TRAVELLER'S JOY Coping with Hope! No. 2

After a restless night in the Hotel Cathedrale (having parked my car by the canal I had a dream that it was stranded on the elevated section of the road which is raised to allow boats to travel beneath it), I drove southwest into France and made my way at cross country to my next destination Metz. I checked in at the Hotel Moderne in Metz. It is adjacent to the railway station and is a 15 minute walk to the city centre, but the hotel has a secure garage. The warm sunshine in Metz made me happy and unprepared for the custodian in the cathedral who clearly had not received a classical education. I asked him in my fluent French, "Tripod, OK?" "Oui, monsieur." "Merci." When I took it from its case he had a fit. I mean, TRI-POD, makes instant sense to a man who has even a smattering of the classics. So I kissed goodbye to photographing the mediaeval glass in the poorly lit ambulatories — the chief reason for re-visiting Metz. That is why Metz cathedral does not appear in Volume 2 of my cathedral books ("A Glimpse of Glory" published by Adastral Books 2017). The following morning I drove out of the secure garage and continued to travel in hope along the short journey to Strasbourg. I was again full of hope.

In Strasbourg it rained excessively, and to reach my hotel I had to share the road with trams,



one of my nightmare things. Once safely ensconced in the secure hotel car park the girl at reception had not heard of me and they were full. Patiently and graciously, I took the list from her sweet fingers and showed her my name - Mr Brian, first name Lucas! "C'est moi!" The interior of the cathedral was as dark as a cupboard under the stairs; photography was useless as lightning kept flashing through the gloom. But the freedom of the independent traveller shone through - miss out Freiburg tomorrow and stay an extra day in Strasbourg for the front to pass through. Silly boy! It rained for three days.

"Notre Dame of Strasbourg profits enormously in visibility from its location on the island enclosed by the arm of the River III, which contains the heart of the capital of Alsace. Slim and pink and very tall, with the most elegant of slender spires, it stands out boldly in the landscape as the city is approached by rail or motor; and as we walk along the charming promenades which follow the banks of the river, or cross the forty little bridges which connect the newer city with the old, we are constantly constrained to pause in our business or our pleasure to admire the view of the cathedral. One expects every moment to see a flock of storks settle over the chimney-pots, bearing in their beaks fat babies to bring joy to the cheerful inhabitants." This is the euphoric and somewhat exotic introduction to Strasbourg by Helen Henderson in her book, "Cathedrals of France", published by Methuen, 1929. I have the impression that she liked Strasbourg a great deal.

Named Argentoratum by the Romans, who settled here in 12 BC / BCE, and known as Stratisburgum after the fall of the Roman Empire, Strasbourg flourished from c.1100, and positively prospered when the Rhine was bridged here in the mid-14th century. In the 15th century the city became a free republic until, in 1697, the Republic of Strasbourg was annexed to France. In 1870 it was annexed to the newly-formed German Empire, a federal monarchy known as Deutsches Reich under Emperor Wilhelm I, and returned to France only in 1918. In 1940 the city was occupied brutally by the German army and was subjected to a programme of 'Germanization', which ended after the allied bombing campaign in the summer of 1944. Yet, there is still a strong Teutonic influence to be seen in its architecture, especially in some of the restaurants a distance from the centre.

I always stay in the Ibis Hotel in the district known as Petite France, only a short stroll from both the railway station and the cathedral. It has a small secure private car park to the rear and a tram halt outside the front door. My first view of the cathedral of Our Lady at Strasbourg was on turning the corner into rue Merciére, a narrow street lined with bookstalls and cafes, and there, facing me, was the stunning sight of this marvellous red-pink stone of the façade right against the market place. A group of accordion players with a double bass accompanied my enjoyment of the vista.

The native stone, the grés of the Vosges Mountains, is everywhere in Strasbourg. Not only is the cathedral built of it, but all the churches, many houses and some paving are of the same material. The grés of the Vosges is a Triassic rose sandstone, and is considered to be really superior to other similar materials. The rose colour is between terra-cotta and brown, and the texture is fine and even, which after the tougher limestone of which most French cathedrals are built, gives it a somewhat smooth appearance not wholly agreeable. It can be welcomed for its character and individuality without regretting that Reims, Amiens and Chartres were not made of it.

While the work of administering the European Union Is carried out in Brussels, the European Parliament is legally required to meet in Strasburg. I believe it meets twelve times a year when tonnes of documents and files have to be transported across Europe. I suppose it makes good sense in Paris! Needless to say, I avoided the European Quarter standing to the east of the old city of Strasburg. So I enjoyed my Wiener schnitzel and vowed to continue my journey in hope despite the temperamental weather!

Music and Village Life Before the First World War: Fulbeck Choral Society A Talk by Alistair Mutch at the Thursday Club

Alistair Mutch is the grandson of Augustus Peach (see Memories in News and Views) and Professor Emeritus at Nottingham Trent University. His interest in Fulbeck history and his in-depth research and analysis has shed much light on the culture and life of the village at that time. Closer examination of the membership of the Choral Society reveals a far more complex cultural and social weave than is generally assumed. Choral societies were a feature of Victorian life, but mainly in towns and cities rather than rural areas; Fulbeck was very rare and remarkable indeed!

In the latter half of the nineteenth century, several members of the Fane family were taking a keen interest in village life and its community. Frank Fane was an advocate for temperance, a believer in rational recreation, and along with Henry Prinsep Fane and Augusta Fane, established the Reading Room on the High Street. In 1888, Rachel Fane married Edmund Royds, who was already involved in religious work in the East End of London, and a keen singer interested in choral societies, they too, became involved in village activities. The origins of Fulbeck Choral Society is generally attributed to Royds and he undoubtedly played a huge role, but there was already a strong culture of music within the village which he was able to build upon.

Four large houses in Fulbeck indicated a wider elite than one family, not forgetting other eminent figures including the general practitioner, builder, business people and women, whose occupations are often not listed. Many of the village properties were independently owned and then rented to villagers, who thus exercised a degree of independence away from tied accommodation. Further, there was a strong chapel culture, both Primitive Methodist and to a smaller degree Wesleyan, visited by preachers and outside the control of the St Nicholas Church, and thus the dominant Fane family. It is notable Fulbeck became head of a Methodist circuit, where meetings including musical performances were held.

John Else Jenkinson, a tailor, haircutter, taxidermist was a staunch Primitive Methodist, but was also a member of the church choir, and could play twelve musical instruments. He launched the Fulbeck Minstrels producing music hall style entertainments, also a feature of Victorian life: think the BBC's Black and White Minstrels, but with a Victorian outlook on race. They were very well received and applauded by their audiences.

Church music was led by Augusta Fane who put on choir performances, for example, even before Royds' marriage to Rachel Fane. Augusta was responsible for organising and rehearsing the choir who were joined by guest performers, for example, Sir John Stainer's cantata 'The Crucifixion' before a substantial crowd and to great acclaim, as well as other concerts. Jenkinson contributed his fine voice to these more formal concerts, too.

Royds built on these traditions, starting with four part glees comprising Royds, Arthur Collingwood, Charles Squires and John Else Jenkinson. Out of all this, developed the Choral

Society with, eventually, over 100 people from Fulbeck, Caythorpe, Leadenham and further afield.

Teachers, particularly females traditionally teachers of music, played an important part in the Choral Society. When compulsory elementary education was introduced in 1876, their ranks increased substantially and many local ones became involved the Choral Society. Mary Dent, was one such with a rich and exceptional contralto voice, who became soloist in the choir. Her eventual husband became headmaster of Fulbeck National School recognised particularly for musical education.

Besides the more wealthy members of the community, the backbone of the Society came from the wider village, a large portion of which were engaged in trades, and some from other villages with connections to Fulbeck, such as the blacksmith, groom, dressmaker. There were even members amongst the ironstone workers, generally regarded as a disreputable bunch, railway and road workers and a few agricultural workers and families.

All this indicates a blurring of the normal social divisions within the Society, and points to a richer, more complex social life and a greater inclination to engage in other village wide activities, such as sport, compared with some villages. As an example, Augustus Peach was son of widow Peach, a very poor woman who took in laundry and cleaned, received parish relief likely overseen by the father of another member, May Levesley. Gus was shaped by the Choral Society and became a very prominent member, contributing his fine tenor voice to performances including in 1935, a Royal Command Performance at the Albert Hall.

The Society performed differing types of concerts, playing to packed audiences, including those of a mixture of sacred and secular music in the village hall, an annual festival and other events of sacred oratorios and cantatas, such as Handel's Messiah, usually in Fulbeck and Caythorpe Churches. Royds would use his influence to bring famed soloists from London; that they would want to visit a small village being a sure measure of the quality of music being produced. The Society always attracted highly complimentary reviews, achieving a fine reputation throughout Lincolnshire, and indeed more widely. Ultimately, however, it seems, like so many others, it never really recovered from the societal disruption of the First World War.

An in-depth paper by Alistair on the Fulbeck Choral Society is soon to be published in the Journal of the Society of Lincolnshire History and Archaeology. Details on membership available from their website.

Caythorpe & District Garden Society

Our speaker for October was Don Witton, on 'Euphorbias and other Vibrant Perennials'. Don is a retired teacher with a love of hardy perennials, which have taken over his garden and allotment in South Yorkshire. He holds a National Collection of Euphorbia, with over 130 varieties, but also grows many other perennials and has a particular liking for those with strong colours.

Don handed out a list of those he recommends, with a good selection to keep the garden bright from spring to autumn. For the beginning of the growing season, hellebores are a must, followed by other early flowering species such Dicentra and Geum. In summer there is a wide choice: crimson peonies and day lilies, orange red-hot-pokers and crocosmia, and yellow rudbeckia, to name but a few. In autumn Japanese anemones, sedums (especially Hylotelephium 'Red Cauli') shrubby salvias, Michaelmas daisies and hardy chrysanthemums keep the succession going until winter sets in. Euphorbias contribute mostly acid greens and yellows, particularly in spring, though several species flower later in the year.

Don's lively presentation was illustrated with some excellent photographs to whet the appetite for these strikingly beautiful flowers, and the plants he bought for sale proved very popular. Many thanks to Don for an entertaining and informative evening.

Our November meeting will be on Tuesday 12th at Carlton Scroop Village Hall, 7:00pm for 7:30pm. Our speaker will be Jonathan Mosely, internationally acclaimed floral designer with 30 years experience in floristry at the highest level. The next meeting will be on Tuesday 26th November 2024 in the Village Hall, starting at 7:20 pm, which is open to all residents. Please come along to the meeting to gain a better understanding of what has happened in the Parish and to express your views on what you would like to see happen for the future.

The Parish Plan

The Parish Council produced a Parish Plan in 2022 following a survey with residents. The current Plan can be found on the Council's website. Most of the actions from that Plan have now been achieved, so it is an appropriate time to review and update the document. The Parish Council would still like to hear from residents on what they would like to see take place in the next few years. This is your opportunity to influence what can happen in the two villages. So please contact the Clerk or a parish councillor if you have any thoughts on what should be happening in the Parish.

Highway Issues in the Two Villages

Lincolnshire County Council is planning to re-surface the highway between the south side of Carlton Scroop and the level crossing at Honnigton, commencing in May 2025. The Parish Council has requested that the section of highway between the level crossing and the junction of the A153 also be re-surfaced.

Speeding continues to be a big issue through the two villages. The Parish Council is particularly concerned about speeding along the Sudbrook Road on the stretch from Charity Street to the junction of the A607, where several accidents have occurred recently. This stretch is still at 50 mph and the Parish Council has requested that it be brought in line with the 30mph speed limit in the rest of the village.

The mobile Speed Indicator Device (SID) will continue to be deployed in the Parish in order to make motorists aware of their speed through both villages. The Parish Council has a stock of 30 mph bin stickers available for residents. Please contact the clerk or a parish councillor for the stickers, or come and pick them up at the Parish Council Meeting.

The Parish Council has been in touch with Lincolnshire Police regarding speeding on the A607 in the Parish and they have confirmed that the Roads Policing Unit will undertake some speed checks at some point in the future.

The Parish Council continues to push for a footpath between Carlton Scroop and Normanton as part of the County Council's Sustainable Travel Initiative.

A meeting is to be held between parish councillors and the Lincolnshire County Council Highways manager in late October to discuss the above highway issues.

Jubilee Field/Cemetery, Carlton Scroop

The hedging around the field is to be trimmed. The grass has been maintained by Baines Estates. The cemetery grass is being maintained by David Balfe. The Parish Council is purchasing some more bulbs to be planted around the Parish in the Autumn ready for Spring 2025.

Other Community Issues

The Parish Council re-appointed South Kesteven District Council to cut the grass around the Parish for the current grass cutting season. However, councillors have expressed their dissatisfaction with the quality and consistency of the grass cutting so far and will monitor the work for the final cut of the season.

A bench has been installed in Heath Lane, Normanton

The two existing defibrillators and cabinets at Normanton and Carlton Scroop are to be replaced between now and Spring 2025. An additional Defibrillator will be installed on the external wall at the Village Hall in Carlton Scroop and this will be partly financed by the Carlton Scroop Charities.

The Parish Council obtaining quotes to replace the roof on the bus stop shelter opposite Newark Lane, Carlton Scroop.

A new Directly Elected Mayor for Lincolnshire has been approved. Elections for this post will tale place in May 2025. The Parish Council has expressed concern over potential additional costs to council taxpayers regarding this additional layer of bureaucracy.

Not from the Rectory with Revd. Sara Davies

The Diocese recently sent out a letter which they had received from the Bishop to the Armed Forces, encouraging us to continue offering support to the military community as part of our local ongoing mission and ministry. I am part of that community, as a long standing Military Wife and now Military Mum. My husband has served in areas at war over the years and my serving children were both overseas last Christmas, one in an area under attack on Christmas Day. It's very frightening not being able to communicate with family members, not even knowing where they are sometimes, listening to news reports as often as possible. There are 172000 people currently serving in the regular and reserve forces, all with people who love and care for them when they are away. Approximately 125000 children have a direct connection to the Armed Forces and this is likely to be proportionally higher in a diocese like ours with a significant military presence.

As we remember all those who gave their lives and were injured in previous wars and conflicts this Remembrance Sunday/Armistice Day, can I ask that we pray for all those currently serving and their families? If you have no military connection but know someone in your local community who has, ask how they or their relative are. I have always passed onto my family when someone has asked after them which they have appreciated. It's especially hard for young people who have left their friends and family behind to serve their country. Some are as young as sixteen and may now live in a totally different world from school friends, progressively taking on new challenges and responsibilities. I was shocked by how young some of the soldiers were who attended this year's 80th Anniversary of Arnhem. It really made me think about all the young people who were called up or volunteered to serve in the First and Second World Wars; how scared they must have been and what pain their families must have felt, sometimes not seeing them for years.

Many of our churches have set areas for remembrance, usually around some form of war memorial or plaque. Following a suggestion from the Armed Forces' Bishop, I hope that we can set up small 'prayer stations' in all our churches, where prayers can be shared for those serving in the forces and for their families. Churches are already a source of spiritual strength

for many, including those without a faith.



We live in a very volatile world with a high level of uncertainty at this present time. Peace is extremely fragile and already broken in some areas but we cannot lose hope that one day we will have a world where there is a greater understanding of others who don't share our thoughts, faith or political convictions. Our prayers and support for those

who work for peace on our behalf are especially important. Understanding our differences and appreciating our individual uniqueness can start at any age, looking for what we have in common rather than what divides us. For some of us it might require a change of mindset, for others it may come naturally but it is something that we all need to commit to, as custodians of God's world.






