

Richard Naylor

The Autobiography

Richard Naylor lived at Frieston Manor Farm from a 10 year old boy until his death at 73 years old in 2012. Before he died, he dictated much of his life story including many recollections of life in and around Caythorpe and Frieston...



In the 1950's my dear father was advised by Mr Shaw of Natwest Bank to invest in Blue Chip investments to create wealth for other Britons, it was supposedly totally safe within their price holding. Knowing our luck though, of course we should have known, we would never have any. We invested £60,000 in British companies, supposedly safe investments. This was the beginning of ruination because the share prices went through the floor, and nothing absorbs money like farming.

Just to lighten the mode, Charlie Godson who worked for my father had a cap on his pipe to avoid a fire. My dear father used to buy him old shag tobacco which he would smoke. In the 18th Century it would be called Tabac or Baccy. One windy day my father set him a task ploughing the Skillgate's which is down Frieston Lane over what was the railway crossing, first field on your left. My dear father had bought a new

trilby hat and the wind had swept it off his head and he never swore, I could see his neck going red and he went across to Charlie who had just ploughed the trilby in. He said 'look what you've done Charlie, you've ploughed my new trilby in.'

Mr Pick was the apportionment officer for growing sugar beet, you had to have a license from him to be approved because you would then be booked in at Kelham Beet factory for processing sugar beet. We grew 6 acres of beet and several acres of mangleworsels and swedes with quite an area of kale. I used to cut it to feed to the milking cows and put it on a 17 foot wide buck rake. It's a very tedious crop to grow in those days because you had to single out the sugar beet with a hoe and an acre is a heck of a lot to do. When I first started doing it I was down and my hands and knees singling it out with my fingers.

Then at harvest time (October) my dear father and I used to lift the sugar beet, knock it together, top and tail it with a beet knife and then these rows seem to go on forever and you heaped up the beet ready for collection with the tractor and trailer. We used a fork with lobes on the end so the beet isn't damaged. Men from Ireland used to come over and help the Wards lift their beet crop, they worked on a piece work basis and we were praised by the Irish men when they said 'you and your father can certainly work'. The beet field was a triangular field next to the bridge on the left side.

Fulbeck History Group have to announce with regret that, after nearly nine years, we decided to dissolve the group. Several members of the committee had decided to stand down, and one has left the area. The disruption to meetings from Covid has not helped either. We felt the time had come to bring the Group to a close, but with hope of a future!

During all that time, we have amassed a large amount of information about Fulbeck which is filed and locked in a secure cabinet. We have been privileged to attend many interesting talks and discussions about Fulbeck and surrounding areas, as well as more regional and national based ones which highlighted historical events having an impact on the lives and fabric of Fulbeck. Plus just one or two examples of events with a difference: we had a wonderful coffee morning trying to collect audio memories from some of the older residents, an interesting time detecting with an authorised group, an evening of local folk songs illustrating customs and a guided tour and research opportunity at Lincolnshire Archives. The notes from these will be collected together for future reference. We hope to publish some of this large resource in the pages of this august journal!

Partly due to the generosity of Butch and Rachel Marshall, who ran the Tack Room Café at Fulbeck Craft Centre for a number of years, we have accumulated a large sum of money, This is now being kept safely ringfenced in the bank account of the local Village Hall and Playing Fields Committee. We do not want it to moulder away there. We have already had several ideas on how some of it could be used, including a rose and plaque for Butch who did so much for the group and village, and who sadly died a couple of years ago.

One very exciting idea is to consider funding a kind of bursary or grant scheme. This could be for people needing a specified amount to help carry out a project concerned with local Fulbeck history, for example: publishing a research paper, pamphlet or book. Alternatively, The Fulbeck History Group might be resurrected in the future, in which case some start up funding would be there. We would need to set criteria, application processes etc to ensure the money is well spent! Whatever is decided, the funds will be used in accordance with the original purpose of the group; to gather and make available information, and encourage the development of knowledge, about Fulbeck's history.

And meanwhile, look out for occasional titbits in News and Views! Anne Watler






ENCOUNTERS - Dame Darcey Bussell DBE

Interesting Acquaintances of Brian Lucas, the last Rector of Caythorpe

In 1995 Joy and I were invited to a cocktail party at 10 Downing Street. Having accepted my second large Gin & Tonic from a passing tray in the State Room, I noticed the actress Wendy Richard sitting alone, but as we moved toward her, John Major approached us. I greeted him breezily, "Jolly good G and T, Prime Minister." He said he was glad we were enjoying the party and asked if we liked ballet. I replied that we loved it, then taking Joy's arm and mine he steered us over to a small group in the corner, "Some fans of yours, Darcey" he said and as she turned, I was enchanted by the sincerity and warmth of this beautiful dancer. I was in awe of her and so I asked awkwardly if she was 'resting' at present. Before she could answer, Joy, realizing that I was struggling, asked her if it was very painful. At once Darcey and Joy were engrossed in conversation about the treatment and the length of time before she could dance again. I knew that



I was treading on 'broken glass' and kept quiet. Later Joy explained that she had read about Darcey's ankle injury in The Times on the train that morning.

Darcey was born in London on 27 April 1969. Her parents divorced when she was three, her mother remarried and Bussell was adopted by her mother's new husband, Australian dentist Philip Bussell. The family spent some time in Australia, where Darcey attended school before they returned to London for her to be educated at Fox Primary School in Kensington before she was offered a place at the Royal Ballet Lower School, based at White Lodge, Richmond Park, aged 13. At 16, she progressed to the Royal Ballet Upper School in Baron's Court, before joining the Sadler's Wells Royal Ballet in 1987.




While Bussell was still at school, the choreographer Kenneth MacMillan had noticed her exceptional technique, and in 1988 he decided to use her to create the leading role in his ballet "The Prince of the Pagodas" to Benjamin Britten's music, which led to her moving to the Royal Ballet. A year later, in December 1989 on the opening night of the show, she was promoted to principal dancer at just 20 years old. She was 26 at the time of our meeting, already world famous, and at the pinnacle of her profession, yet totally unassuming and quite unaffected by stardom. It was a most delightful encounter.

Darcey was appointed a Dame Commander of the Order of the British Empire (DBE) in the 2018 New Year Honours for services to dance.

ENCOUNTERS - Percy Hunt - The Great Marvello

Percy Hunt was a health & strength league athlete. He proudly boasted that he was the "fittest man in the world", which was a huge claim for a road-sweeper in Port Talbot. He had a gymnasium in Aberavon, of which I was a member for a few years in my late teens. The walls were covered with photographs of Percy in his hey-day holding a Winner's Cup or Medal. Percy was a friendly man of short stature with bulging muscles. I started in his beginner class, but he soon had me performing 'Butterflies' on the rings. Most of his members were young steelworkers who wanted to keep fit. Although I was not up to performing tricks on the vaulting horse, I was quite nimble on the parallel bars!




Many years later, when I was driving along Pen-y-cae Road in Port Talbot, I saw Percy on his bike with shovel

and brush attached, and a notice on the front "King of the Road". I stopped for a chat with this delightful gentleman who took a pride in all he did. © **Brian Lucas 2023**



CAYTHORPE & FRIESTON NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN REFERENDUM: May 4th

The Neighbourhood Plan has now been completed and has been submitted for referendum. This is the final stage of a process that started with the designation of the parish as a Neighbourhood, back in June 2020.

The Referendum Version of the Plan and the independent examiner's report may be seen on the Parish and SKDC websites - search for **Caythorpe and Frieston Neighbourhood Plan** in your browser. For those without internet access, **a paper copy of the Plan can be found in the porch of St. Vincent's Church.** The Plan includes 7 objectives and 13 policies on future development in the parish. These were put together following extensive public consultation.

The referendum will be held on May 4th, alongside the Local Government elections. Please note that there has been a change to the rules, and photo ID is needed for you to vote at the polling station. A wide range of documents is acceptable, including a bus pass or blue badge, but check with SKDC if in doubt.

We would like to thank all those who have been involved in the process and taken part in the various surveys and questionnaires . It has truly been a community project.

SWRA splashes out for local charities!

Sir William Robertson Academy is on course to raise over £3500 for local charities and good causes after once again taking part in the three-day Grantham Rotary Club Swimarathon.



This event took place over the weekend of

3rd – 5th February, with a record number of swimmers from the school taking part. Yet again they raised an incredible amount of money, with one individual securing over £500 thanks to their employer matching sponsorship pledges pound for pound.

On the Saturday it was the turn of SWRA's pupils to swim. 40 pupils from Y7 - Y12 swam over a thousand lengths in total, with just over £2100 pledged. This is potentially the school's highest fundraising amount to date, with around £3500 pledged in total towards the Rotary Club's target of £30,00 for the local community.

Mrs Christina Mower, Head of Year 7 at Sir William Robertson Academy, praised the 'amazing effort and commitment of our SWRA family', describing how the teamwork, leadership, communication skills and confidence of all involved improved as a result.

Sir William Robertson Academy is incredibly proud of everyone who took part and very grateful to their friends and families for all the support and encouragement they provided.





Josh Sharman, Tower Captain at All Saints Hough on the Hill, very much hopes that with your help all 5 bells will be ringing to celebrate the coronation of King Charles.

Currently the 5th bell – the tenor bell- cannot be rung until repairs to put the bell into a safe and serviceable condition have been completed by Blyth & Co's workshop at Collingham.

We have the Faculty to undertake the work which is priced at £3,000 net of VAT and against which we have received grants of £904 leaving a drawdown on the PCC funds of £2,196 which, with urgent work to churchyard trees estimated to cost an additional £5,000, the PCC can ill afford but we look to 44 generous friends of the church to each contribute £50 and cover the shortfall in full.

Obviously if our donors are also able to make a Gift Aid declaration that will be greatly appreciated – and Gift Aid forms are available from the Treasurer.

Sunday 7th May - Street Party - Caythorpe High Street 12pm - 6pm between the Waggon & Horses and the Red Lion, tables and chairs will be set up and people will be asked to bring their own food and join together in celebrating the Kings Coronation. A children's entertainer and a disco will also be provided and again food will be on sale from both the Red Lion and the Waggon & Horses for those that don't wish to make your own food. A road closure permit has been requested. Unfortunately that will mean the local residents who live in that little stretch of road will not have car access during that time.



Monday 8th May - Community Volunteering On the Monday, the King has asked we use it as a volunteering day which is a good idea. Andy Crawley is organising a litter pick along the A607 to get rid of all the rubbish on there, and also mulching of the vast number of trees that we have planted in

our community over the past year or so, to ensure that they're

in good order and kept alive. We will also be doing other community volunteering events such as painting the wall in the Playing Field area and any other jobs that people wish to put forward that would benefit the community? The King's Champion

On visiting the Museum of Lincolnshire Life in Lincoln recently, we came upon a display about the Queen's Champion.

The Honourable The King's (or Queen's) Champion is an honorary and hereditary office in the Royal Household of the British sovereign. The champion's original role at the coronation of a British monarch was to challenge anyone who contested the new monarch's entitlement to the throne to trial by combat. This took place at the Coronation Banquet.



The Dymoke family of the Manor of Scrivelsby near Horncastle in Lincolnshire has held the hereditary office of **King's Champion** since its inception in Norman times.

The current head of the family is Francis John Fane Marmion Dymoke born 1955 and a chartered accountant. There is a connection between the Dymoke family and the Fane family of Fulbeck and also to Rachel Fane the wife of Sir Edward Royd who owned Stubton Hall.

The traditional ritual was last fully performed in 1821 at the Coronation of King George IV. The champion was accompanied by the Duke of Wellington and the 1st Earl of Effingham. The next King, King William IV held no Coronation Banquet and at Queen Victoria's Coronation in 1838 it was decided not to include the traditional ride and challenge of the champion.

At the coronation of King Edward VII the champion bore the Standard of England in Wesminter Abbey.

More recently, Francis Dymoke's father attended the Coronation of Queen Elizabeth II as Queen's Champion and and bore the Union Standard.

SYNOPSIS: Woody Harrelson stars in the hilarious and heart-warming story of a former minor-league basketball coach who, after a series of missteps, is ordered by the court to manage a team of players with intellectual disabilities. He soon realises that despite his doubts, this can go further than ever imagined.

Her: For me, this film was a bit of a twist on the 80's hit Wildcats which I loved. The 'Friends' (the team of players with intellectual disabilities) were all fantastic and funny, each showing their individuality and demonstrating that having a disability is not a barrier to achieving anything.

There was, of course, back stories for each character, however, the biggest change came from within Marcus (Woody) going from an unbelieving coach that the 'Friends' were able to achieve anything to knowing them so well that he knew they were all Champions and truly believed in each and every one of them.

I knew I was going to love this film before I even sat down and it certainly didn't disappoint. My rating this month: 4 out of 5.

Him: If you are looking for a feel good movie then step right up and enjoy this offering. It manages to be a rare beast indeed, namely an American film that deals with the emotional side of life without being cheesy or schmaltzy at all. There are some slightly predictable moments with some not so predictable ones too, but you can easily put that aside and enjoy this movie for what it is, a genuine true story (albeit an Americanised version of an actual Spanish Basketball team with intellectual disabilities, as depicted in the 2018 film 'Campeones').

Bobby Farrelly makes his solo directing debut, after many smash hits with his brother, Peter, such as 'Dumb & Dumber' & 'Shallow Hal'. This film has lots of comedic quality, but is not an in your face, laugh every minute comedy, more a great heartwarming story told with quality comedic touches along the way. Well directed, and incredibly acted by all concerned, it manages to draw you in to both believe in and care about all the characters. You will walk out feeling great and thoroughly entertained, 4 out of 5 for me too.

'Ironman' Actor Robert Downey Jr. Buys Grantham Town F.C.



Following the success of Wrexham F.C. under Actor Ryan Reynolds' ownership, including the TV documentary 'Welcome To Wrexham' on Disney +, Grantham Town have accepted the offer from 'Ironman' himself, actor Robert Downey Jr.

From the 2023/24 season onwards 'The Gingerbreads' will feature in a Netflix TV show titled 'Greetings From Grantham', recording what they hope will be a groundbreaking run to get promoted all the way to the Premiership.

There will be a new away kit (pictured below) to celebrate this collaboration along with a new club motto 'Vindices Convocate', which translates as 'Avengers Assemble'.

The takeover must be completed by Midday on 1st April to be recognised by the league in time for the following season. League Spokesman, Mr T. Hanos has expressed objections to the takeover, stating it would see a potential 50% reduction in attendances elsewhere but has said that it was 'inevitable'.

Furthermore, Downey Jr. Has stated that the current ground next to Grantham's Meres Leisure Centre will not be large enough for Premiership football and alternative sites outside

Grantham have been explored, including Fulbeck Sports Ground, where a proposed 40,000 seater

'Marveldome' has received preliminary planning permission.

Grantham Town have also expressed an interest in signing Norwegian wonder kid striker Thor Odinson from Valhalla F.C. of Asgard, Norway, the striker is said to have lightning speed and can hit the ball 'like a hammer'.



In and Around the Garden!

Even for March the weather has been wild lately. In the space of 3 days we have had warm sun, gale force winds, snow, hail, rain and a hard frost. Fortunately, the spring flowering plants are built to withstand all sorts of weather, and once the snow melted they all stood to attention and opened their flowers again.

I grow mainly short daffodils, including the native Welsh daffodil, and they came through beautifully. With so many large trees in the garden, wind is always a worry, but apart from a lot of thin twigs torn off the birch trees, there hasn't been any damage that I can see.

March is the last chance to tidy up old leaves and stems from last year, before they get in the way of the new growth. I cut down all the ferns and the remaining perennials and grasses, but I was glad I left the Phlomis until last. The old seed heads in whorls around the stem looked rather striking with a cap of snow. Parts of the garden look bare now, but the spaces will soon be filled with new foliage.

Starting to emerge are other perennials, including *Brunnera*, with its tiny, forget-me-not blue flowers, and the yellow daisies of Leopard's Bane (*Doronicum*). Why is it called Leopard's Bane? It may be because it was believed to be toxic to animals, and its natural range overlapped with the leopard in Turkey and Syria at one time, though the animals are extinct in those areas now.

The frogs laid their spawn just before the worst of the weather on top of the plants at the edge of the pond. As a result a lot of it was forced out of the water as it swelled, and was covered with ice. They did the same last year, and not a single tadpole emerged. This year I scooped a lot of it into a bowl and put it in the greenhouse, where I hope it will stand a better chance. Once the tadpoles (if any) have developed a little, they can go back in the pond.





Phlomis in Snow



I have often wondered why bees seem to waste so much time and energy dithering about choosing a flower to visit, when they all look the same. According to a book I read recently,



the reason is that bees have smelly feet. When they visit a flower they leave the smell behind, and the next bee to arrive can detect it. If the smell is strong it knows that the nectaries will have been sucked dry and doesn't bother landing. Not wasting time after all.

The book in question is Silent Earth, by Dave Goulson. It is an interesting, if rather distressing read, documenting the catastrophic loss of invertebrates of all sorts, especially pollinating insects, and speculating on the long term effects this will have on the planet and humans in particular. So I'll do what I can. Every little helps — I hope. — JA

Taythorpe & District Garden Society

Karen Gimson, a professional gardener, designer, writer and broadcaster, was the speaker at our March meeting. Karen has a large garden near Loughborough, where she grows a lot of flowers for cutting. These include many dahlias, the main subject of her talk.

She first encouraged us to show annual seeds in spring for flowers to cut right through the summer. Sweet peas, cosmos and pot marigolds and, of course, dahlias provide the colour for summer bouquets, with *Ammi majus* (a posh cow parsley) and other white flowers for contrast. She favours the 'pick a bunch and stick them in a pot' approach to flower arranging. The results, shown in her colourful slides, are both informal and charming.

Karen then gave us lots of useful information about growing dahlias. They can be grown from seed started indoors early in the year, or from tubers. These can be started in trays, half covered with gritty compost, to produce short shoots to use as cuttings, or simply planted out when the weather warms up. She advised us to select the heaviest, firmest tubers when shopping for new stock. With occasional doses of tomato feed and protection from slugs and earwigs, they will flower from July until the first frost. In areas with free draining soil, dahlias can be left in the ground over winter if kept dry. Otherwise they should be lifted stored in a frost free place, with many different varieties to choose from, dahlias offer something for everyone.

Our April meeting will be on Tuesday 11th at 7:30pm for 7:45pm in Carlton Scroop Village Hall. Andrew Wilcox from Harlow Carr will be speaking on biodiversity and wild flowers. Visitors (£5) and new members welcome – just come along.

WHAT DO LOCAL COUNCILS DO?

Your local (parish and town) council has overall responsibility for the wellbeing of your local community. Their work falls into three main categories:

- Delivery of services
- Improve quality of life for residents
- Give communities a democratic voice

Local councils run numerous services, depending on the size of the council. Many you will see day-to-day, but some are less known. These include introducing solar panels, setting up dementia-friendly groups, organising community buses, creating neighbourhood plans, implementing suitable housing, establishing youth projects, managing allotments and open spaces, maintaining footpaths, public seating and litter bins.

BECOMING A LOCAL COUNCILLOR

Local councillor responsibilities fall into three main categories:

- Decision-making
- Monitoring
- Getting involved locally

Local councillors attend to local needs of residents, local groups and businesses, make decisions on local services, collaborate with district and borough councils to adhere to local needs, and progress vital projects to invest in the future of the community.

CAN I STAND FOR ELECTION?

To stand for election to a local council you must be:

- A UK or Commonwealth citizen; or be a citizen of the Republic of Ireland; or be a citizen of another Member State of the European Union
- At least 18 years old
- An elector of the local council; or in the past 12 months occupied land or other premises in the area the local council serves (as owner or tenant); or work in the area local council serves (as your principal or only place of work); or live within three miles of the local council boundary

FULBECK PARISH COUNCIL

The closing date for applications for election nominations is 4th April. We should know on 5th April whether we will have an election, both for the Parish Council and/or District Council. Notices will be put on our website and on the noticeboard at the village hall.

Our District Councillor advised that the Best Kept Village competition is changing this year. Villages will have to apply to SKDC and may have to pay a fee; photographs will be required. There will be no cash prize but there may be a plaque for the winners. More information at a later date.

Fly tipping continues to be a problem within the village – the recent tipping on Brant Road has been reported and will hopefully be cleared up soon.

It is hoped that we can get our verges and hedges back to nature and encourage wildlife to return. We are hoping to get someone from the Wildlife Trust to attend our Annual Parish Meeting on 15th May (7pm start) to give us some ideas for discussion.

The bench opposite Ashers on the A607 was in a poor state and has now been removed. Thanks to two residents who have offered to refurbish the bench at North End Green.

We now have planning permission to replace the noticeboard on Rectory Lane, on the side wall of the Hare and Hounds. We are looking to get a grant (they should be available again after the Coronation) but if not, then we will budget for it in 2024. If this is delayed until 2024 then the existing noticeboard may be refurbished for the time being.

We will be asking SKDC to provide new Dog Fouling notices around the village.

We are trying to come up with a new telephone system for when someone needs to use the defibrillator. There are various options and this is ongoing.

FULBECK PARISH COUNCIL – ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

This is the one meeting of the year that is purely for Parishioners to have their say and ask questions. This year, the meeting will be held on **15th May**, shortly after **7pm** (the Annual Meeting of the Parish Council will happen first but should only take a few minutes) and it is hoped to have someone from the Wildlife Trust to come and speak to us.

We are hoping to encourage wildlife back to the village and this is done through limiting grass cutting and hedge cutting. We are keen to get the views of parishioners and hope that you will therefore try and attend this meeting. It will also be an opportunity to meet your new Parish Council.

Not From the Rectory

A month in which the rector thinks he may have become a 'gongoozler'!

A new word and a new activity: a gongoozler is a person who enjoys watching activity on the canals of the United Kingdom; and more generally to describe those who have an interest in canals and canal life but do not actively participate. Funnily enough the word may derive (I learn) from words in the Lincolnshire dialect where 'gawn' and gooze' both mean to stare or gape!



The day out started unremarkably with the train from Grantham to London King's Cross where we caught first the number 30 bus to Baker Street and then the 18 bus onward to Bishop Bridge Road to arrive at the Paddington terminus of the Grand Union Canal and Little Venice where Regent's Canal branches off to reach the Thames at Limehouse. Gongoozling starts straightaway and continued over lunch which was taken at the Café Laville which sits above the Maida Tunnel allowing a grand view of narrow boats entering the tunnel as they head east. There is a Blue Plaque at nearby 32 Aberdeen Place recording that Wing Commander Guy

Gibson had at some stage lived there.

Suitably refreshed the intrepid travellers kept to the towpath with elegant mansions rising on both sides and the canal passes through by the London Zoo to reach the hustle and bustle of Camden Market though only a mere stone's throw further on at Hawley Wharf all was peace and quiet for the opportunity for a pot of



Earl Grey with chocolate hazelnut bars to accompany it. Camden marks the first of a number of locks which the boats need to traverse on their way to the Thames while for the towpath walker the train lines into St Pancras are above and then on your left are the familiar Victorian gasometers cleverly re-fashioned. This is perhaps one of the most chic parts of the canal which continues is way into the lengthy Islington tunnel and which obliges the walker to leave the towpath and attempt to trace his steps through to re-join the canal. Far easier said than done and even asking for directions at the police station produced the reply that while 'we might work here we don't live here' and couldn't direct us through their 'manor' - I'm sure Dixon of Dock Green would be turning in his grave!

However, the diversion did lead us into the Camden Passage – think The Shambles at York – and to the delightful discovery of an Austrian coffee and cake house at Kipferl where Apfelstrudel and Gooseberry Streuselkuchen went down a treat. Any hope of reaching Limehouse and the end of the canal had to be put on hold as it was with increasingly weary



steps we continued forward to the Kingsland Road (A10) which offered the welcome sight of a bus to the Grey's Inn Road and an onward bus to King's Cross — we shall return and take in the Victoria Park on the remaining 4 miles along what is described as one of London's best kept secrets!




