

Mike Davey, a retired lecturer in botany, was our speaker for October. His subject was 'Cacti and Succulents, Plants of the Desert' a group in which he has a special interest. He defined a succulent as any plant that stores water, whether it be in leaves, stems or roots. There are around 10,000 species worldwide, and 25% of plant families include some succulents. Not all of them are obviously succulents, such as the houseplant Tradescantia, which stores water in its stems.

Mike has an extensive collection of cacti, which are native to the Americas. They store water in swollen stems' with leaves reduced to spines for protection and to reduce water loss. The stems are often ribbed to channel rainwater down to the roots. Their flowers, which come in many colours, are similar to a daisy and some are perfumed. They are generally short lived and are pollinated by insects, birds or even bats. The Saguaro cacti of the deserts of Nevada can grow to more than 50ft, weigh 50 tons and live for centuries.



All cacti are succulents, but not all succulents are cacti. Nevertheless many have evolved spines, including Agave, Aloe and some African Euphorbia. Other succulents are less defensive, and Aeoniums, Crassula (Jade plant) and Echinacea make good patio plants although they need protection from frost. Perhaps the strangest are Lithops, or living stones, with have just 2 swollen leaves a few mm high that are barely

distinguishable from the gravel in which they grow. Many thanks to Mike for a very interesting and beautifully illustrated talk.

The memories of Augustus Peach (part XXII)

George my eldest brother started school at three years of age and I should probably have commenced my education a year later. After the death of my father as each of us commenced our schooldays we had to carry a folding yellow card to take to our schoolmaster each day to have it marked for attendance, and this card had to be shewn to the relieving officer when he delivered the seven shillings poor relief to my mother on Fridays. As schoolchildren our food consisted of one shilling worth of butcher's meat per week, bread and dripping, toast and dripping, roast potatoes with dripping placed in the centre, and skimmed or old milk at half penny a pint. The beef dripping and old milk was easily obtainable cheaply from the houses of the well to do.

Saturday nights were bath nights, no bath or bathroom available. This ablution was carried on in the living room by the fireside, the bath a wooden wash tub. Each took their turn in the tub and then sat upon the table to be dried and fitted out with well washed and fresh underclothes. Usually the grocer with the weeks supply of groceries would call soon after our washing programme was completed. The smiles on washed children's faces with a glow of freshness and comfort, would call for a remark from the tradesman whilst the business and paying transactions from my mother's purse was being carried out. This mother's love was certainly manifest in the happiness of her children. I can picture her now with purse in hand saying, two shillings off this week or if at the end of a quarter five shillings or a similar sum to settle the balance never a halfpenny owing after the end of a quarter. This wonderful system of settling her accounts was a religious right and a duty in all her household transactions and dealings together with perfect cleanliness and taste in all things effective to our well being, training and action in the home. A true example of perfect citizenship under great financial difficulties.

At seven years of age I was a choir boy and attended the Choral Society's practices. The choirmaster and conductor of the Church choir and Choral society was a gentleman at the Manor House whose main hobby and the interest in the village was music. He revelled in good music, he not only gave his time but financial help in training his village choir to give high class concerts and in bringing eminent professional soloists and players of the day for the concerts in the Church, works such as the Messiah, Elijah, Creation, Samson, Hymn of Praise, Stabat Mater were amongst his many productions with soloists from the Albert Hall, Westminster Cathedral and a part of the Halle Orchestra. This packed village church shewed appreciation of this man's work, these concerts were an inspiration to me, and such an education to the appreciation of good music that ever since those days I have desired and interested myself in the pleasure that good music can give to one socially. Without any help I have contrived to cultivate and educate myself to take part actively in making music with much success. This interest may have laid dormant if the opportunity had not come from the experience of my choir boy's days. There was of course no possible hope of freedom to employ this musical talent in the right direction and at the time to earn my own living without other means or help nationally.

Our holidays, or rather a relaxation for my mother, were spent visiting her relatives some seven to eight miles away. The feast time in her own native village occasioned such a visit when she would set out walking with her family, my mother pushing a wooden pram, made with a well in the floor, this covered by a flat piece of board for a baby lying down and the wood removed for the seating of two children. This journey was often made through the snow covered roads, which meant untold effort and tenacity of purpose on my mother's part to accomplish the trek. In summer during the school holidays the journey again for a holiday of from six to seven weeks duration

As I write, the leaves on some of our trees are just starting to turn yellow and orange. Those of the Virginia creeper on the side of our house had been a brilliant crimson red until the high winds took most of them away. When I was a child we had a small sumac tree in our front garden, with a branch that overhung the gate. We four children loved to climb on the gate and then swing backwards and forwards on the branch. After many years, when the tree was older and we were heavier, the branch came off very dramatically when one of my brothers was in mid-swing! Each autumn I would gather up some of the vibrant autumn leaves from that tree and just wonder at the beauty of them. I would press them dry between the pages of a book in an effort to hold on to those incredible colours. But of course the colours faded and the vibrancy disappeared. Autumn is a time of beauty but also of loss: a time of fruitfulness and of letting go.

A recent survey found that for many people the happiest time of their lives (though not for all people) was between their early 60s and early 70s. Not in their younger lives as might be expected! For many people (but not all) this is a time of fruitfulness, a time of reaping the rewards of a life time of busyness. Paid work has finished, goals accomplished, projects completed. Pensions are being received. There is time to do different things; travel, explore new hobbies or develop old ones, meet new challenges, more time to give to family and friends. Many charities and good causes rely heavily on the army of the active newly retired, and this can bring great satisfaction to all involved. We experience the fruitfulness of the autumn of life!

But autumn is also a time of loss. I sometimes wonder how a tree would feel (if it had feelings) as it gradually loses those leaves it has nurtured through the year, especially when the last one, just hanging on, finally lets go. As we get older we experience more and more loss. Physical activities have to be adjusted as there is less energy and the old muscles don't seem to work quite as well. Sometimes the right words take a long time coming to mind. Hearing and sight may not be so good. Then there are the more devastating losses, such as the death of a partner (which I have recently experienced).

In our churches at the beginning of November we keep All Souls Day, when we hold services to remember the recently departed. (See list of services for dates, places and times). We give thanks for their lives. We acknowledge our grief and the longing for them still to be here. We light candles to remind ourselves that they live on in our hearts and memories. The light says that whatever our personal darkness, we dare always to live with the hope not only that God is with us, hurting with us, but that in eternity he holds that Loved One in His care, and one day he will draw us also into His nearer presence with those we love.

Remembrance Sunday soon follows (Nov 9th), when we remember all those who have died in war. There are service in most of our churches.

Then at the end of November our Christian year starts again as we move into the season of Advent; the time of preparation the coming of Jesus Christ at Christmas, and at the end of time. We move from loss into the remembrance of Christ coming into our world, bringing new hope for the future, for us individually and for the world.

Local Winged Wonders

As I write this, the Swallows and House Martins are very active, feeding over my house. The adults arrived with us in Spring to raise their families. The young have now fledged and are feeding up in readiness for their long passage to Africa in late Summer/early Autumn. House Martins can have up to 3 broods a year, which can be a headache for some homeowners who aren't keen on the mess the birds make beneath their wonderful mud nests.

In the past people believed that Swallows spent the winter hibernating at the bottom of ponds! Presumably because they can regularly be seen skimming across the surface of the water to get a drink. The name 'Swallow' possibly comes from the Old Norse word 'swala' which means cleft stick, referring to the birds' forked tail.

Our local Swifts have now left us to head back to Africa, having had a good year. I will miss their joyous screams filling our summer skies. They arrive a little later than the Swallows and House Martins, having flown an incredible 3,400 miles, and then make the same journey back in the Autumn. They rarely touch the ground, sleeping, eating, bathing and even mating on the wing. Sadly, their numbers are plummeting. I have put up a Swift box on my house to try to help these red-listed birds.



The Environment Blog Access to Public Rights of Way



The network of paths and open access land in the UK represents an infrastructure that we tend to take for-granted. It enables movement, connection with nature, social interaction and freedom to walk over part of the countryside. We access that land through public rights of way (PRoW). In and around Caythorpe and Frieston we are fortunate to have a good PRoW network.

PRoW are paths that anyone has the legal right to use on foot or with a mobility scooter, and sometimes with other modes of transport. Footpaths are probably the best known PRoW but there are in fact four main designations of PRoW open to different modes of transport:

Public footpaths open to walkers, mobility scooters and powered wheelchairs.

Public bridleways are like footpaths but also include horse riders and cyclists.

Restricted byways include all the above plus non-motorised vehicles like horse-drawn carriages.

Byways open to all traffic (BOATs) are open to all classes of traffic including motor vehicles (though they may not be maintained to the same standard as ordinary roads).

There is no central record of PRoW, their management being the responsibility of local highway authorities. For a very long time, therefore, PRoW have been inadequately protected, unrecorded, forgotten, blocked off or built over. Readers who have lived in the area for some time may well have examples to share where 'old' footpaths have suddenly disappeared under new housing estates – if so, please write to the News and Views editor if you have experiences to share.

In England the PRoW network includes around 91,000 miles of footpaths, 20,000 miles of bridleways, 3,700 miles of restricted byways and 2,300 miles of byways open to all traffic. However, a significant (but unknown) proportion of footpaths is on private land. These footpaths are classed as permissive as landowners can curtail public access when it suits them. Because there is no central register, we have no idea what proportion of all footpaths are permissive. This seems unacceptable in this day and age, but I understand that digitisation of these records is on the way, so

there may be clarity soon. Without an OS map it is often unclear which footpaths are permissive and which are open.

Despite the UK being a small island with countryside on our doorstep, international comparisons suggest that we do not make the most of our connection to nature – one study ranking the UK the lowest in a sample of 14 large European countries. Even within the UK, access to the countryside in particular is very uneven, and depends on the state of the local PRoW network and whether footpaths are joined up, and also personal factors like gender, age, ethnicity and income.

Because of historically poor land records there are still footpaths that may not even appear on OS maps. If you think you have located one, and you want to investigate further, contact your local highway authority (Lincolnshire County Council) and ask to speak to the footpaths officer, or else seek advice from the Ramblers.

What can be done to improve access to public rights of way?

Here are just a few suggestions:

Nationally

Campaign for digitised integrated national records for all types of PRoW.

Campaign for the same 'right to roam' over the countryside as exists in Scotland and/or join the Open Spaces Society.

Locally

Explore or log all footpaths near you (there are likely to be more than you think).

Vary the routes you take your dog walking.

Join a Ramblers or Wellbeing Health Walk group.

Report blocked footpaths or inaccessible or damaged stiles or gates to the footpaths officer of Lincolnshire County Council.

Young families with buggies and wheelchair users could audit and report footpaths and stiles for their accessibility.

Encourage family and friends to go on regular exploratory local walks.

And enjoy the countryside!






