Well done to Year 6. We have been so impressed with your resilience throughout the KS2 SATs this week. The school held a free of charge year 6 breakfast club to ensure all children were where learning comes first settled and well fed and watered.



Wow Homework Projects

Each term, pupils are set homework challenges which complement the topics they are learning. Harriet, in Narnia, has produced a stunning model of a rainforest, complete with rainforest creatures, vegetation and a waterfall.

Summer clubs

We are proud of the range of clubs we have on offer at Caythorpe. This term children are enjoying arts and crafts, football, cricket, well-being, running, homework/reading and gardening club. Gardening club have been doing an excellent job, tidying the sensory garden, planning and planting out plants and seeds.

Hogwarts Magistrates Workshop

Hogwarts took part in a Magistrates workshop on Monday. The children were visited by a working magistrate, who explained what a Magistrates Court is and what Magistrates do there. The classroom was set up as a model courtroom. The class worked as a team to play all the roles in their 'mock trial'. All the children were actively involved in the decision-making process regarding the sentencing outcome following the 'hearing.'

The children discussed social awareness, the concept of rules and law, personal responsibility and the impact of sentencing in a court of law. The children also talked about the fine line between bullying and criminal behaviour.

The workshop encouraged 'team-working', decision making, sound judgement, social awareness, public speaking & consequential thinking.

A Surprise Visitor to Enchanted Forest

As part of their English lessons, children in Enchanted Forest have been reading the book "The Tiger Who Came to Tea!" by Judith Kerr.

ENCOUNTERS - Mrs Moyra Mintoff OM

Interesting Acquaintances of Brian Lucas, The Last rector of Caythorpe



When the Malta Labour Party won the 1971 General Election, its Leader, Dominic Mintoff, became Prime Minister of Malta, and immediately set out to re-negotiate the post-Independence military and financial agreements with the United Kingdom. He began this process with the immediate eviction of all British Forces and their families, before Christmas 1971. No.203 Squadron RAF, and its fleet of Nimrod maritime patrol aircraft, deployed to the Italian Air Base at Sigonella in Sicily, while No.13 Squadron

removed its Canberra PR aircraft to RAF Akrotiri in Cyprus. Other personnel began to ship equipment back to UK.

In March 1972, just a few hours before an aircraft Tugmaster tractor was due to topple the big Radar Head and its tower at RAF Fort Madalena on the north coast of the island, UK Prime Minister Sir Edward Heath concluded a Military Facilities Agreement with Mintoff, and the RN and the RAF returned to occupy their bases on the island. I was the first military chaplain to return in early May and resumed services in the Station Church at RAF Luqa, having first 'borrowed' the Officers' Mess piano until a replacement organ arrived.

In 1947 Dom married Moyra de Vere Bentinck, whom he had met in a meeting of the Fabian Society when he was a Rhodes Scholar at Oxford. She was born in 1917, in Dungiven, County Londonderry, Northern Ireland; Her father was Baron Reginald Joseph Bentinck, and her mother, Florence Frederika de Vere Beauclerk, was born in Rome. In 1971 Moyra was estranged from Dom and lived in the UK, but I understand that during the military negotiation she was persuaded to return to the family home at "Olives" in Tarxien, Malta.

We first met when she attended one of my first said 09:00 am Holy Communion services in the Station Church of St Christoper at RAF Luqa. She asked if she could attend every week as she wanted to avoid the ex-Pat congregation at the Anglican Cathedral in Valetta preferring the anonymity of my early Sunday service. She asked about my wife, and I explained that Joy played the organ for the 10:00 am Family Eucharist, but she would be welcome to call at our home in the fishing village of Marsascala. About a month later the doorbell rang just after 6 o'clock in the evening; Joy was upstairs bathing Mark, and I was carrying baby Simon. "I've called at a bad time!" Moyra had a thrilling voice reminiscent of the actress Fenella Fielding. "Not at all", I replied, "Please come in. Joy is upstairs bathing the three-year-old." With a big smile she said, "Give him to me" and took Simon from my arms, and as I cried out, "Joy, Mrs Mintoff is coming to help you", she went upstairs. Within minutes there was much laughter and splashing about.

The Maltese Parliament sat in the evening because of the daytime Mediterranean heat, so, having few local friends she could trust, Moyra must have been quite lonely. Now at ease in our company, she would often arrange on a Sunday morning to call one evening during the week. She would arrive in her big Mercedes and enjoy a G&T as we talked and talked about a wide range of subjects. She had a profound understanding of human nature and was sure in her opinion.


She was genuinely sorry when the time came for us to return to the UK in 1975. We kept in touch in the years that followed; she even wrote a long letter asking how our baby daughter Helen was getting on when she accompanied Dom to a Heads of Commonwealth Conference in Canada. We last met when I invited her to join me for afternoon tea in my hotel during a



flying visit in 1995. I was waiting outside as she drove up in the familiar huge Mercedes, which was now sporting a few dents. Leaving the engine running, she jumped out to greet me, adding, "Will you park this for me; it's impossible!"

In & Around The Garden

As summer approaches the garden has undergone a huge change. The daffodils and tulips are finished, and the next big job is to remove their dying foliage. The mulched earth has all but disappeared as the perennials come through and start to bulk up. This can be a time where there is less colour in the beds, but alliums are starting to bloom in place of the tulips and the early flowering perennials, though generally less flamboyant than those that will come later, are looking very pretty.

Sheets of Dicentra formosa (Wild bleeding heart), with blue-green ferny leaves and flowers in shades of pink and white, cover the ground in the shade. In the sunnier areas, orange Atlas poppies and geums, together with yellow and orange Welsh poppies, catch the eye.

Everywhere there is fresh foliage of many different colours, ranging from pale yellow and silver to almost black, giving interest even where flowers are scarce. My favourite plants at the moment are the ferns. With so much shade to contend with, I have planted about 40 different varieties. Many of them are in a rockery bed beneath a spreading juniper, and although most of them are green, the variety of form is remarkable. As the fronds unfold they make strange shapes, which I find fascinating. They have a reputation for needing constant moisture, but in fact there are many that do well in drier conditions and a few that positively dislike wet roots, what most need is shade.

During the drought last summer I watered most of them only twice. The exceptions were the popular Japanese painted fern and Shuttlecock Fern, which did need extra water. Planted in the right place ferns are extremely low maintenance; a tidy-up and mulch in spring is all they need.

The cherry blossom season was spectacular, as usual, but now the trees are just making a



mess with fallen petals smothering paths and other plants. However, other trees are now blossoming – horse chestnut, rowan and hawthorn among them. Particularly beautiful is our native Whitebeam(pictured); there is one just on our boundary that looks wonderful against a blue sky, with silvery-pale green leaves and clusters of pure white flowers. Later it will have red berries that are popular with birds.

The first fledglings are starting to appear, tweeting for food in the trees. Robins nested in a small conifer and great tits used one of the nest boxes, and their babies

are now out and about. I'm sure other birds have nested in the garden, but I don't search for the nests for fear of disturbing them. Judging by the birdsong we hear in the mornings, there are chiffchaff, wren, dunnock, song thrush, blackbird, chaffinch and goldfinch nesting close by. The pond has at least 9 common newts breeding, but the tadpoles seem to have disappeared. I hope there are some hiding in the pondweed, but dragonfly larvae, water boatmen and the newts predate them, no wonder frogs have to lay so many eggs. JA

Taythorpe & District Garden Society

Lincolnshire bulb specialist and many times RHS Gold Medal winner Johnny Walkers was our speaker for the May meeting. His topic "Every Show has a Story", was an account of the trials, tribulations and happy outcomes of entering daffodils in national horticultural shows.

Proudly wearing a tie hand painted with daffodils, Johnny explained that there is a lot more to showing daffodils than simply going into a bulb field and picking them. Walkers Bulbs grow about 400 different varieties, which flower naturally from around New Year until May, with most in March and April. The show season starts in February and ends in July, so it requires considerable expertise and forward planning to produce an award-winning display of many different varieties when they would normally be out of season.

To be ready for show when the bulbs would not normally be flowering, a complicated process of heating, cooling and forcing in warmth, then storing the flowers in cool conditions before the show is necessary. Even so, 150 varieties are grown for each show to give around 70 vases of 30 flowers for display. Johnny tries to get something distinctive for each show, such as unusual colours and shapes, good scent and newly bred varieties. He avoids double flowers, however, as they are the most unreliable. Such care and attention to detail has resulted in 25 RHS gold medals!

Our next meeting will be on June 13th at Carlton Scroop Village Hall, 7:30 for 7:45. Jonathan Mosely will be giving a talk entitled 'Grow, cut and arrange flowers'. Visitors welcome (£5), just come along.

New Earth Solutions - Mid Uk - Caythorpe Heath Lane, Caythorpe LCC Planning application ref PL 0137/22

I attended the meeting of the LCC Planning committee at the council offices in Newland Lincoln this morning when this application above (for alterations to the buildings to accommodate a new recycling line together with extended working hours of 4am - 10pm) were discussed.

The meeting was held against the background of a report from the Council planning officer recommending acceptance of the application and the granting of planning permission.

I was given 3 minutes to put my case objecting to the granting of permission and then answered several questions from the LCC councilors present. A representative of New Earth Solutions was also given the opportunity to speak for the same amount of time and was asked a number of questions concerning the application.

The application was amended during the meeting with a condition being attached that the new process (which will take place in buildings 9 and 10 on the site) be conducted with the doors to these buildings being permanently closed during the extended hours of operation.

Following these representations a short debate took place between the LCC councilors present and then a vote was taken on approving the application. LCC Councilors voted seven in favour of the granting of permission with one abstaining.

I understand that New Earth Solutions have already purchased the equipment that will be used and this has been installed on site. A number of alterations to the buildings will be carried out before this becomes operative.

Unfortunately it appears that big business has been granted precedence over the views of local residents which have not held any weight with LCC, and we can expect to see building work being carried out at the site followed by the operation of the plant for the extended working hours.

I suggest that if anyone is affected by this, then they make direct contact with New Earth Solutions and LCC copying in the Parish Council to any correspondence. - Andy Crawley



Not From the Rectory

The Rector discovers that Lincolnshire is rather like the curate's egg - good in parts

I have been reading a book I was given 'Remote Britain' by David St John Thomas in which, with his wife Sheila, he visits Lincolnshire.

They are staying at Lincoln and at the end of their first drive Sheila asks 'Why on earth have we come here?' The only reason for coming to Mablethorpe, the writer decides, is to eat unhealthy food and rapidly to part with your holiday cash!

But they continue on into pretty undulating country with neat farms and villages for their first taste of the Lincolnshire Wolds and so arrive into a larger place with tree-lined avenues,

pine woods and spacious Edwardian houses, have they come to Bournemouth or Droitwich Spa they wonder. It's not the Lincolnshire they had expected. It is, of course, Woodhall Spa – a place which DSJT concludes 'breeds articulate people' and is an ambitious place full of surprises which include both the Petwood Hotel and the Kinema in the Woods.



The writer makes a second journey into Lincolnshire but this time it is to explore the Fen country and he starts from Wisbech and soon finds himself crossing a land of incredibly deep ditches, great open skies, large fields and scattered poplars, 'we are deep into the Fens (and) though we are not far away from towns, this feels as remote as you can get, certainly different, some land well below high tide level' and quotes from Murray's Handbook that 'In the oldest reclaimed district of Holland, containing many village churches, the inhabitants, in wet season, were under the necessity of rowing to church in their boats'.

He drives from Parson Drove to Gedney Hill, Holbeach Drove and Whaplode Drove continuing to Long Sutton and Holbeach and ending the day in Boston with a night at the White Hart Hotel with a view from their room of The Haven.

Sheila has been talking about Boston's most famous landmark, The Stump, which once was a light guiding travellers in from the Fens and ships into the Haven.

David and Sheila return to the Wolds and David writes that 'while the Fens and the Marshes are totally different from each other, the Lincolnshire Wolds are a world apart – the highest land anywhere in the east of England from Kent to Yorkshire. The Wolds are a little-known treasure'.

They head via Coningsby and Horncastle and find themselves driving through lightly-populated land of rolling countryside, obviously fertile, especially in the deep, and often wide, valley bottoms with frolicking streams. Unspoilt, it's Remote Britain par excellence.

They stop for a drink in Scamblesby and then into Donington on Bain and so into Louth (Louth is how towns used to be when friendship and service to attract and retain regular customers were more important than the immediate bottom line) before heading to Tennyson's

birthplace in the tiny hamlet of Somersby where his father was vicar. Tennyson's character and interests were heavily determined by his love of the country around Somersby which he left in 1837 as he notes in 'In Memoriam'.

"We leave the well-beloved place. Where first we gazed upon the sky."

From Somersby David and Sheila return by way of South Ormsby to the fourteen-mile Bluestone Heath Road which follows the course of an ancient ridge trail along the spine of

the Wolds and here they find a commanding viewpoint to sit and to eat their sandwiches. They soon leave the Wolds and conclude their Lincolnshire exploration in Grimsby at the Fish Docks and Heritage Centre before heading over the Humber Bridge via York for home which is at Nairn on the Moray Firth some sixteen miles east of Inverness.





St. Vincent's Church Clock Electrification

The existing clock on the tower of St Vincent's has for many years been wound by hand by a number of volunteers. Unfortunately this involves an arduous climb up the steps to the bell tower and as time passes, this is becoming more of a problem for those involved, who have themselves been subject to the passing of time!

As the clock represents a significant landmark to the village, following discussions between representatives of the Church and the Parish Council, it was agreed that a project would be instigated to electrify the clock to negate the need to manually wind (and alter) the clock.


A faculty was obtained from the Diocese (granting permission to carry out the work), and quotes obtained from a number of specialists qualified to work on the clock. Although the Parish Council was willing to subsidise this work, it was agreed to seek grant funding



towards the cost. The Parish Clerk was able to apply for, and obtain funding towards the cost of the electrification project, Initially for £1500 from the Benefact Trust, and later to the tune of £12,977 from South Kesteven District Council through their UK Shared Prosperity Fund. This means that this project will be achieved without any cost to the Church or Parish Council.

An order has been placed and work should be carried out in the near future. Although there will not be any visible signs of the work having been completed, it will ensure that this landmark remains in good working order for many years to come.
