Mr Pepper "how are things?" Mr Pepper had a long list of woes of a very depressing nature on the farm so the Rector then interjected, "never mind Mr Pepper when you get to the next world it will be paradise!" At that point there was a deep intake of breath from Mr Pepper and he had a very broad Lincolnshire accent which he immediately said with considerable panache "I ain't met many of you buggers of a keen to get there". I can hear and see him saying it now, I would be 17.

Frieston Manor Farm



The Charlesworth's previously owned Frieston Manor Farm, they were Farmers. Mrs Charlesworth was Tim Kelway's Auntie. December 9th 1957, my dear Father repurchased Frieston Manor Farm, at the Red Lion Hotel, Sleaford. He had sold it to Mr Charlesworth during my last year at Ranksborough College. He paid £4 – 5,000 then. I remember the horror one night, they were taking the cows back to the fields (over the A607 towards Elms Farm) when it was getting dark and a 3 wheeler Morgan hit one of the best cows and killed it near the Oak Tree on the side of the A607 on the left. The

cow was stone dead. Mr Patterson was Rupert Charlesworth's 'Aide du Con' (so many memories). A lot of the time in those days Farmers were paying to work when the markets went against them. I was a strong growing lad and was eager to work, we spent a lot of time doing up the farmhouse. My dear Mother was busy clearing, we were painting and decorating and staining the beams and moving the furniture around. I was also tidying up things on the farm and ploughing, dragging, we bought a combine drill and my Father and I were seeding corn. I went with my Father to up on the Wolds, they have a Sheep Fair there. My dear Father bought 100 ewes and then we bought two Suffolk rams from Mr Allbone's, later we bought Dorset Rams and Ewes, we already managed to achieve a lambing average of two lambs per ewe.





Mothering Sunday is a day honouring Mothers but has its origins in the Middle Ages. It coincided with Laetare Sunday also known as Refreshment Sunday. It was the fourth Sunday in Lent and the day that people returned to their "mother church" or church where they had been baptised. This pilgrimage was referred to as "going a mothering". In later times domestic servants were given the day off to visit their mother church often with their own mothers. This tradition had fallen away by the early 1900's.



An American woman, Anna Jarvis, from Philadelphia proposed the introduction of



In 1890 a young women Constance Penswick Smith came with her family to Coddington, near Newark, from Dagnall in Buckinghamshire. Her father was the Vicar of Coddington church. Constance was the third of seven children.

Constance campaigned for the restoration of Mothering Sunday in the church calendar. She published a play In Praise of Mother: A story of Mothering Sunday in 1913 as well as A short history of Mothering Sunday in 1915. An influential booklet The Revival of Mothering Sunday eventually persuaded the Church of England to reintroduce Mothering Sunday into the ecclesiastical calendar. The

campaign had lasted for 30 years.

Constance argued that Mothers Day would not have the Christian values of Mothering Sunday. She wrote poems and cards and was the founder member of the Society for the Re-introduction of Mothering Sunday and the Society for the Observance of Mothering Sunday.

Constance died in 1938, at the age of 60 and is buried at Coddington next to her father. - **Robert Prabucki**

ENCOUNTERS - Sir John Betjeman CBE

Interesting Acquaintances of Brian Lucas, the last Rector of Caythorpe



Early in 1964 Dr Hugh Maycock invited me to Sunday afternoon tea in Pusey House, Oxford, where he was Principal. Fr Donald Allchin and a few others were also present. "Come in, sit down" was the welcome from the beaming, scholarly priest. I remember that I was obliged to remove a bag of new potatoes from the chair indicated. We were then introduced to John Betjeman seated next to Fr Hugh. He agreed willingly to read some of his poetry after tea.

Betjeman was born John Betjemann in 1906, the son of a prosperous silverware maker of Dutch descent. They dropped the final 'n' in their surname during the First World War to make it less Germanic. Betjeman was baptised at St Anne's Church, Highgate Rise,

a 19th-century church at the foot of Highgate West Hill. His early schooling was at Highgate School, where he was taught by poet T. S. Eliot. After this, he boarded at the Dragon preparatory school in North Oxford and Marlborough College, a public school in Wiltshire.

During his time here he was drawn to High Church Anglicanism, which nurtured his later writing and conception of the arts. In the poem "Christmas", one of his most openly religious

pieces which I have often quoted in Christmas sermons, the last three stanzas that proclaim the wonder of Christ's birth do so in the form of a question "And is it true...?" Then, in the final stanza he affirms that it is "a simple truth"

"No love that in a family dwells, No carolling in frosty air, Nor all the steeple-shaking bells Can with this <u>single Truth</u> compare – That God was man in Palestine And lives today in Bread and Wine."

Betjeman left Marlborough in July 1925. He entered the University of Oxford with difficulty, having failed the university's matriculation exam. However, he was admitted as a commoner (i.e. a non-scholarship student) at Magdalen College and entered the newly created School of English Language and Literature. At Oxford, Betjeman made little use of the academic opportunities. His tutor, a young C. S. Lewis, regarded him as an "idle prig" and Betjeman in turn considered



Lewis unfriendly, demanding, and uninspiring as a teacher.

Betjeman did not cover himself in academic glory at Oxford, and he left without a degree. Yet, here he was in 1964, at Pusey House in Oxford, speaking to admiring lecturers and post-graduate students about his poetry, a man who within ten years was to be appointed Knight Bachelor and the Poet Laureate. Whilst an undergraduate, however, he had made the acquaintance of people who would later influence his work, including Louis MacNeice and W. H. Auden.

It was a delightful tea-party made hugely enjoyable by the scintillating and witty conversation. Then, crumbs brushed off his crumpled, light three-piece suit, the poet stood and began to recite,

"Miss J. Hunter Dunn, Miss J. Hunter Dunn, Furnish'd and burnish'd by Aldershot sun, What strenuous singles we played after tea, We in the tournament - you against me!"



Ant-Man & The Wasp: Quantumania - Synopsis: Scott Lang and Hope Van Dyne, along with Hank Pym and Janet Van Dyne, explore the Quantum Realm, where they interact with strange creatures and embark on an adventure that goes beyond the limits of what they thought was possible.

So it was on a bright crisp morning that we found ourselves at the best Cinema around watching Marvel's Phase Two latest offering, and the third movie in the Ant-Man series. The first thing to say is, if you are familiar with Marvel movies then this film will feel just like being at home, even more so if you are familiar with the Ant-Man previous movies too, however, if you are not, then this might not be the film for you, as it relies heavily on having seen the previous two before you can make much sense of it. This is no stand alone movie, but very much part of the overall story arc of Marvel Phase Two, including the latest TV Series tie ins. If you've always been a Marvel Comics Fan this probably wouldn't be an issue, but for some it might well be.

The film itself is standard Marvel fare, stunning special effects, superhero saving the day (sort of) storyline building to a big whammy of a showdown, all served with trademark humour and some cheesiness too and if you enjoy Marvel films, this one will be right up your street, however if this isn't your particular genre then you will find it a little hard to enjoy this film other than the aforementioned special effects. Paul Rudd never fails to disappoint as the small time local hero and has real heavyweight back up with Michael Douglas and Michele Pfeiffer reprising their roles once more. Bill Murray shines in his usual smarmy creepy way in a short cameo too. As good as the acting, effects and fan pleasing touches are, we came away feeling that this was a bit of a filler film aimed at moving the story arc along, which we saw some of in Phase One, so instead of absolutely loving this movie, it comes across as slightly short changing us, especially as it's the third in the Ant-Man Trilogy. Hogwarts Reach New Heights



Year 5 & 6 pupils from Caythorpe Primary School took their learning to new levels as they welcomed Simon from Explorer Academy to delve into the world of mountains. The workshop started with a conversation and activities about mountains and ranges across the world, including an exploration into how tectonic plates pushing together over long periods of time create such incredible features of our planet. In and Around the Garden!

A few years ago I decided to reduce the maintenance on the long border beside our drive by planting just shrubs and spring flowering bulbs. The theory was that a layer of fallen leaves every autumn would improve the soil and smother weeds. It has worked, by and large, the border now has clumps of snowdrops and crocus in flower, with daffodils coming into bud, long catkins on a hazel and tiny yellow flowers on Cornelian cherry (Cornus mas). But as nature will have its way, it also has primroses, tiny cyclamen (C.coum), sweet violets and the basal leaves of foxgloves emerging from the leaf litter -



none of which I planted. Rather than fight nature, I have decided to add winter aconites, which are growing well in the back garden, by broadcasting the seed once it is ripe.

Elsewhere there is damage from winter frost on some of the shrubs and evergreen perennials. Some of the penstemons and a couple of less hardy evergreen shrubs look as though they have died. I think I may also have lost a large clump of osteospermum, which is usually

survives the winter. Others. including Choisya 'Sundance' have brown, shrivelled leaves at the branch tips. It hasn't been especially cold, and I think the problem may be the drought last summer. When it finally rained some plants produced new growth, which didn't have time to harden off before it got cold. I'll wait a few weeks before I prune anything back. The truly hardy plants are fine. As well as the early bulbs, hellebores, hazel and witch hazel are looking good, and buds on the earliest of the flowering cherries are starting to open. Some of the beds look rather bare where tall grasses and perennials have been cut back, but daffodils, tulips and alliums are beginning to emerge.

I set up a trail cam to see what goes on in the garden when I'm not around. Woodpigeons seem to feature in most of the shots, including one with a distinctive limp which seems to hang about most of the time. Cut up apples attract blackbirds, and one aggressive female chases the others away, even if she doesn't eat them herself. Crows and jackdaws also like the apples, and will pick up a big piece and fly off with it. In the background of several shots I could see two redwings sorting through the leaf litter for food, a welcome sight. Much less welcome was a muntjac. I thought we had fenced them out after 2 trees were gnawed to death last year. More work required.

Birdsong is now a regular feature as they set up breeding territories. I saw two robins together, not fighting, so they must have paired already, and a great spotted woodpecker is putting a lot of effort into drumming to attract a mate. I also saw two red kites sharing a dead hare on Caythorpe Heath Lane. Perhaps they plan to nest nearby. - JA

Taythorpe & District Garden Society

The speaker for February was Colin Ward from Swines Meadow Farm Nursery, Market Deeping. The nursery carries a wide range of less common plants, including many ferns, and his subject was "Ferns – 50 shades of Green".

Colin started with a slide show of examples of ferns in history and culture. The uncurling fronds are used as a decorative motif, particularly in Maori culture, and including the bishop's crozier in Christianity. Their reproduction is more complicated than other plants, and from spore to young fern can take from 3 months to several years, depending on species. Colin described the process in case we want to try it for ourselves, but luckily they can also be propagated by division.

For the second part of his talk Colin brought along a good selection of different ferns. Their leaves are very variable from long strap-like leaves, through to the highly divided fronds of typical ferns. Many species produce 'sports' or hybridize, so there are a vast number of varieties in cultivation. He brought 3 different varieties of our native hart's tongue fern, for example: the species type, one with wavy edged leaves and another with crested tips. As well as 50 shades of green, some have golden, russet or silvery fronds, but all need shade to perform well.

Colin finished with some of the other shade-loving plants from the nursery, including some winter flowering species. All the plants were for sale, so many of us, inspired by his talk, went home with bulging carrier bags.

Our next meeting will be on 14th March, 7:30pm for 7:45pm at Carlton Scroop Village Hall. Karen Gimson will give a talk on 'Dahlias – growing, keeping, all you need to know.'

CAYTHORPE & FRIESTON PARISH COUNCIL

Well it's finally come! The term of the current Caythorpe and Frieston Parish Council will come to an end at the start of May this year. Elections will take place to replace the council, so we would like to thank everybody for the support that they have given the whole council who have been in position over the last four years, it has been an honour for us all to serve our community.

However, renewal and change are always good to provide fresh ideas and initiatives which are brought in by new people with different skills and energies. It's also a great to get inclusion from the community for the Parish Council.

To that end, if there is anybody out there between the ages of 18 and still living, they can apply to be a Parish Councillor, if you are at the beginning of your career and want to build in a good example of community work & community support then this is an ideal opportunity.

Apply for a seat on the Parish Council and it will look really good on your CV, taking part in the community, take the lead in community projects and going through the democratic process of an election. We need our Parish Council to represent all ages of the community, so please, if you think that you could be of assistance, get an application form from our Clerk, Debbie Manderfield. Complete it and send it into South Kesteven District Council. Currently Caythorpe and Frieston Parish Council is not a politically led Council. There are no political parties at play on the council just members who are interested in serving and supporting the community. It is a great place for you to start in local politics.

The election process is very simple. Caythorpe and Frieston Parish Council have 11 councillors, if 11 or under people apply the names do not go forward for an election competition. The people are simply accepted direct onto the Parish Council and if there is an under provision of councillors then a co-option play process is adopted.

If there is more than 11 people then all the names go on the ballot paper. When people go to cast their vote at the May elections, they will be asked to vote for 11 parish councillors to make up the new Caythorpe and Frieston Parish Council. That's the extent of the election!

The commitment required from individuals is, there is no need to canvas if you do not want, you can if you want to but there isn't a requirement, a general note that you write on your election papers will be displayed adjacent to your name on the official poster which is put out by the SKDC Electoral Department. The commitment of a Councillor, once elected, is to attend six meetings per year and hold various references within your agreed portfolio and these will be decided by the full council at the first meeting.

So again, please, if you have any interest in supporting your community, if you think you could do a better job than the existing Council has done, then please we welcome you on board, we would love you to come and be part of the Parish Council.

Just a little update on some of the work we are completing: the Sunrise Club has donated a bench and this will be sited at the end of Gorse Hill Road where an old existing bench is in place. A local builder will put a new pad down and the chair will be a fixed to the pad with a plaque stating that the Sunrise Club has donated it.

We are still awaiting the County Council to put the lines down to try and keep the High Street clear. However this has been ongoing for some four years. I'm unsure when they will actually get round to doing it. (EDIT: The works were completed on Thursday 16th February).

Mr Sowerby has been experiencing some unpleasant behaviour. Some people who are walking dogs across the field are not picking up the dog muck after them and this is creating a health hazard with people standing in it and when Mr Sowerby cuts the grass, it's also chucking it into the air, so please, if you walk your dogs across the footpath is only right that you pick up after your dog, do not leave it in the field. Strangely some people are bagging it up but then hanging the bags from the hedging or leaving them under the hedge, no-one will be following people round to collect them up so please do the decent thing and take it with you and put it in one of the many dog waste bins provided around the village.

We are planning to run some celebrations over the Coronation Weekend (5th to 8th May 2023). We had a first meeting of the Committee on the 8th February and a second one on the 22nd February, the following has been agreed and is in the process of being organised. If you want to assist in organising any of these please contact the lead for the one you would like to help with.

CARLTON SCROOP & NORMANTON ON CLIFFE PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council has been meeting every two months to discuss a number of local issues.

Budget and Parish Precept for 2023/24 - The Parish Council has agreed a budget for the coming financial year. The budget provides funds for grass cutting, litter picking, dog bins, community speed watch, certain repair and maintenance works in the two villages and the development of initiatives included in the Parish Plan. The budget requires a precept of £8,900 from the District Council and this means the Parish element of the Council Tax will not increase next year.

Highway Matters - Following pressure from the Parish Council and residents, Lincolnshire County Council has agreed to reduce the speed limit from 40mph to 30mph on the A607 through Carlton Scroop. There have been many incidents on this stretch of road, including two serious accidents at the junction of Charity Street and Lodge Farm in the last few months. It is hoped that the new speed limit will come into force by the end of March.

The Parish Council's speed indicator device (SID) will continue to be deployed in order to remind motorists of their speed whilst travelling through the two villages. The Council will also look to introduce a Community Speed Watch Scheme during 2023, if necessary.

The broken finger direction post at the junction of the A607 and the Sudbrook Road has now been restored thanks to Neil Michelson and Fineturf.

Defibrillators - The Parish is covered by two defibrillators, one in the phone box in Normanton On Cliffe and one in Charity Street, Carlton Scroop. In the event of an emergency, ring 999 and if the defibrillator is required, the operator will give you the access code to the defibrillator.

The cabinet at Normanton has been causing problems, so this will be replaced in the next few weeks. The other cabinet and the two defibrillators will have to be replaced in the next few years. New signage for the defibrillator locations has been ordered.

The Travellers Site - An application to make the Traveller site in Carlton Scroop permanent has been refused by the District Council. There has been quite a bit of movement on the site over the past few weeks. The Parish Council will continue to monitor the site to ensure the occupants are complying with the agreed planning conditions.

The Jubilee Field - The Recreation Ground at Carlton Scroop has been re-named "The Jubilee Field". A new hawthorn hedge is to be created around the field with additional seating and an extra dog bin has been installed.

Village Hall & Social Club - The Village Hall at Carlton Scroop is available for hire by individuals or groups. Please contact Janet Bullock on 01400 251032 if you want to hire the

Hall. The Village Hall Committee is always looking for new members so please contact Janet if you would like to get involved.

The cosy Social Club in the Village Hall is open on a Friday & Saturday 7:30pm to 10:30pm – all welcome.

Big prize bingo every month at 8:00pm – eyes down next on 11th March.

FULBECK PARISH COUNCIL

First, District Councillor Penny Milnes advised that SKDC is looking at their budget for 2023-2024. It is likely that a 3.95% increase will be agreed which will mean a £5 increase on Council Tax for a Band D property. This is not set in stone until their budget is finalised. The Parish Council has agreed a 3% increase to its Precept making it £10,067 which will mean an increase of 84p for a Band D property.

The Archer Survey for Rectory Lane has been received and the results show that the criteria for speed enforcement solutions is not met. There are lots of country lanes in the County and many make it difficult to exceed 30 mph. There is a county speed limit review ongoing and the outcome is awaited.

The bench at Northend Green is metal and needs painting – is there a resident nearby who would consider doing that re-paint?

Dog fouling continues to be a problem within the village. We need to ascertain where the worst areas are so that we can get signage put up.

We would ask again that dog owners clear up after their dogs and either put their poo bags into one of the litter bins around the village, or take them home and put them in their black bin.

HOUGH ON THE HILL PARISH COUNCIL

The new Hough on the Hill Parish Council held its first Neighbourhood Plan meeting since its inception in mid October. The first matter on the agenda was for the new Council to discuss whether the Neighbourhood Plan update would still go ahead and although it was a close call, it was agreed it would be continued. Unlike the previous Council, this Council will work on the Plan as a whole and not with a Committee.

There are still corrections to be made to the Design Code and a weblink has been put on to Next Door and on the PC website asking for people to read the Code and put forward any amendments they are aware of.

Local Green Spaces instigated a lot of discussion and it was obvious that neither the Councillors nor the public were clear as to what these entail and so we are endeavouring to get a planning officer to come and speak to us on this subject.



Not From the Rectory

A month in which the Rector learns the benefits of split ticketing!



Three of the 10 parish churches in the Southcliff Benefice are in Simon Jenkins' 1,000 'Best Churches' and I happened to note that the Parish Church of Bridlington is also listed, as a child our summer holidays were spent mainly on the Lincolnshire coast apart from one year when we did make it to Scarborough but I had never been to its sister resort of Bridlington so this seemed a good reason to correct the omission.

However, a simple enquiry on the LNER website for the train from Grantham to Bridlington directs the passenger to an LNER train to Doncaster and there to join the Northern Rail all station service from Sheffield to Bridlington with no mention of the alternative of the direct Hull Trains service from Grantham to Hull!

Amend the booking enquiry to Grantham to Hull and the Hull Trains direct service is duly offered with a separate onward booking for the Hull to Bridlington train via Cottingham, Beverley, Hutton Cranswick and Driffield.

The old town is a good 15 minute walk up from the station and so to the 3 star Priory Church.

The priory ranked second only to York in the county of Yorkshire but the last prior's support for the Pilgrimage of Grace protesting against the Reformation ensured its destruction was



savage but even so the remaining nave which survived to become the Parish Church is still a 'mighty building' (Jenkins) to which G C Scott added the west towers in the 1870's. The organ is an impressive instrument and the history of the Priory is well told in a series of embroidered panels and recent royal visitors are captured in stone by the mason – who do they depict?

On the advice of the Church Welcomer we headed to the Georgian Old Town (used in the recent Dad's Army film) for lunch in the gardens behind the Georgian tea shop before heading in a taxi to the Victorian seaside resort from which the church and old town 'stand aloof' (Jenkins)

Tempting as was the one hour cruise on the Yorkshire Belle to Flamborough Head our booked return tickets did not allow for any slippage in the ship's departure and timely return so we opted for a walk along the promenade in the direction of Flamborough before catching the land-train back which allowed time for a relaxing cup of tea overlooking the North Sea before our return service to Hull and the onward Hull Trains service to Grantham in the course of which we were served tea and biscuits, sandwiches and crisps.



Certainly worth a return visit and not just to buy another jar of the Priory's Rhubarb and Ginger jam!


