

Patient Participation Group

Moving into 2024 you will be seeing more of the recent changes started in your surgeries to help improve the services offered. At Caythorpe works are now complete and as reported in the last issue, we now have a new reception desk on the left as you come in, with Pharmacy just ahead to the right and a check in screen just before the waiting room.

At Ancaster works are ongoing, but the new reception is up and running, straight ahead of you as you enter the surgery, many thanks again for your patience whilst the changes are being completed, we are already seeing the benefit at Caythorpe for both patients and staff.

Last year the PPG launched a Community Outreach Project: If you have any concerns about how to find the appropriate service, we can help point the way. Maybe you are part of a community group and would like a visit from some of our group to talk to your members? In 2023 we attended coffee mornings at Ancaster, Wilsford, Caythorpe and Fulbeck as well as a stall at the Caythorpe Gala. All gave us the chance to talk to a variety of people and get some valuable feedback, which has gone directly to the practice. We offer a tutorial on how to navigate the AskMyGp app as needed.

We also support the Medical Equipment Trust who help raise money regularly for the practice, in a number of ways. The 2023 Grand Draw was very successful, and proceeds used to upgrade the otoscopes and ophthalmoscopes used to check our ears and eyes in surgeries daily. These are funds over and above NHS funding to help keep our GP practice in the top 5% nationally with an Outstanding grading from the CQC (Care Quality Commission – a bit like OFSTED for health and care services). Watch this space for details of another fundraiser in April!

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
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
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ENCOUNTERS

Recounted by Brian Lucas, The Last Rector of Caythorpe & Fulbeck

WHITTLE, OM KCB CB. Air Cdre Sir Frank

1986 Air Commodore Sir Frank Whittle visited the UK for his appointment by HM The Queen to membership of the Order of Merit (OM). During this brief visit to the UK he attended a Graduation Parade at the Royal Air Force College, Cranwell, where he had invented the turbojet aero engine during the latter years of the war. Forming the parade was a squadron of Officer Cadets who had successfully completed the long arduous Officer Training Course, and this parade marked their



transition from a cadet to an officer. After a Review of the parade by a member of the Royal Family or an Air Officer, there follows permission for the 'Parade to March Off.' It heralds a very poignant moment; as the College Band plays "Auld Lang Syne, and the new very junior officers slow march off the parade ground to enter College Hall, the College Warrant Officer leads the Sergeant Drill Instructors (who had been barking orders at the cadets for months) in Quick Time to form a guard of honour either side of the steps leading up to the Grand Entrance in order to give their former students their first salute as officers.

At the beginning of the proceedings, as the Reviewing Officer arrives at the Dais, the Parade accords him a General Salute, and a flypast of RAF aircraft fly low and loud over the Parade in an airborne salute. However, during the slow march at the end there is usually an "unofficial flypast" arranged by the CO of the graduating squadron. On this occasion two Phantom FG1's arrived very low and without warning over the rear of the stand bearing the crowd of families and friends watching the parade, before passing either side of the central tower of College Hall. They had disappeared before the audience had absorbed the thunderous roar of the Spey jet engines, but they hadn't finished! Almost at once they reappeared from the west and again flew across the parade ground above the slow-marching officers before disappearing eastward across the Fens.

The parade was followed immediately by a Graduation Service in the College Chapel, adjacent to College Hall. The north side of the Chapel was reserved for the new officers, while families and friends occupied the south side. I asked an elderly lady what she thought of the noise of the aircraft, "I loved it", she replied, "and I am so proud that my grandson is joining them." Wearing the College Cope, I was at the entrance to the Chapel to welcome Sir Frank and Lady Whittle as their Staff Car drew to a halt. I asked him if he enjoyed the second flypast, to which he replied, "If I had known what I was starting I wouldn't have persevered!" Then he looked at me and grinned mischievously. For on 27 August 1928, Pilot Officer Whittle had joined No. 111 Squadron, Hornchurch, flying Siskin IIIs, and where his continuing reputation for low flying and aerobatics almost led to his being court-martialled.

He once said that his most moving occasion was on a flight to UK on Concorde when the Captain announced to the passengers that, "We are proud to welcome on board this flight the inventor of the jet engine, Sir Frank Whittle." There followed a loud round of applause.

Frank Whittle died of lung cancer on 9th August 1996, at his home in Columbia, Maryland. He was cremated in America and his ashes were brought back to Cranwell.

Additional - UNWIN, 'Professor' Stanley

Stanley Unwin became a particular friend in the Savage Club. He was one of the most unassuming men I have ever met. He enjoyed the ad-hoc company of medical consultants, artists, barristers, writers, musicians and other entertainers who were his "Brother Savages", and they always rejoiced at his presence in the Club.

We enjoyed long conversations when he came into the Savage for what he called 'a tilty-elbow.' On one occasion he saw me come into the Club Lounge and called me over to meet his guest. While based in Birmingham after the War, Stan was a BBC Outside Broadcast sound engineer and while testing equipment he used to entertain the broadcasters in the OB Van with bursts of Unwinese. His guest in the Savage was one of these commentators who secretly recorded Stanley in full flow. Back in the studio he played it to a producer who saw that this was genuine entertainment and so 'Professor' Stanley Unwin was born.

When I was a lad Stan's TV programmes, in which he appeared wearing an academic gown and mortar board, were in the 'must watch' category. His invented language, known as Unwinese, was so compelling and amusing because he changed a part of a word, so that while hilarious it was still understood. Here is an example from the beginning of his description of the birth of Christ, which he calls "<u>Nativity Joyfold</u>."

"The first'n sudden indicators of eventers great was that Star of scintillating beauty. Observed it by three Wisers or Magi-men who 'mediately sped to Jerusalem. Thus begins the nativity story in the little town of Bethlehome of Judea. Holy Joy. ... The star that guided-ho the Magi-men stopped right there and with unfettered reveren-joy, the Wisers came into the barn, which had an aura of great sanctity though with a farmly-type smell, then down on their knee-benders they open up their pokky-bags of goldy-scents and myrrh as presents very spess! O yes. ."

He sent me a recording of his story of the Holy Nativity in Unwinese, which is very moving as well as hilarious. 'Deep joy'.

Stan died at Danetre Hospital in Daventry on 12 January 2002 aged 90. He is buried in the churchyard at Long Buckby, with Frances, who predeceased him in 1993. Their gravestone bears the epitaph, "Reunitey in the heavenly-bode – Deep Joy!". I attended a thanksgiving service which was held at St Lawrence's Church in Long Buckby. The eulogy was by "a chum from show business", Jim Davidson, and the service ended with a rendering of "Bye Bye Blackbird" by John Percival and friends. The back cover of the Order of Service had been prepared by Unwin's family in his own style: "Goodly Byelode loyal peeploders! Now all gatherymost to amuse it and have a tilty elbow or a nice cuffle-oteedee – Oh Yes!"

A Roman Workshop

Year 3 and 4 had their Big Bang experience to start up their topic all about the Romans.

We were lucky enough to have a Roman Workshop come to school and share their knowledge all about Romans. The

children in Narnia Class learnt all about the Roman Legion and that there were 5,000 Roman soldiers in each one. They undertook some training to become a Roman soldier and learnt how to march effectively and how to hold their shields in formation.

The children also explored lots of artefacts from the Roman period trying on outfits and helmets and playing Roman games.

Each child created a model of a body part, which in the Roman time would contact the Gods and express any injuries or pain.

The children found out about Boudicca and finally went on to become gladiators where they captured the animals which the gladiator would fight using nets and spears. All the children really loved the day and learnt lots of fabulous facts.

Many of us wore our Christmas jumpers, earrings and one, a 'fairy light' necklace; we were full of Festive spirit! Well, not quite yet but we were by the end of the afternoon. A delicious meal was served by the staff and members of WI committee had made around ten lovely hampers as raffle prizes using items donated by members. All those lucky enough to win had the choice of a Pamper Hamper or Food Hamper. There was no business today and any items of interest were in the monthly newsletter for us to read at our leisure, I personally, had plenty of that as I came down with Covid on Christmas Eve!



Christmas came and went and here we all were at our first meeting of 2024. It was a dry, sunny day but cold and snow is forecast in the next week or two so we made the most of the warm and cosy Village Hall. Angela welcomed us and told us the sad news of the death of past member, Joy Waspe.

There was no news from the Federation office. Our Treasurer, Pauline, reported that we raised £140 in donations at the Christmas lunch for which Grantham Food Bank were very grateful. Our annual subscription is to be £48 this year but the Committee agreed to waive a part of it reducing it to £46. A lot of the members are older now and have previously held these posts during their twenty to thirty years of membership. We need younger members to join and to take up the reins and not allow us to close. You could bring new, fresh ideas and add to the already vibrant programme of planned events. We then discussed the National Federation of Women's Institutes (NFWI) current resolutions for consideration for a national campaign. Briefly, they were 1) Lack of availability of NHS dentists especially for children, 2) The issue of women being sent to prison for non-violent offences, could there be an alternative? 3) Say NO to Gambling Advertising which normalises gambling and not make it to be seen as possibly becoming an addiction with devastating consequences and finally, 4) The prevalence of poor housing available for the rental markets and lack of decent council housing. All four of these were discussed and we then voted on the one we wanted to go forward for further discussion on how best to proceed. The Government will be lobbied by NFWI and local Federations to ensure our voice is heard.

We had a break for tea and biscuits and then Angela's daughter, Joanne, offered to be the Bingo caller as we played a few games to finish the afternoon off on a lighter tone. Gift-wrapped mystery prizes were given to the lucky winners.

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In & Around the Garden



2023 was not quite the wettest year I have recorded, but it came close with 860mm (34 ins) in total. October was by far the wettest month (195mm or 7.7 ins) while February was unusually dry (12mm or 0.5 ins). This demonstrates that whilst the climate may be changing, the weather is as unpredictable as ever. Luckily many plants are very adaptable and have coped so far, and just a few have been lost to drought in recent years. I am fortunate in having a well drained soil, so none have been lost to excess rainfall (yet).

In the brief interlude between heavy rain and freezing temperatures I managed to move a few plants that were in the wrong place. A katsura tree (*Cercidiphyllum japonicum*), prone to early frost damage, has never looked good in the 3 years since I planted it, so it is now under the canopy of a mature beech, I hope this will give it some protection. Luckily the root ball was still quite small. I replaced it with a tall rudbeckia that tended to flop over a path, then replaced the rudbeckia with a day lily that was hidden behind taller plants. My husband reckons my plants should be on wheels. There is still a hole where the day lily was – a planting opportunity?

On January 1st, I walked round the garden to see what was in flower, and although we were in the depths of winter there were 12 different species in bloom. Mahonia 'Winter Sun', Winter Jasmine and Algerian Iris (*I. unguicularis*) were the

most conspicuous, but the first hellebores, snowdrops and primroses were out as well. Winter flowering shrubs included several winter heathers in pink and white, witch hazel and *Viburnum bodnantense*, plus a winter cherry tree. With plenty of evergreens, some brightly variegated, and the dry stems and seed heads of tall grasses, the dead of winter is actually quite lively.

This winter I only provided fat balls for the birds, so we haven't seen the flocks of finches that like sunflower seeds. All the tits, however, like the fat balls and a group comprising mostly long-tailed tits and blue tits visits regularly. Great tits and coal tits also drop in, and the resident robin is always around. Male blackbirds have been taking the little crab apples and wood pigeons have made a nasty mess under their favourite roosts. I was delighted to see a Goldcrest on the pine tree, an infrequent but very welcome visitor. Down on the low fields temporary lakes host a mixed group of gulls, mostly black headed and black backed, that are quite happy to eat worms away from the rigors of coastal life. Groups of swans are resting there too, I saw some grazing on what looked like oil-seed rape. They will probably move off when it is nest building time, and I expect the farmer will be happy to see them go. JA

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
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The Memories of Augustus Peach (part VI) Life On A Farm

More thoughts from Augustus Peach who lived in Fulbeck at the turn of the 19th/20th century. His family were poor, so he provides a vivid picture from that perspective. This valuable and informative historical document will be reproduced pretty much in full without any attempt correct errors or grammar.

Agriculture being the main source of the villagers' income for the livelihood, the farmer, the yearly man, labourers and the business men of the district depended on the production of the land. Even the lord of the manor, the gentry and their employees were indirectly affected by the results of what the toilers of land could produce by their labour; rents from the farms and the labourers' cottages.

A community working together for the good of all was more or less governed by the prices of the commodity obtaining in the local markets and benefits given by nature would not always benefit the country folk, markets over supplied might result in a lowering of prices. Rising prices in the markets would give to the merchants higher profits, as the farmers in my boyhood days appeared to be in competition among themselves, there was no organization to see that they had a square deal. Farm produce on the market was not allowed its true value as it directly affected every one in the towns and cities, and so the farm products rarely brought additional wages to the labourers.

A farmer would be classed as a good or bad farmer by the local community and there is no doubt that this competitive system gave an impetus to the individual and the moral standard of the labourer which made them keen for their employer to be classed in the higher grade. The farmer for his waggoners, ploughmen and domestic help was dependent upon the local market towns. Each market town had its own statute hiring fair, held around the middle of May, where the yearly agricultural workers would attend to be hired for the year at an annual wage of from six pounds to twenty-six pounds according to their age and experience .

Pleasure fairs, business houses seeking trade by special advertisements, even to free meals were incentives to attract these lads and lasses in buying their corduroy trousers, jackets, coloured knotted handkerchiefs and print and cotton dresses with other requirements for the year, together with all kinds of brilliant buttonholes of tinsel ornaments and coloured feathers for hats and caps. Side shows, Smith and Warren's roundabouts, swings, fortune tellers, all added gaiety to the May day festivities. All these created a bright and exciting break before settling down to their yearly labours. The married labourers and farm foremen living in the tied cottages and farmhouses were also engaged from year to year, on lady day sixth of April. It was usual on this day to see a farm wagon laden with furniture piled high, moving from village to village, with children and mother perched under a piece of furniture peeping out at the rear of the wagon. 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Hello, I hope that you had a good Christmas although I'm sure that seems a long time ago now! Whilst I celebrated the traditional Christmas story, we are having the 'Family Christmas' sometime in February when two of my children will hopefully have returned from serving over-seas; their safety has been upmost in our minds as they have had difficult experiences. We are very much looking forward to better times.

A couple of weeks ago I saw the first snowdrops pushing through the soil at Blankney Woods which always has the most amazing snowdrop display. Snowdrops are always a good, welcoming sign of new life emerging, despite the bleakness of winter. This tiny flower, surviving despite the cold and the dark, brings us hope and the promise of new beginnings. The French know Snowdrops as 'Perce-neige' meaning snow piercers and we can sometimes have both the cold snow on the ground and the snowdrops flowering simultaneously symbolising both the winter and the potential of spring. They are also known as 'Candlemas Bells' as they flower on the Church Festival of Candlemas on 2nd February where we remember Mary and Joseph presenting the six week old Jesus at the Temple as was the Jewish custom. Snowdrops were gathered at Candlemas to decorate Churches in this country before the reformation. They were symbols of purity, which was connected to the rite of purification that Mary observed by going to the temple forty days after Christmas.

The metaphor used for someone's emerging faith in God is 'new shoots', and it can be used to describe people who have had no previous experience of going to Church, or those who have decided to return to Church after leaving for whatever reason. I believe that in the last couple of months we have some 'new shoots' in our congregations throughout our group of twelve churches. It has been a delight to baptize so may children and also adults as well as welcome people to a variety of services from All Souls' to Remembrance Sunday and then Christmas Carol services amongst others. I am still in my first year here, but our Church Wardens have commented on how many new faces have come through our church doors. I am looking forward to further baptisms and the many weddings which we have booked in the coming year.

Our churches are primarily places where we worship God, but they are an important part of your villages and are here for you in times of sadness such as funerals as well as times of joy and of coming together to celebrate the seasons of the Church year. I am here to try and answer any questions you may have about the Christian faith including your own spirituality. We'd love to see you regularly, but if you can only join us at certain times of the year that's fine as well. If you never come to church but would still like a Christian baptism (Christening), wedding or funeral please feel free to contact me.

Our medieval ancestors kept their Christmas lights and decorations up until Candlemas, "To bring cheer to the winter months" as some churches do with their Christmas trees(I'm not even putting mine up until my children are home). At Candlemas we remember the elderly man Simeon, waiting patiently at the Temple, who recognized the baby Jesus brought in by his parents as the Son of God "...a light to reveal you to the nations." May the light of Christ shine strong in your lives throughout this coming year and always bring you hope. Every blessing, Revd. Sara Davies

Carlton Scroop & Normanton on Cliffe Parish Council

The Parish Council met on 10th January to approve a budget and precept and to discuss a number of local issues.

Highway Issues in the two Villages: We are still waiting for the two existing electronic radar signs in Carlton Scroop to be replaced by Lincolnshire County Council, who will also repair and maintain the two speed signs in Normanton.

Extra "check your speed" signs have been erected in both villages. The mobile Speed Indicator Device (SID) has been deployed in order to make motorists aware of their speed through the villages. The Parish Council has a stock of 30mph bin stickers available for residents. Please contact the clerk or a parish councillor for the stickers.

The Lincolnshire Road Safety Partnership has agreed to undertake a survey of traffic movements to decide whether a radar van should be located in the Parish. The survey took place in January and the data will be shared with the Parish Council.

The poor state of Newark Lane and Howdale Lane have been reported to Lincolnshire County Council.

A flooding incident occurred in Charity Street, Carlton Scroop at the beginning of January due to the heavy rainfall which threatened a number of properties. The Parish Council has contacted Lincolnshire County Council requesting that highway drains in the Parish are maintained on a regular basis.

Jubilee Field, Carlton Scroop: There are four sycamore trees in the Jubilee Field that have tree preservation orders which require some maintenance. The Parish Council has applied to the District Council for the works to be undertaken. The Parish Council has also agreed to purchase a new gate and have a new hedge laid on three sides of the Jubilee Field.

Other Community Issues

A bench has been purchased to install in Heath Lane, Normanton and a further bench has been purchased for the new cemetery at Carlton Scroop. The Parish Council is currently reviewing the areas of grass cutting in the Parish and seeking quotes for the new grass cutting season.

A volunteer has stepped forward to spend a couple hours a month litter picking in the two villages. More volunteers would be appreciated. The Parish Council has arranged a contract for emptying the 5 dog bins in the two villages.

The two existing defibrillators at Normanton and Carlton Scroop need to be replaced in the near future. An additional Defibrillator is to be installed on the external wall at the Village Hall in Carlton Scroop and this will be partly financed by the Carlton Scroop Charities.

Fibre Broadband: BT Openreach has been busy laying the fibre network to enable high speed fibre broadband to be installed to each household as part of the Honington Exchange project, hopefully, in the Spring of 2024.

Budget & Precept: The Parish Council agreed a budget and precept for the coming financial at its January meeting. There will be spending pressures this year due to a reduction in the council tax base, increased costs of grass cutting, dog bin emptying, defibrillators and tree/hedge maintenance. The Council has therefore, reluctantly, agreed to seek a 2% increase in the precept for the next financial year.

Fulbeck Parish Council

The following is a summary of some items of interest from the meeting held on Thursday, 11th January 2024. It is not a formal record and space limits the content. The official minutes can be found on the noticeboard outside Fulbeck Village Hall and online at <u>https://fulbeck.parish.lincolnshire.gov.uk/council-business</u> (or type Fulbeck Parish Council into your search engine.

The Chair reminded Councillors, and members of the public, of the Seven Nolan principles of public life, which apply to all public-office holders: Selflessness, Integrity, Objectivity, Accountability, Openness, Honesty, Leadership. (Further information can be found on https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/the-7-principles-of-public-life/the-7-principles-of-public-life-2).

Planning Matters: A letter had been received concerning the posts erected around the village green to prevent traffic damaging the grass edges. District Councillor Milnes confirmed they do not need planning permission below one metre in height. If the land is not owned by the person installing, then that is a civil not a Council matter.

A letter had been received regarding the coat of arms on the gates at Fulbeck Hall. This is not a Parish Council matter. District Councillor Milnes advised more enforcement officers had been recruited, and she would request speedy resolution of the matter. Members of the public could also write in to express their views.

Highways Issues: A member of the public raised the issue of the A607 which is going to be closed again in the near future and asked that the Parish Council to be proactive in their approach to LCC re the closure as it impacts on businesses, and also members of the public who rely on the bus service. The Chair undertook to ascertain the exact location of the road closure and the nature of the repairs; and to liaise with CCIIr Maughan on his return.

Pottergate Road fly tipping. Gates are ready to be installed and the issue is going to SKDC Cabinet soon.

Environmental Matters: Cllr Siddans will be setting up a meeting on a Saturday, on a village green, to provide information to residents about possible local action on environmental matters and biodiversity. Purple lidded bins: start using these for dry paper and cardboard only, as from February.

Community Resilience: A working group has been formed to research action and planning required, in and around Fulbeck, to tackle such matters as local flooding, cold weather refuges and concerns, emergency health and wellbeing responses. Other matters may arise in the future.

Parish Council Admin Matters: Councillors will take on portfolios on an adhoc basis and then lead on relevant matters, eg Traffic such as speed limits, Resilience forum, Environmental issues. It was agreed the time and date of future Parish Council meetings would be included on the Village Facebook Page with a link to the Parish Council website.

Sports and Social Club: The car park in front of the playing fields was in urgent need of repair, and the Parish Council agreed to contribute a sum of £800.00 towards the work required. Councillors agreed to support the application for a grant from SKDC Prosperity Fund for roof insulation and acoustic fire retardant curtains.

If you are interested in any of these or other local matters, you will be very much welcome to come along to meetings, or buttonhole a member of the Parish Council when you see one!
