


### **ENCOUNTERS**

### Recounted by Brian Lucas, The Last Rector of Caythorpe & Fulbeck

### **Musicians (Part 2)**

Last month Archdeacon Lucas wrote of his time at Llandaff Cathedral in the mid 60s, when he acted as 'chaperone' to the guest performers at the annual music festival in the cathedral. His account is continued this month with two more world-renowned musicians.





The world-famous brilliant violinist Yehudi Menuhin, performed during my third annual festival at the cathedral. He was born in New York, his parents were Lithuanian Jews who were later granted American citizenship. He was the most urbane man of distinction I have ever met. His manners were impeccable, and it was sheer delight to be in his company and when he took the violin in his hands the instrument became an extension of his soul. The bow danced and flashed across the strings lifting the audience into high excitement before setting them down again in a period of reflection, and so the dance continued until the triumphal end of the concerto. As far as I can recall he played twice during that programme and on each occasion,

he received a standing ovation. He caused me no concern during the interval, and we chatted quite happily about his music as we went to and from the festival marquee, but I include him because of a story I was told 30 years ago when he epitomised the saying, "Don't get mad, get even!"

In 1967, Lord Reith had accepted the post of Lord High Commissioner to the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland. From time to time, he hosted lavish 'Black-Tie' dinner parties at Holyrood Palace. Yehudi Menuhin was invited as a guest to one of these dinners and enjoyed it very much until the company withdrew from the table to the drawing room for postprandial chatter.

Lord Reith suddenly asked his guest, "Mr Menuhin, if you have your fiddle with you would you play us a tune or two? I'm sure we'd all enjoy that."

"I would rather not thank you" was the polite reply, but his host repeated his request in pressing terms, "Come, come now Mr Menuhin, don't be churlish," so that the violinist was really obliged to acquiesce. Half an hour passed before Menuhin returned, now attired in White-Tie and Tails, and played the violin exquisitely for forty minutes, before returning to

his room on the first floor of the Palace. After another half an hour his lordship's ADC was dispatched to remind Menuhin that Lord Reith and the other guests were waiting for him to rejoin them. The ADC was surprised to find him dressed in casual clothes and reading a newspaper. Menuhin's reply was perfect for his hosts gauche request: "Please explain to Lord Reith that I came here tonight as a guest, but now I am a performer, so I bid him goodnight."

### Dr Daniel Jones OBE

Daniel Jones was born in Pembroke in December 1912. He attended the Bishop Gore Grammar School in Swansea (1924–1931), where his enthusiasm for literature led to a close friendship with the poet Dylan Thomas, whose father taught English at the school, and to his going on to study English literature at Swansea University. At this period Jones and Thomas were part of the informal group of aspiring artists who would meet at the Kardomah cafe in Castle Street, Swansea. Other members of the group were the artist Alfred Janes and the poet Vernon Watkins, whom I came to know quite well through several lunchtime discussions about poetry at the bank in Swansea where he was a cashier.

I first encountered the poetry of Dylan Thomas when I was In the sixth form at school. The poet had died only four years earlier and critical commentaries on his work were in short supply, but when I read his poems aloud, I was enthralled by the sound of the words, even if the thrust of the poem was obscure. It was when I read Thomas prose works that I discovered his powerful descriptive writing. In "A Child's Christmas in Wales" I read with delight of the pranks and fun that Thomas and Dan Jones enjoyed in their youth!

In 1935 Jones left Swansea to study music at the Royal Academy of Music in London where his teachers included Sir Henry Wood and Harry Farjeon. Winning the Mendelssohn Scholarship in 1935 allowed him to study in Czechoslovakia, France, the Netherlands and Germany, and to develop his skills as a linguist. In the years leading up to the Second World War he composed his first large-scale orchestral works, Symphonic Prologue and Five Pieces for Orchestra, and developed his own compositional system of 'Complex Metres'. During the war, as a captain in the Intelligence Corps (1940–1946), he used his linguistic abilities at Bletchley Park codes centre as a cryptographer and a decoder of Russian, Romanian and Japanese texts.

After the war, Jones won increasing recognition as an innovative composer. In 1950 his Symphonic Prologue won the first prize of the Royal Philharmonic Society, and thereafter most of his compositions were written to commission – from the Festival of Britain, the Swansea Festival, the Royal National Eisteddfod, the BBC, the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra, and the Llandaff Festival. Between 1945 and 1985 he composed his series of twelve symphonies, each centred on one semi-tone of the chromatic scale. By 1993 he had composed eight string quartets, as well as the cantata, The Country Beyond the Stars, a setting of Henry Vaughan's poem.

As noted above, the Llandaff Festival commissioned a Symphony which was to have its premiere during the festival week. I was excited at the thought of meeting at last this larger-than-life friend of Dylan Thomas. The Symphony was to occupy the whole of the second

half of the programme and would be broadcast live by the BBC. The composer was to be in attendance. At the interval, the Dean introduced me to the great man who put his arms on my shoulder and said, "Now, dear boy, my friend and I need a drink!" His friend was the Leader of the BBC Welsh Orchestra, which was to perform the Symphony. Dr Jones did not wish to go to the Festival 'Tent', he wanted a quiet drink with his old mate the violinist, so I took them across the Cathedral Green to The Institute, a private club. Once they each had a pint of beer in their hands, Dan Jones preceded to relate hilarious jokes and anecdotes in a conspiratorial manner. I made to withdraw, but Dan Jones insisted that I joined them and called for another round. I could see my career coming to a rapid end! After 30 minutes of this storytelling, which was hugely enjoyable, I managed to persuade them to return to the Cathedral, and the Leader returned to the bosom of the orchestra. 10 minutes later the Director of the festival introduced the new Commission, "Symphony No.6" and announced that the composer was present, and Dan Jones stood up to receive huge and sustained applause.

Daniel Jones enjoyed long friendships with several artists, among them Ceri Richards and Grace Williams. As well as composing song-settings for Thomas's Under Milk Wood (1954) and dedicating his fourth symphony (1954) to Thomas's memory, he edited collections of Thomas's poetry and prose, and in 1977 published the memoir, My Friend Dylan Thomas.

In 1968 Jones was awarded an OBE. He died in 1993 at his home, high up on the Gower Peninsula, Swansea, where he had composed "A room looking down on Oystermouth Castle and out over Swansea Bay" © Brian Lucas 2024.

## Fulbeck Parish Council Greens and Verges Project Councillor Rosie Siddans

Fulbeck Parish Council is initiating an exciting new project with the aim of improving the diversity of plants and habitats within our existing green spaces in the village. This could include the roadside and pathway verges and the greens within the village, areas that would otherwise be mown or cut back and offer little variety of habitat and support little biodiversity of species.



As we are all aware there has been a unprecedented decline in the number and diversity of insects, birds and plant species due to climate events and environmental pressures, so it is vitally important that as a forward-thinking Parish Council we should look closely at the ongoing management of our green spaces and work to improve bio-diversity, allowing wildlife to be supported and thrive, and create a beautiful environment for us all to enjoy.

We want to stress that these areas will be managed and are not being re-wilded, which is to return an area to its completely natural state; we

aim to introduce a wider range of planting and will include long grass and wildflower areas as well as mown paths and clearings so the areas are still accessible to the community.

The Parish Council has established a small working party group to create a long-term plan to manage and maintain these green spaces.

The Parish Council will aim to put guidance and resources in place and work to involve all interested people within the local community.



Initially by reducing mowing regimes, we can identify which plants naturally grow in these areas through monthly surveying and subsequently put in place planting and sowing schemes to promote a diverse range of native plants that look attractive and support a range of species.

During the process we will map and record the species found in each area so that over successive years we can determine the positive impacts the project is having on bio-diversity in the Parish. Within the Parish there are miles of wide roadside verges that already support a range of native plants. To make sure that this valuable

habitat supports as much plant and wildlife as possible we will be putting in requests to the County Council, who is responsible for the verge cutting, that only the 1 metre road safety visibility allowance and entrance splays are cut during the mowing season, the remaining verge area further back from the roadside being left uncut to allow grasses and wildflowers to establish and seed, providing food for wild birds, pollinators and small mammals during the Summer and Autumn.

We will survey the verges periodically to record the species growing so we can increase the diversity of planting and reduce the dominance of any single species such as nettles or keck by sowing a range of native flower seeds suited to the soil type and local conditions.



### So, what if you want to know more or get involved?

Well, there will be regular updates and reports posted on the Fulbeck PC website and the village group on Facebook. We will also hold community meetings and in Year 2 we will have working parties of volunteers to help manage the habitat areas and conduct planting schemes.



## In & Around the Garden

It is supposed to be high summer in Mid July, but it certainly doesn't feel like it. The cool damp weather may not suit gardeners, but the plants are quite happy with plenty of water and enough light to flower as normal. In fact they are running riot, while I am less keen than usual to keep them under control. Warmer days are forecast, so I may be able to enjoy the garden from within instead of through the window.

At present it is ablaze with colour. I don't bother with colour scheming in most of the beds,



so blues, reds, yellows, white and orange are all mixed in together. The green leaves between the flowers tone it down, so it is not quite as gaudy as it sounds. But will it last? Some plants flower just once for a few weeks, but there are some that just keep on going. Reliable shrubs for long flowering include potentillas, shrubby salvias, Daphne 'Eternal fragrance', Cistus 'Sunset' and Hypericum 'Hidcote'. None of these need regular deadheading, perhaps just a trim once a year to keep them compact. Among long flowering herbaceous

perennials, some flower for months with no interference from me, apart from occasional cutting back when they spread too far. Geraniums 'Anne Thompson', 'Rozanne' and 'Old Rose' and the Mexican fleabane (*Erigeron karvinskianus*) are good examples. Some people find that the fleabane is a nuisance and seeds everywhere, but my clump seems to be quite well behaved. Other perennials benefit from deadheading to promote new flowering stems, but with a little attention penstemons, heleniums, veronicas and dahlias will keep on giving colour to the borders into autumn.

Last year I planted some new allium bulbs, a variety called 'Summer Drummer'. Many alliums flower in late spring and are finished by now, but A. sphaerocephalum, A. senescens and 'Summer Drummer' are just starting to bloom. The first of these produces deep red balls of flowers on slender stems, the second is more like a large pale pink chive, but the third has shot up to a height of 6 feet or more and has fat round buds that are just breaking. I wonder

if the stems will stay upright once the flowers are fully open.

With the cool weather there are few butterflies about. In a brief 15 minutes if sun, two commas and one small white appeared, but hardly worth recording for the Big Butterfly Count. Even the buddleias, now in full bloom, are getting few visitors. I hope to see more pollinators if we get more sun, but there seems to be fewer bees and hoverflies about than usual at this time of year. Judging by the holes in some of the leaves, however, slugs and snails are flourishing. - JA



## Taythorpe & District Garden Society

For our July meeting we once again welcomed Geoff Hodge, garden writer and broadcaster. His talk was entitled 'Clematis, the Queen of Climbers', and concentrated on how to get the best from this popular genus. There is a huge selection of clematis to choose from, and Geoff reckons it is possible to have at least one in flower every day of the year. There are varieties for every aspect, that can grow up all sorts of vertical surfaces where there is something to cling to.

Success starts with deciding in advance where the clematis is to go and purchasing a healthy plant with a minimum of 3 strong stems. Geoff told us to buy early in the year before plants become tangled and pot bound, but find one with a good system of white healthy roots. The soil may need improvement with bulky organic matter or grit. Soak the plant for 20 minutes, then add mycorrhizal fungi to the roots and plant 10-15 cm deeper than it was in the pot. Water in thoroughly and give it a soak around once a week until established. Finally shade the roots with a mulch.

Clematis are divided into 3 groups for pruning. Group 1, which flower in winter or early spring, are pruned after flowering. Group 2, early summer flowering, are pruned lightly when growth restarts in spring, and Group 3, which flower from July onwards, should be cut back hard to the lower buds in late winter. Many thanks to Geoff for his advice on growing these beautiful and versatile climbers.

The Memories of Augustus Peach (Part XI)

This valuable and informative historical document is reproduced pretty much in full without any attempt correct errors or grammar. This month we continue with the servants. ### The Outdoors workers at the Hall

The gardeners were always busy men, either in the kitchen gardens with the glass houses, or in the grounds of the Hall among the flower beds, or cutting the grass lawns. Supplying and preparing the vegetables, fruit and flowers for the house was their first duty in the mornings. About nine o'clock each morning could be seen the donkey and cart conveying the produce from the kitchen garden to the hall. The grass of the large lawns and the verges between the flower beds required cutting most of the year, so the sound of the mowing machine could be heard on several days of the week. The gravel drive and walks to be kept free of weeds and the bedding out plants and flowers to be placed in the flower beds and borders in Spring for the Summer display and in Autumn for the Spring's refreshing show of colour.

The head gamekeeper and his assistants had a busy time with the game preserves especially in the breeding season. During the Spring the gamekeeper had to seek the eggs for hatching out his young pheasants and partridges. He and his staff would have to locate on loan broody hens from the smallholders and cottagers in the village and give constant watch in a select clearing in the wood for the safety of the young birds during the hatching out period until they flew away to fend for themselves.

Then the commencement of the shooting season with the party of shooters. At this time the service of the village boys were sought as beaters by the gamekeeper to attend in the very early morning on the day of the shoot, to surround the woods before daybreak and tap with strong sticks the fences around to keep the game in the woods until the shooters arrived around nine a.m. As the guns entered the woods the beaters would line up with them and beat the undergrowth to disturb the game. With the arrival of the horse drawn shooting brake - a kind of covered wagon - bringing the lunch from the Hall for all consisting of Irish stew, chunks of bread and cheese with a liberal amount of beer. The company would partake of this repast seated on trunks of wood left in a clearing, or perhaps in some nearby farm. The shoot over about three in the afternoon, the resultant killed game of the day would be packed into the shooting brake and taken to a special building at the hall to be left and hung for use over the months for entertaining at the hall and for Christmas boxes to the tenants on the estate.

### Not from the Rectory with Revd. Sara Davies

I'm writing this on St. Swithun's Day, very aware that if it rains today, legend says that we will have 40 days of rain. I thought we'd got away with it but we've had light rain this evening! Our Church in Leadenham is called after St. Swithun, Bishop of Winchester. The anniversary of his death is actually 2<sup>nd</sup> July when he was buried outside as he had requested. His body was moved inside the Cathedral on 15<sup>th</sup> July over a hundred years later amidst heavy rainfall, which allegedly showed his displeasure. We are fortunate to have churches named after a few different saints although 'All Saints' and 'St. Nicholas' feature quite regularly. St. Vincent's Caythorpe is one of only six churches in England to be called after St. Vincent of Saragossa who died in 304. He was Spanish and suffered a rather nasty death for his faith. He was weakened by semi-starvation, then racked, roasted on a gridiron, thrown into prison and set in stocks. Not surprisingly he died of his injuries and is now represented by a priest holding a palm or suffering the torture of the gridiron!


We pray for specific saints at our church services and where possible celebrate saints' days in the churches named after them; this is known as a Patronal Festival. November 1<sup>st</sup> is All Saints Day, a feast day remembering the lives of the many saints for whom there is no specific feast day during the year. The following day, November 2nd, marks a day of prayer for, and remembrance of, the "faithfully departed": relatives, friends and others we know who are no longer living. Please look out for these services later in the year; we invite families of those who have lost loved ones to join us as we read out names and light a candle in their memory.

The heavy rains which we have had, stretching back to October last year, have been very difficult for our farmers and have had huge financial costs. We will be starting to have our Harvest services in September, praying for farmers and all who are involved in the production of our food as well as giving thanks to God for all that he has provided. Harvest has always been an important part of the Church year for our rural villages and we are especially keen to welcome those with an agricultural background to our services. Our churches are always beautifully decorated for Harvest and we are very grateful for so many talented people coming along to help, as well as providing produce to be displayed. In days gone by our churches would have been full for Harvest services which is unfortunately no longer the case. It would be good if more of us could take time out of busy lives to give thanks for what we have been given, and stop for a short while to remember how dependent we are on those who work the land.


